How large a turkey should you buy? The size will be influenced by the number of people you ex pect to serve and the attitude of your family toward leftovers. ORDERS AND JUDGMENTS Beanblossom says you should alllow % pound of oven-ready turkey for each person to be served.

After you have decided on the size of turkey to buy, you should consider quality. Grade A turkeys will have an even covering of fat over the entire body. In addition to this fat, top quality birds will also be broad breasted and have bulging thighs and large drumsticks. Turkeys with these qualities will have the highest ratio of meat to bone, thus giving more edible meat for each dollar spent the specialist points out. Blemishes such as torn skin and bruises are also factors to consider when determining quality.

Has the turkey been inspected for wholesomeness? Turkeys that have been inspected for wholesomeness under USDA supervision will be so tagged. Birds that have been graded under USDA superision will also carry this informa-




