

Here's something which may start you to thinking. In the general election Tuesday a total of 7,074 votes were cast in Eastland County. Of that total vote more than half of the votes were cast in two precincts, would be

Cisco and Eastland Cisco had voters and Eastland 1,671. That's a total of 3,710 votes which leaves just 3,364 the other 11 precincts. It simply means that Eastland and Cisco now have the voting strength to elect any county official.

Of course that would mean the two larger towns would have to vote as a block, and they do not. Cisco is noted for block voting on occassions in county elections, but in Eastland you can't tell which way the voting wil go. Both towns are on the conservative side, however. That accounts for the Republican's ticket's victory in this county. Nixon and Lodge led in Eastland County by e actly 300 votes. 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

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


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
