Maverick Statistics For Year Released

Statistics kept by Oran Rhodes, statistician, were released today by Jon Tate, Maverick basketball mentor, showing that Larry Hollis was the top point maker for the Mavs this season.

Hollis scored 320 points during the year for a 13.9 average. Clint Humphreys was second in line with 232 points and a 9.7 average with Otis Green close behind with 223 points and a 9.3 average. Stanley Reed scored 161 points for a 6.7 average, Philip Lewis netted 94 points for a 5.2 average, Mickey Garner got 42 points for a six point average and Don Hull had 30 points for a 2.1 average.

Green was by far the top rebounder, getting 289 balls off the backboards for a 12.04 average. Reed got 197 rebounds for an average of 13.9 and Humphreys was next in line with 72 for a 6.1 average.

Humphreys excelled in assists, getting credit for 80 during the year. Next in line was Hollis with 35 and Reed had 29.

Most accurate at the free throw line were Hollis, Reed and Humphreys. Hollis hit 58 of 95 free throws for a 61 per cent average. Reed got 47 of 88 for a 58.8 average and Humphreys got 62 of 103 for a 60 per cent average.

The team, overall, hit 433 field goals of 1196 tries for a 36.2 average. At the free throw line the Mavs got 259 of 479 for a 54.1 per cent average. Eastland out rebounded their opponents 787 to 627 for the year.

The team record was 12 wins and 12 losses.

New School Land Is Purchased by Board

Methodist Home Land Is Bought

Members of the Eastland Independent School District today announced the purchase of 30 acres of land in the south part of Eastland, and revealed that it would be used in the future as the site for a new elementary school building.

The land was purchased from the Methodist Home of Waco. It is located southwest of the football practice field and south of West Sadona. The land is undeveloped.

School Board members said that the purchase was made because members of the Board felt that it was highly desirable to get a "choice" tract of land at this time. They said several locations were checked, but that since at least 15 to 20 acres of land is needed, the selections were narrowed down.

Asked when the new school would be built, M. H. Perry, Board president, said, "When the people of Eastland are ready to build it."

There has been much talk in recent months of building one new elementary school to take the place of South Ward and West Ward. Both of the present elementary school buildings are much in need of major repair, school officials have stated.

Theatre Patrons Have Chance to Pick Winners

All theatre patrons are urged to participate, merely by checking their choices in each category, with 25 valuable theatre ticket prizes going to the 25 persons who are nearest correct in their ever-all selections. The contest is open to all during the specified period prior to the Academy Awards itself, and the 25 local winners will be notified as soon as the judges can check the ballots against the actual winners; the Awards celebrated will occur in Hollywood, of course, and will be televised as a super-spectacular, over the NBC facilities, with the Motion Picture Industry as a whole sponsoring the TV presentation, foregoing the usual long commercials which have slowed up prior Academy Award telecasts.

Motion picture producer Jerry Wald is handling the big show, with at least 90 stars promised as participants, which will aggregate practically a star a minute for the hour-and-a-half telecast.

Nominations have already been published in the various categories, but the Interstate Academy Award Sweepstakes will include only the eight top positions, and if readers have not become acquainted with the nominations as yet, they may obtain the list at any of the local Majestic as soon as the contest opens, Sunday, March 22.

There will be five nominations for each of the eight categories on the Interstate ballot, together with the check-squares opposite each nomination, which the patron will mark for his selection.

The eight categories to be included in the Academy Award Sweepstakes will be: Best Performance By An Actor; Best Performance By An Actress; Best Supporting Role; Best Motion Picture; Best Achievement In Directing; Best Song; Best Original Story and Screen Play.



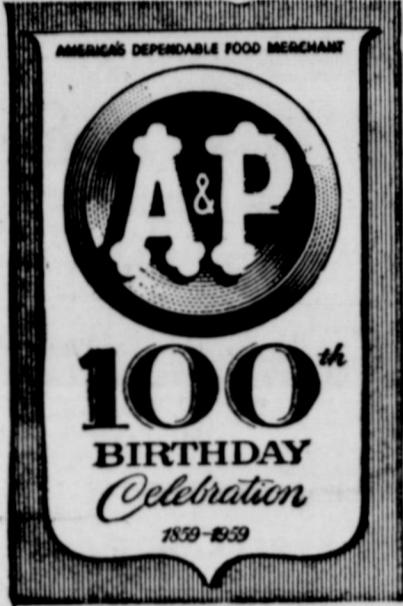

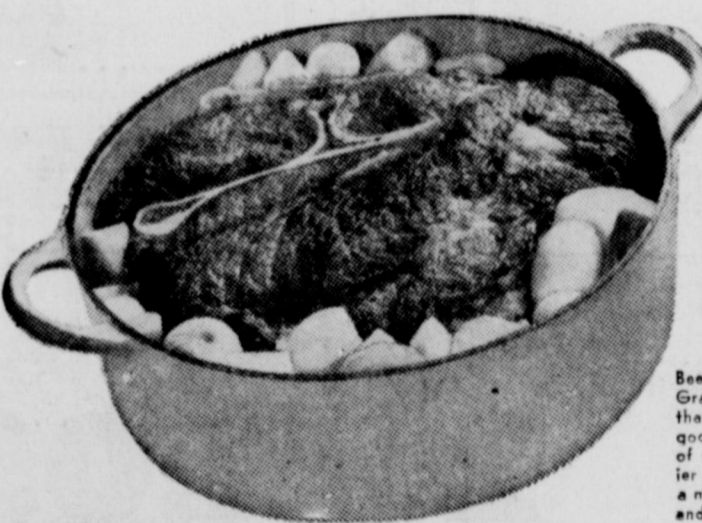
