Nine Members Added to Quarter Century Club

Eastland Favors Republican for Senate Post

Eastland voters, for the first time that political "experts" here can remember, has voted for a Republican for United States Senate.

In the biggest surprise of local voting, John Tower of Wichita Falls edged out Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson for the senate seat. Edged out may not be a strong enough expression, for in truth Tower carried Precinct 1 by just one vote. He led here 705 to 704.

The senate vote, most observers believe, indicated a strong feeling against Johnson for allowing his name to be on the ballot in the races. State wide he won in both races, but to accept the vice-presidency he will have to resign his senate seat. He has announced he will do so the day he takes office as vice president.

Tower also carried one other precinct in Eastland County. He led at Gorman by a margin of 272 votes to 263, just three votes. Some of the other precincts gave narrow margins to Johnson.

The countywide vote was 3,731 for Johnson and 2,793 for Tower.

County Voting ... Shows Increase

Eastland County voters turned out in larger numbers this year than they did four years ago.

A total of 7,074 persons voted this year compared to 6,107 in 1956.

The heavy vote was indicative of interest in this year's campaign.

County Favors Nixon By Narrow Majority

Eastland and Cisco Voting Difference

Eastland County voters backed a Republican presidential candidate for the third time in a row and the fourth time in history Tuesday in a contest which was nip and tuck all the way, but the state and nation didn't go along with the thinking of county citizens.

Richard Nixon and Henry Lodge carried this county by a 300-vote margin with the Republicans polling 3,358 votes and the Democrats 3,058. Eastland and Cisco gave the GOP the biggest support while Ranger and Rising Star were the best precincts for the Democrats.

Statewide and nationwide the voting was extremely close. The Democratic ticket won by a vote of 1,103,617 to 1,053,469 in Texas in one of the closest elections ever held in this state.

Over the nation Kennedy and Johnson won the popular vote by 50.2 percent to Nixon-Lodge's 49.8 percent. There is a chance that untabulated ballots of the various minor parties may show that Kennedy won with less than a majority of the nation's ballots. The last count showed Kennedy with 338 electoral votes won (or leading) and Nixon with 185.

A total of 7,074 voters went to the polls in this county. Only 6,448 votes were tabulated in the presidential race, however. Many voters were not counted because they did not complete their ballots. In most cases where ballots were tossed out, the voter marked out either the Republican or Democratic candidates, but failed to mark out the Constitution Party and Prohibition Party candidates.

Therefore, while it was clear who the voter intended to vote for, the ballots could not be counted since three candidates in the presidential race were left unmarked. More than 100 votes were not counted in both the Eastland and Ranger boxes alone.

The senate race was close in Eastland County, too. Lyndon Johnson won re-election by a vote of 3,731 to 2,793 for the Republican candidate, John Tower. Tower's strength in the county and state brand him as a definite strong candidate for the office which Johnson must give up to become vice president.

The governor's race was no contest. Gov. Price Daniel, the Democratic candidate, won easily, polling 4,901 votes to William Steger's 1,838 on the Republican side. Democrats won all of the other (Continued On Page Two)

Maverick Coach Carrol Shelton will be up against a team coached by Jon Tate, who served as Shelton's assistant for three seasons. If either of the coaches hopes to surprise the other he will have to come up with something brand new.

Clyde is the most amazing team in the district. The Bulldogs were badly crippled at the start of the season. The Dogs lost six games in a row before they suddenly became alive. Now they have a three game winning streak going. And it isn't just that Clyde has started winning, its the way they have been doing it.

Last week Tate's eleven smashed Cross Plains 23-0. The week

before the Dogs rolled over Early, 41-12, and three weeks ago they beat Santa Anna, 37-6.

Simple Rules Can Help Save U. S. Money In Operating Post Office

"The rugged individualism of Americans is clearly evident in the sizes, shapes, and colors of the envelopes they deposit in the mails," says Postmaster Marene Johnson. "In most instances the variations are reasonable and cause no difficulty, but quite often extremely small or odd-shaped envelopes and brightly colored ones or those of paper with an over-all design contribute to mishandling or loss in the mails.

