The cost of maintaining and operating a school program has almost doubled since the original formula was set up in 1949, he reminded, "and to reduce this amount does not appear defensible."

Big cities and other rapidly growing areas were left out of the commission's recommendations also, Bowles noted. He found no recommendation for providing state aid to such districts on the current year's school attendance, rather than the present system based on the preceding year's attendance.

The TSTA president said that TSTA will present its full program to the 57th Legislature with the knowledge that it already has the endorsement of thousands of Texas citizens.

"Recognizing the real emergency which confronts our schools, we solicit the understanding and support of this program by every Texan who is concerned with providing better educational opportunities for Texas children to meet the demands of our rapidly changing times," he declared.

The TSDA program calls for, among other things: A beginning annual salary of \$4,014 for a bachelor degree teacher (present \$3,204); an increase of \$380 per school bus; and an average increase of \$125 per teacher for maintenance and operation.

"If our schools were in comparable position with other states of the nation, these recommendations would, for the most part, be excellent," Bowles continued. "But they now fall far short of removing the lag which has built up in our program during the last five years."

Bowles expressed appreciation for the commission's efforts and for the time they have devoted to the study.

Neverless, he explained the \$3,600 minimum teacher pay proposed by the commission is \$400 short of the \$4,000 minimum which has been recommended and approved by TSTA, the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, and other organizations interested in education.

The \$4,000 minimum was presented to the Legislature in 1959 and is fully supported by recommendations which the 254 county Hale-Aikin committee made more than two years ago.

"If the full \$4,000 is approved by the Legislature, it will do no more than place Texas at average paid teachers in other states," Bowles emphasized, "since Texas is now more than \$700 below this average. A \$400 increase represents a half-step at a time when a full step is essential."

Bowles pointed out that the commission did recommend approximately the same maximum teacher salaries that have been included in the TSDA-supported program, although it would require longer to reach the maximum.

He also pointed out that the allotment for transportation, although on a slightly different formula, would involve approximately the same increase in total funds for school bus operation.

However, Bowles said the commission actually recommended a decrease in the allocation of funds for maintenance and operation of schools in districts with fewer than 75 teachers and the increase for larger districts would be extremely negligible.

That was the statement today by TSTA Pres. D. Richard Bowles of Austin. One widely circulated report erroneously stated that TSTA was fighting the commission's tax plan.

"My statement on Wednesday did not mention taxes," Bowles said. "It dealt solely with the commission's recommendations concerning public education."

"The Texas State Teachers Association has never opposed or supported any specific tax, and that position remains the same up to this moment," Bowles pointed out. "Any inference to the contrary is entirely erroneous."

Bowles said the governor's citizen commission recommended only one-half of the base increase in teacher salaries proposed by TSDA for presentation to the 57th Legislature.

"The total State expenditure for improvement of education recommended by the commission is \$57.5 million for the biennium compared with \$160 required to finance the full TSDA-Hale-Aikin program," Bowles noted.

"This would mean only \$28.7 million per year which is only one-third of the amount requested and is little more than \$10 per student," Bowles pointed out. "This will not provide material improvements in the public school system of Texas."

### Hints on Buying Holiday Turkey

Christmas is almost here, and turkey buying fever is beginning to raise. Will your dinner centerpiece be something to be proud of, or will it be a bird that does not quite fill the bill?

F. Z. Beamblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist, offers the following tips to help homemakers buy a bird that they will be proud of on these festive occasions. Factors such as body conformation, size and quality should be considered when shopping for the holiday turkey.

What should you look for in body conformation? Most important are proportions — a broad breast, deep body and medium length. Also, the legs should have bulging thighs and thick drumsticks.

How large a turkey should you buy? The size will be influenced by the number of people you expect to serve and the attitude of your family toward leftovers. Beamblossom says you should allow 1/2 pound of oven-ready turkey for each person to be served.

After you have decided on the size of turkey to buy, you should consider quality. Grade A turkeys will have an even covering of fat over the entire body. In addition to this fat, top quality birds will also be broad breasted and have bulging thighs and large drumsticks. Turkeys with these qualities will have the highest ratio of meat to bone, thus giving more edible meat for each dollar spent, the specialist points out. Blemishes such as torn skin and bruises are also factors to consider when determining quality.

Has the turkey been inspected for wholesomeness? Turkeys that have been inspected for wholesomeness under USDA supervision will be so tagged. Birds that have been graded under USDA supervision will also carry this information.

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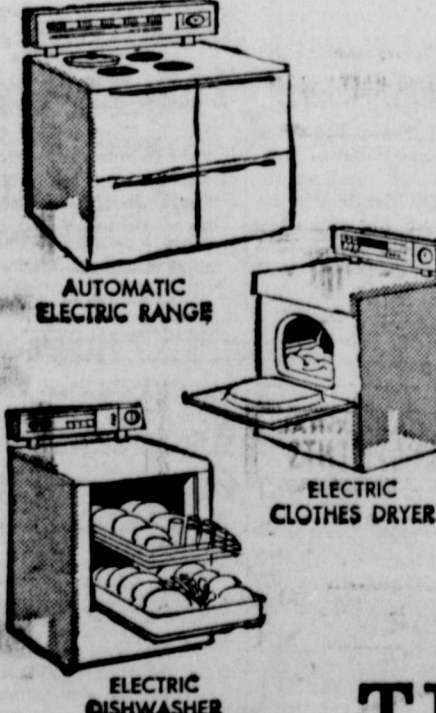
