Nixon Enjoys Firm Lead In Local Poll

If a telephone political poll taken by the Telegram is any indication, Republican Presidential candidate Richard Nixon will carry Eastland in the Nov. 2 general election by a lopsided margin.

Fifty citizens were called at random and results show that 28 said they favor Nixon, nine indicated they would vote for Kennedy and 13 said they are undecided. Therefore Nixon has a better than majority lead even if all of the 13 persons who said they are undecided vote the Democratic ticket.

Calling numbers on a fixed pattern—one number was called then nine were skipped (the poll was not started with the first number in the telephone book)—persons answering the call were told: "This is the Eastland Telegram. This newspaper is conducting a political poll to see which candidate is leading here in the Presidential race. No names will be used. We will appreciate it if you will tell us if you prefer Nixon, the Republican candidate, Kennedy the Democratic candidate, or if you are undecided."

A breakdown percentage-wise shows that 56 percent prefer the Nixon-Lodge ticket while only 18 percent said they would vote for Kennedy and Johnson. A large 26 percent stated they are undecided. While the Republicans carried the Eastland precinct in both the 1952 and 1956 campaigns, they did not enjoy the lead which is indicated in the Telegram's poll. The high number of undecided voters may indicate the race will be closer than the poll shows, but even then Nixon has a clear cut lead without any help from those voters who have not yet made up their minds.

A planning committee recently met in conjunction with a cardiac seminar to be jointly sponsored by the Taylor County Heart Association and District 15 of the Texas Graduate Nurses Association. This seminar will be held on Oct. 29 at the Abilene Taylor County Health Unit, 2241 S. 19th Street, Abilene.

The program will begin at 8 a.m. and last until approximately 5 p.m. Registration fee is two dollars which will include the cost of a buffet luncheon to be served. The program will include an address by Dr. William B. Adamson of Abilene. Dr. Adamson is a member of the American Heart Board and past president of the Texas Heart Association. Another feature of the program will be an address by a visiting cardiac surgeon, Dr. Hugh Wilson, of Dallas. A panel discussion will be held on medical aspects, nutrition and nursing care of the cardiac patient. James Wright, president of the United Fund, Dick Spalding, drive chairman and Mike George, advanced gifts chairman each gave reports.

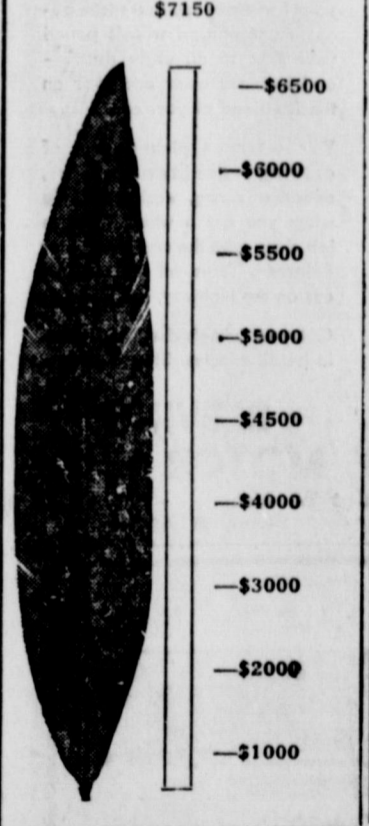

Vince could do without the ideas her mouth was giving him, but he willed himself not to look away. "It wasn't my horse," he said with dignity. "My horse was stolen last night."

