Fishing Tackle **Taxes Promote Sport Projects**

WASHINGTON, D. C. en per cent excise tax on fishing ods and reels and artificial lures provides \$4 million annually in federal aid to the states for proects designed to improve sport fishing. Why not extend the tax to live baits as well - such common and popular fish-getters as minnows, shrimp, worms and crickets — and thereby expand the onservation program?

This proposal, advanced by ("Chuck") Schilling, Florida outdoor writer and conervationist, is being studied by the National Wildlife Federation and other organizations. Schilling, who oubles in journalistic brass as ishing editor of Florida Wildlife magazine and outdoor editor of the Stuart (Fla.) News, also serves as conservation director of the Florida Wildlife Federation. Last year he was awarded the Florida State Chamber of Commerce gold




