



"The present Constitution," he said, "was made by our forefathers in 1875 and adopted Sept. 17, 1876, just as the State threw off the yoke placed upon the Government at the close of the Civil War, when the Indian uprisings were one of the topmost questions to

The Judge asked that the women study the amendments which will be offered in the November election and to make a choice of whether to vote for or against, from knowledge, not hearsay, then to go on record, in "your clubs and to your friends," that the public be better informed.

He stated that the constitution was written by men, who traveled to Austin by horseback, and whom in their fondest dreams could never have visualized the immense growth of Texas, their miles of paved highways, their great industries, their large cities, the rich oilfields, the sulphur deposits, which comprise the resources of the state. It was written for about one half a million people as compared to the 7,711,194 people, who make up the population of the cities and rural areas of the

Beef Profits Increase From Better Roads

What have good roads got to do with the price of beef? Quite a bit, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

Fifty years ago, most cattle, as well as other livestock, made a part of their journey to market on the hoof with a considerable loss of weight. Today, thousands of head of beef cattle are trucked to market over the highways. That saves a lot of weight loss, but there is still a premium on time. For example, a cattle farmer

expects a 33-pound loss in weight of a 1,000-pound steer in the first 100 miles of travel, Even a threehour extension in trip time will knock another six pounds off his steer. Thus at 15 cents a pound, any time saved by better highways, would be worth 30 cents an hour per animal.

Obviously, the Chamber notes, good farm to market roads have a definite effect on the price of
