International Rotary President Will Speak

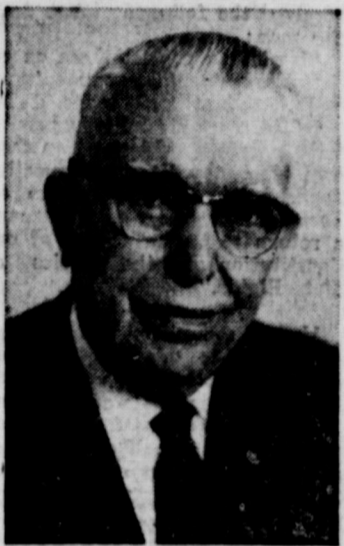
Abey, president-elect of the International Rotary Club, will address the Eastland Rotary Club Monday, Nov. 14, at 7:30 p. m. at the club meeting.

For 42 years Nov. 11 has been an official holiday in Rising Star and the town has closed. The bank, grocery stores and most other businesses were closed and had a flag in front of their business Friday.

Eastland observed Memorial Day (or Veterans Day) too. A very impressive service was held on the courthouse square.

Across the street, however, the bank, grocery stores, the newspaper and most other businesses were open as usual. Cash registers rang in many instances as the band played our national anthem.

A flag fluttered from the courthouse from a make-do stick. There is not even a flag pole on top of the center of county government. Another was placed on the courthouse lawn by the Civic League. Otherwise not a flag could be seen.

Memorial Day Service Is Held

Civic League Places Wreath In Memory

For the 40 consecutive year members of the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club placed a wreath on the memorial fountain on the southwest corner of the courthouse Friday morning, Memorial Day.

Placing the wreath in memory of Eastland County's war dead were Mrs. E. Roy Townsend, Mrs. O. H. Chastain, Mrs. O. M. White and Mrs. T. L. Fagg. Mrs. Earl Conner spoke briefly, explaining the meaning of the wreath and declared that it was a prayer of the League's members that this country would live in peace so that "... never again will we see the lives of our young men wasted."

The Eastland High School band opened the short, but impressive service by playing "America" and "God of Our Fathers."

At 11 a. m. the city siren sounded and a minute of silence followed.

The Rev. Eugene Surface delivered a brief sermon-prayer.

"We thank Thee that Thou dost not leave us alone, but dost trouble us with a divine discontent with things as they are," Rev. Surface prayed.

"We give Thee thanks for all who have laid down their lives in the service of our country. Unite all the people of this nation in a holy purpose to defend the freedom and brotherhood for which they have died. Grant that the liberty they bequeathed unto us may be continued to our children and our children's children, and that we may always prove ourselves a people mindful of Thy favor and glad to do Thy will."

The sermon was followed by the color guard and salute. Sgt. George B. Hall commanded the National Guard with Sgt. L. E. Robison, Spl. Harry Carr, Pfc. Jerry Colburn and Spl. Al Gaeta serving as color guard members.

Mrs. E. Roy Townsend, Red Cross overseas nurse in World I led the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

The Rev. Warner B. Washington led prayer. He prayed God to "... defend our liberties and fashion into one united people the multitudes brought together of many nations and races. Endue with the spirit of wisdom those to whom in Thy name we entrust the authority of government, especially thy servant, John F. Kennedy, our president-elect, that there may be justice and peace at home."

This was followed by the playing of "Taps" by Eddie Don Sargeant.

The band then played the national anthem.

Mavs Tie for Second In District With Victory

Finding out just how important desire can be, the Eastland Mavericks turned in their best game of the season Friday night to riddle the Clyde Bulldogs, 43-22, and win a hunk of second place honors in District 10-A.

Paced by a group of seniors who knew they were playing their final game for Eastland High School, the Mavs were not to be denied. They ground out the victory on the brilliant play of full-back James Lewis and quarterback Mickey Garner, and the hard hitting of the Maverick line, featuring the play of Bill Jones, Gary Culpepper, Bill Moylan, Bill McCleskey, Tony Jordan and Jerry Cheaney.

Eastland scored the first time they got the ball to set the pattern of the game. It took eight plays, with Lewis carrying the ball six times, Lewis got the final 14 yard for the touchdown with the game 3:50 second deep, then Garner ran over the extra points to make it 8-0.

Clyde didn't wait long before they scored. Taking advantage of a one yard Maverick punt which gave them the ball on the Eastland 28, the Bulldogs moved into the endzone in just five plays. The big play was a 17 yard pass from Tom Cook to Carroll Howet. Tom Polson got the final six yards on a spurt through the line. Cook then passed to J. B. Hicks for the extra points.