If most prompt and accurate postal service is to be given, these recommendations of the Post Office Department with regard to envelopes should be followed:

1. Use any light color that does not interfere with legible address and postmark. Brilliant colors should not be used.
2. Use paper strong enough to withstand normal handling in the mails. Highly glazed paper or that with an over-all design is not satisfactory for showing the address and necessary postal endorsements legibly.
3. Use standard sizes. Envelopes smaller than 2-3/4 by 4 inches or larger than 9 by 12 inches are not recommended.

When window envelopes are used, they are subject to the following conditions:

1. The address window must be parallel with the length and in the lower portion of the envelope.
2. Nothing but the name, address, and any key number used

by the mailer may appear through the address window.

3. The return address should appear in the upper left corner. Though recommended for all envelopes, this is especially important for the window type. The enclosure sometimes is sorted or slips in such manner that the address is not visible. Such cases envelopes without return address must be treated as dead mail.
4. The address disclose through the window must be on white or light-colored paper.

By following the recommendations of the Postal Service with respect to envelopes, business firms and individuals can get themselves of better mail service and make a real contribution to the efficient, economical operation of post offices in handling over billions of pieces of mail yearly.

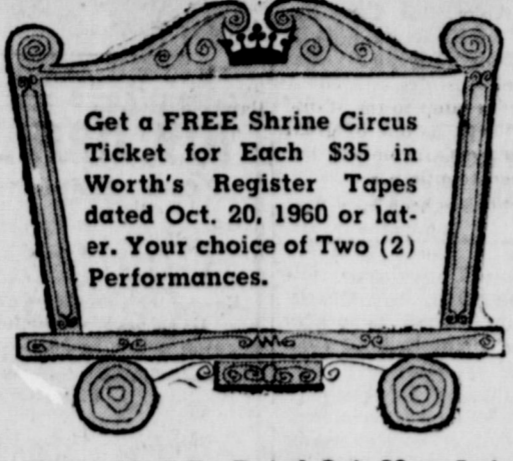

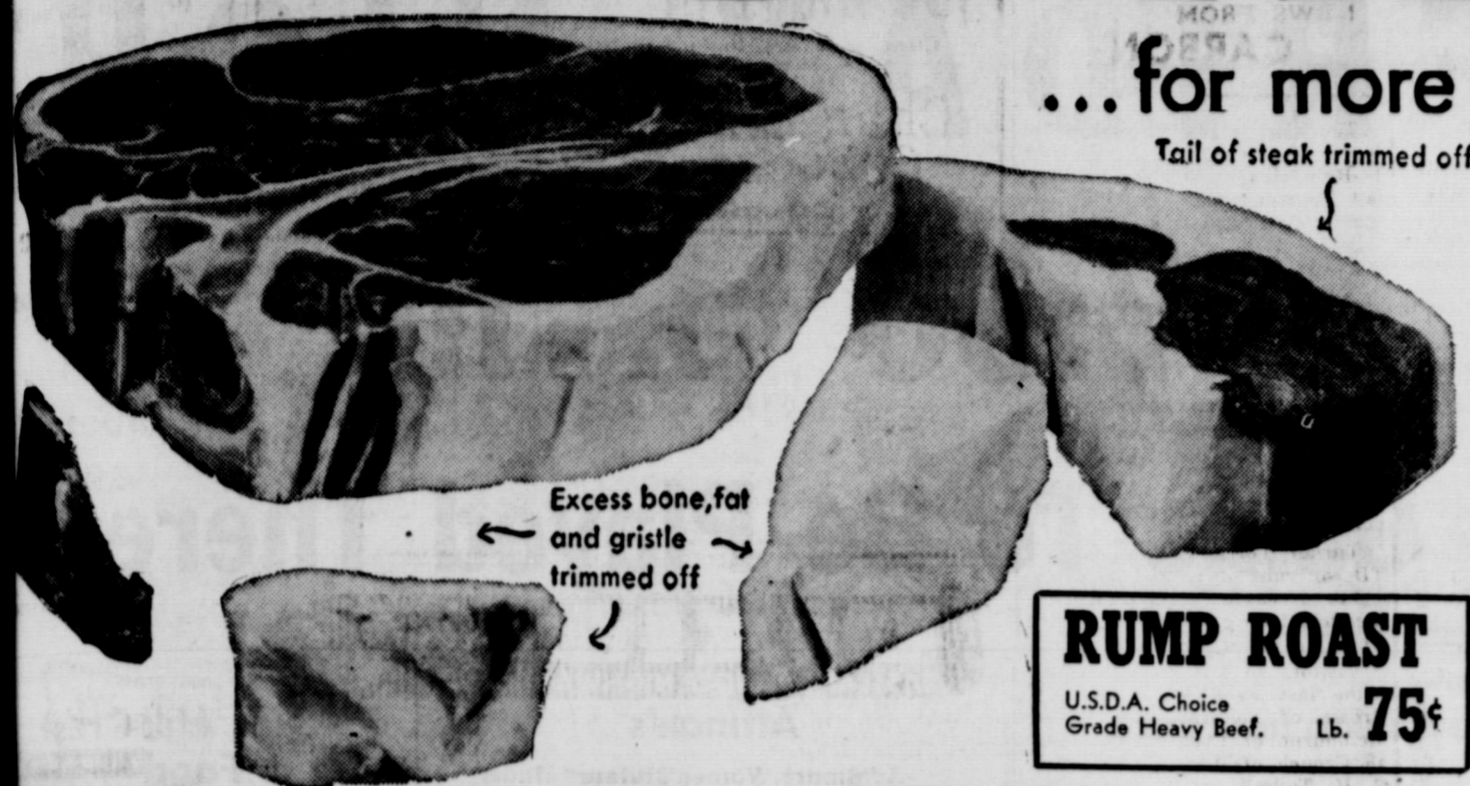

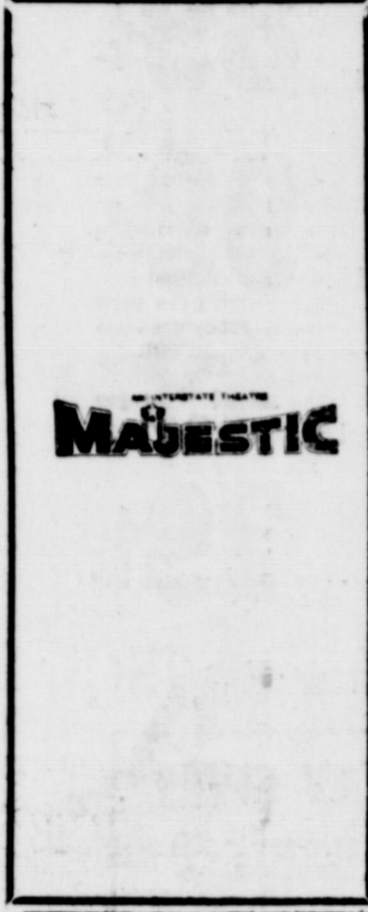

Many Qualify for Social Security Due to 1960 Law

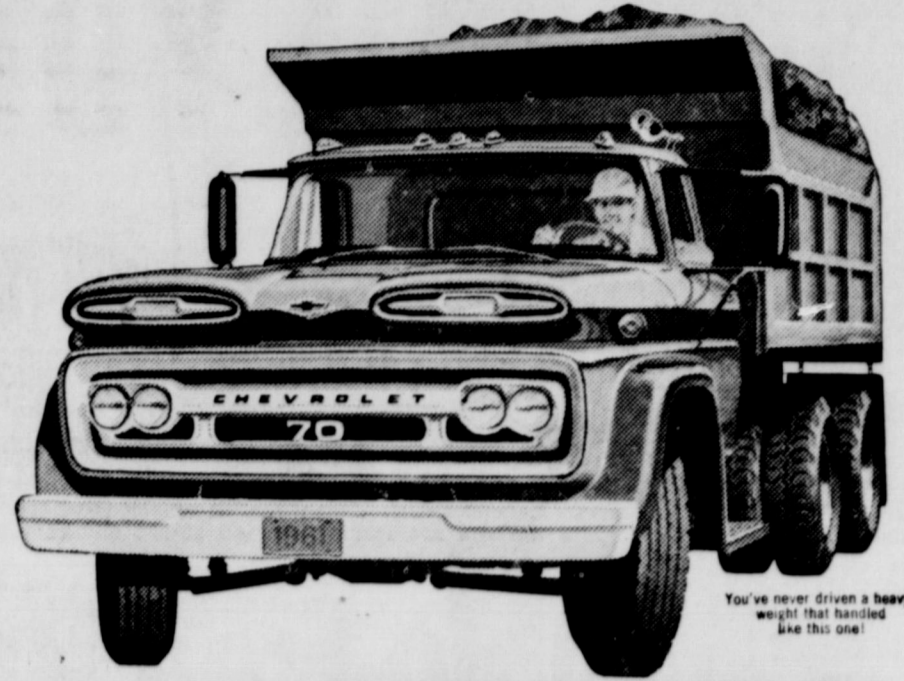
Last week, Nov. 4 or 5, many people across the nation received their first social security benefit checks — checks made possible for the first time by the 1960 amendments to the social security law, reports R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene District Manager for the Social Security Administration. Receiving checks for the first time were working people and their dependents (and also some survivors of workers who have died) who became eligible for benefits. The amount of social security credits required was reduced by about one-third, Tuley said.

Also receiving benefits for the first time were some widows whose husbands died after March 31, 1938, with at least 1 1/2 years of social security credits. Before the changes in the law enacted in September, no monthly benefits were payable to the survivors of any person dying before 1940.

If you believe you qualify for benefits under the amended law, it is still not too late for you to apply, and receive benefits dating back to the month of October. Additional information about specific cases can be obtained by asking your Abilene social security office. For general information on the 1960 amendments, ask the Abilene social security office for the new leaflet on the 1960 changes.