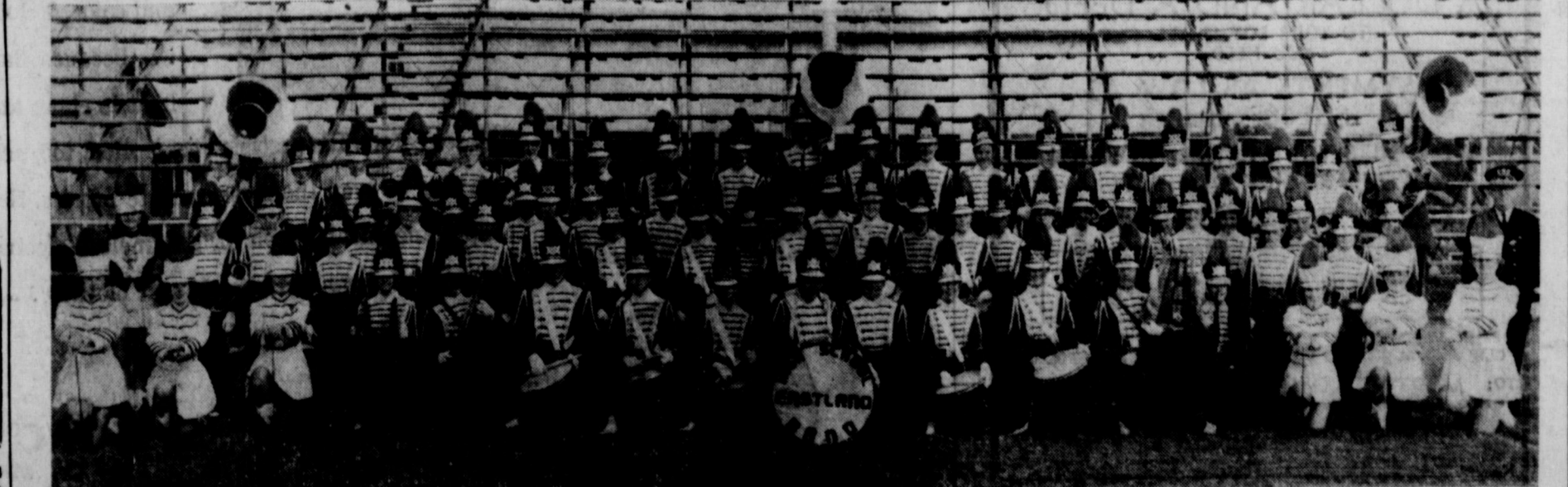
"That's a serious charge," she said as the crew filed into the yard.

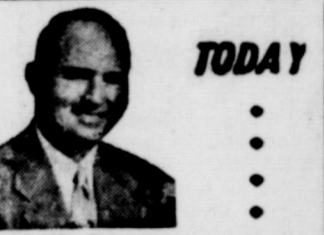

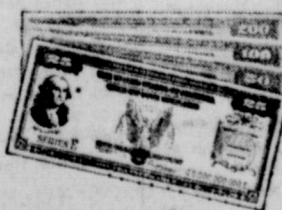

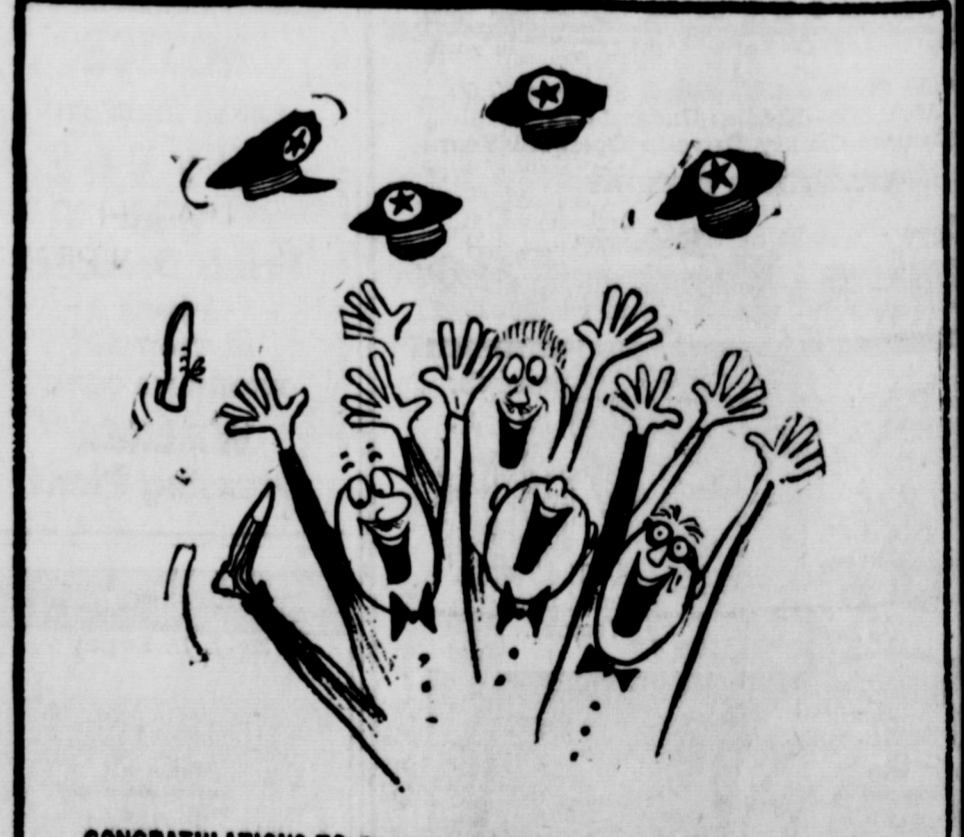