The Mavericks scored on the first play of the second quarter to go ahead to stay. Lewis smashed over from the two for the score, but it was Garner's 31 yard spurt to the three that set up the score. Garner, playing "his best game, ran over the extra points. Clyde didn't score again until the last quarter, when they rang up three touchdowns to the Mavs' one.

Meanwhile, back on the football field, the locals were having a busy time against the Dogs, who were coached by Jon Tate, who formerly coached most of the Mavs playing the game.

A Garner to Bill McCleskey pass for 15 yards accounted for the next score. Lewis set the score up on a 64 yard run in a drive that carried 94 yards. McCleskey's catch was a beauty, with a pair of Bulldogs guarding him

small ranch with the aid of Veteran's Land program. Soon he had to obtain emergency feed from the government. Later he put part of his land in the soil bank and the payments soon paid out his ranch. His father and mother lived very comfortably on the

ranch, drawing social security and old age assistance checks.
Cisco lines supplied electricity, the government helped clear his land and the county agent showed him 14 to terrace it.
He read public library books, banked his money in a bank insured by an agency of the government. His children grew up and followed in his footsteps, attending public schools, eating free lunches, riding the school bus, playing in the municipal park and swimming in the public pool.
The man worked hard for the new Federal highway program, since it would help his town. He signed a petition seeking Federal assistance in developing an industrial project to help his area, was a leader to get a new Federal building and went to Washington to ask the government to build a dam to provide his area water and cheap electricity. He was also a leader in a move to get his specific type of business a special tax write-off for the "good of the nation."
Then one day his congressman received the following letter from the man:
"I wish to protest these excessive governmental expenditures and attendant high taxes. I believe in rugged individualism. I think people should stand on their own feet without expecting handouts. I am opposed to all Socialistic trends and I demand a return to the principles of our Constitution and the policies of State Rights."
Here's something which may start you to thinking. In the general election Tuesday a total of 7,074 votes were cast in Eastland County. Of that total vote more than half of the votes were cast in two precincts,

Cisco and Eastland Cisco had 2,039 voters and Eastland 1,671. That's a total of 3,710 votes which leaves just 3,364 for the other 11 precincts. It simply means that Eastland and Cisco now have the voting strength to elect any county official.
Of course that would mean the two larger towns would have to vote as a block, and they do not. Cisco is noted for block voting on occasions in county elections, but in Eastland you can't tell which way the voting will go. Both towns are on the conservative side, however. That accounts for the Republican's ticket's victory in this county. Nixon and Lodge led in Eastland County by exactly 300 votes. The GOP ticket built up a 482 vote lead in Eastland and Cisco alone, however. That means that the rest of the county favored Kennedy by a margin of 182 votes.

On the same subject, it is interesting to note that of the 7,074 county votes, 3,118 were cast in Precinct 1. Added to Eastland's 1,671 votes were Ranger's 1,257 and Olden's 190. The chart below shows the unfairness of the present commissioner precinct divisions in this county.

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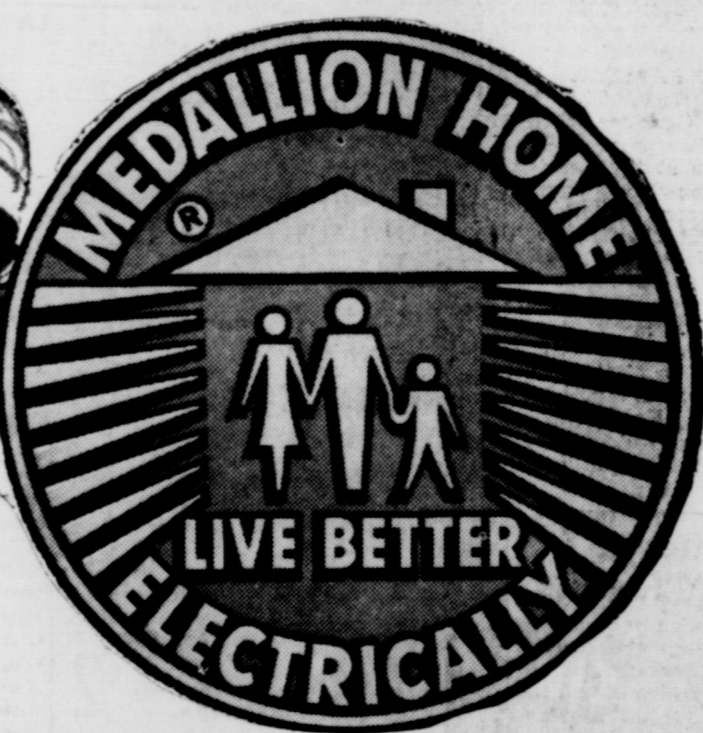