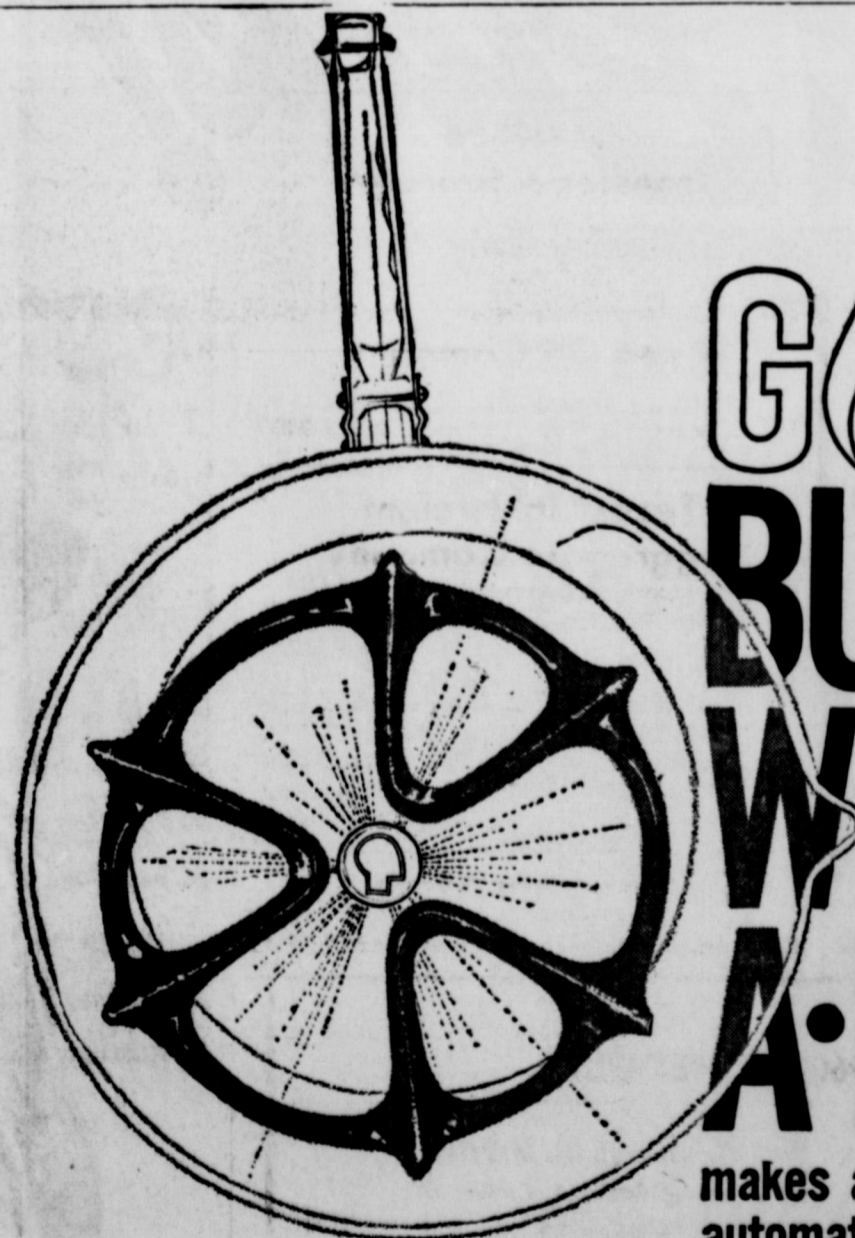

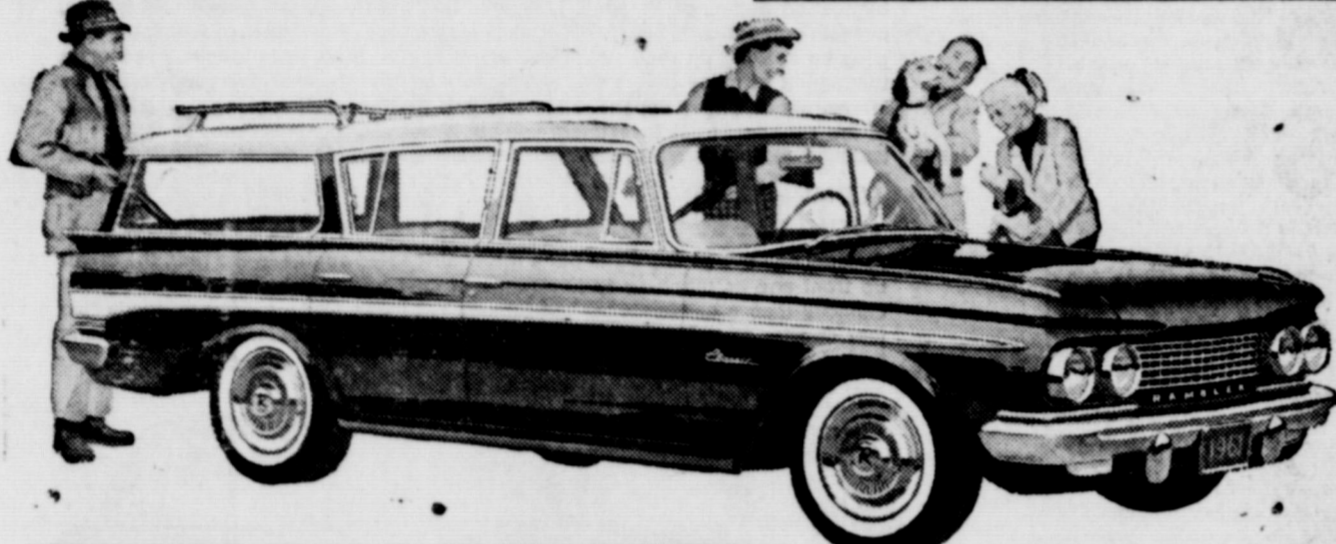
