

New Use for Wheat May Be Possible

USDA scientists have discovered a possible new use for wheat In laboratory tests, acid-modified wheat flour has proved equal to commercial sizing material for

imparting strength to paper. Some papers sized with modified flour grained 43 percent in bursting strength, 20 percent in tensile strength and 93 percent in foudmodified-flour size we're compar able to papers treated with widly used commercial sizes in brightness, opacity, freedom from dis coloration and other desirable properties.

Successful chemical modificaion of wheat flour by reacting it with ethylene or propylene oxide was first reported by ARS in June of 1959. It was found that these chemically modified flours mix readily with water to form a freeflowing paste, a quality desirable in industrial paper making, USDA chemists also reported that chemically modified flour could be stored with a moisture content of a percent or less.

On the basis of recent performance tests with laboratory-scale equipment, it is expected that at east one of the acid modified flours will perform satisfactorily in high-speed paper making machines, according to workers at the ARS's Northern Utilization Research and Development Division Peoria, Ill.

Northern Laboratory scientists believe that if modified flours are introduced into the paper-making industry, substantial new markets for wheat could develop. Their interest in wheat flour for this purpose is based on availability of flour as a raw material in large quantities at relatively low cost,

Allotments For 1961 Cotton **Are Explained**

Davendecent weather these next two port, Jr., Chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, today explained the difference between the 1961 program and the one in effect for the past two cotton crops.

He pointed out that the 1961 national allotment of 18.5 million acres compares with the "regular" 1960 allotment of 16.3 mil-Sam Garland Miller, junior lion acres. All eligible growers in 1961 may receive the full available price support on their cotton, whereas in 1960 the eligible (B) growers reeived lower support but a larger creage allotment.

Because of the provisions of the law the effect of the increased national allotment on the size of the State, county, and farm allotments will vary widely. Some forms may receive no increase or possibly a reduction from the available allotment acreage 1960 primarily because operation of the minimum allotment provisions or participation in the Choice (2) program

in 1960. Growers on 1960 Choice (8) farms and on farms with allotments of 10 acres or less should keep these facts in mind when they receive their notices of 1961 upland allotments.

Davenport reminded farmers that the allotments will remain in her or nat growers approve 196 marketing quotas in the nationa referendum to be held December 13. Allotments are used as a mean of determining eligibility for th available price support.