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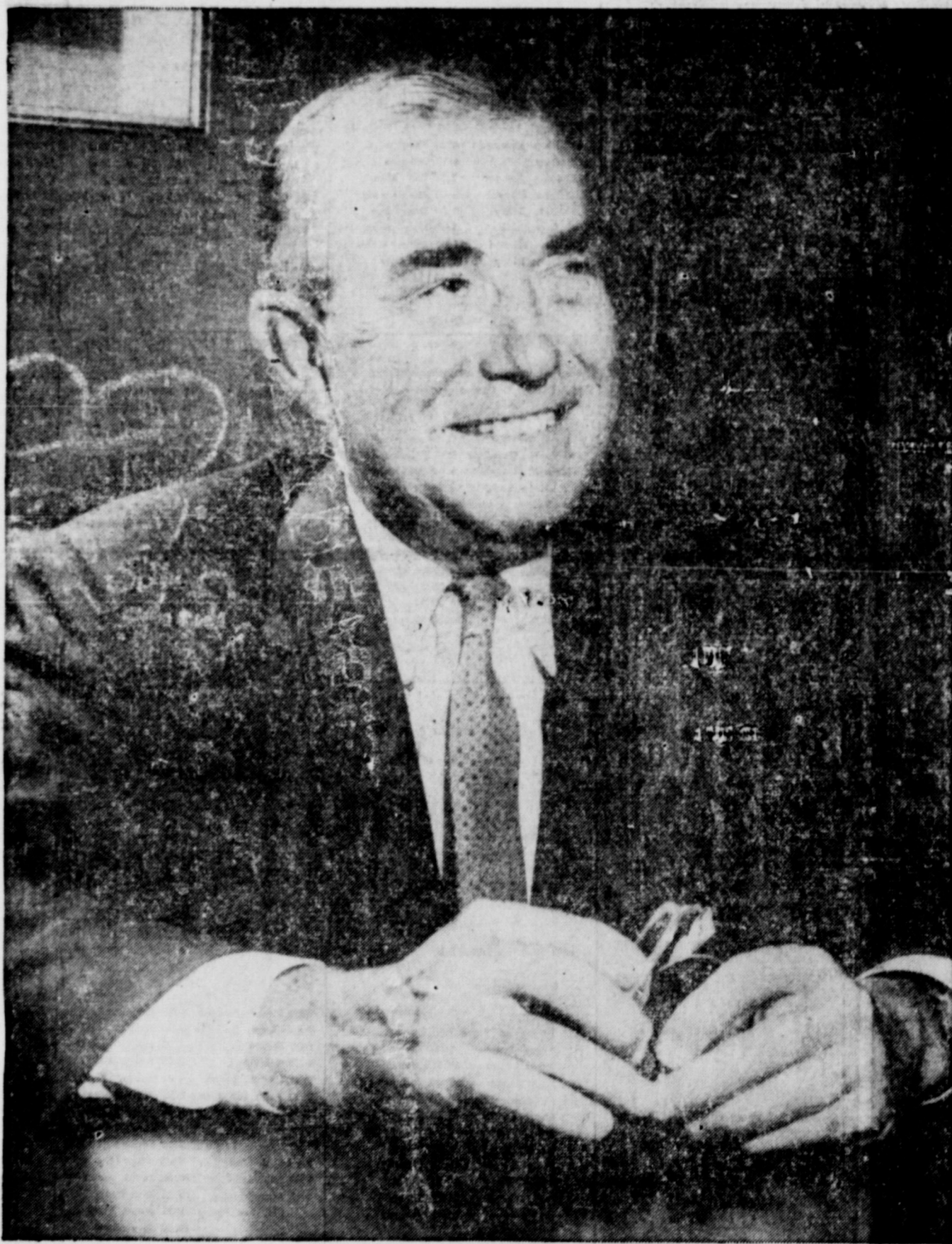

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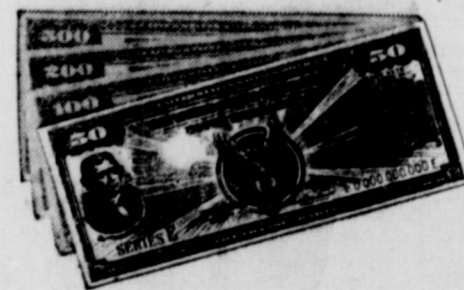
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
