Members of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, the Sheriff's Posse and the Posse Anns are proud as proud can be of their new show grounds.

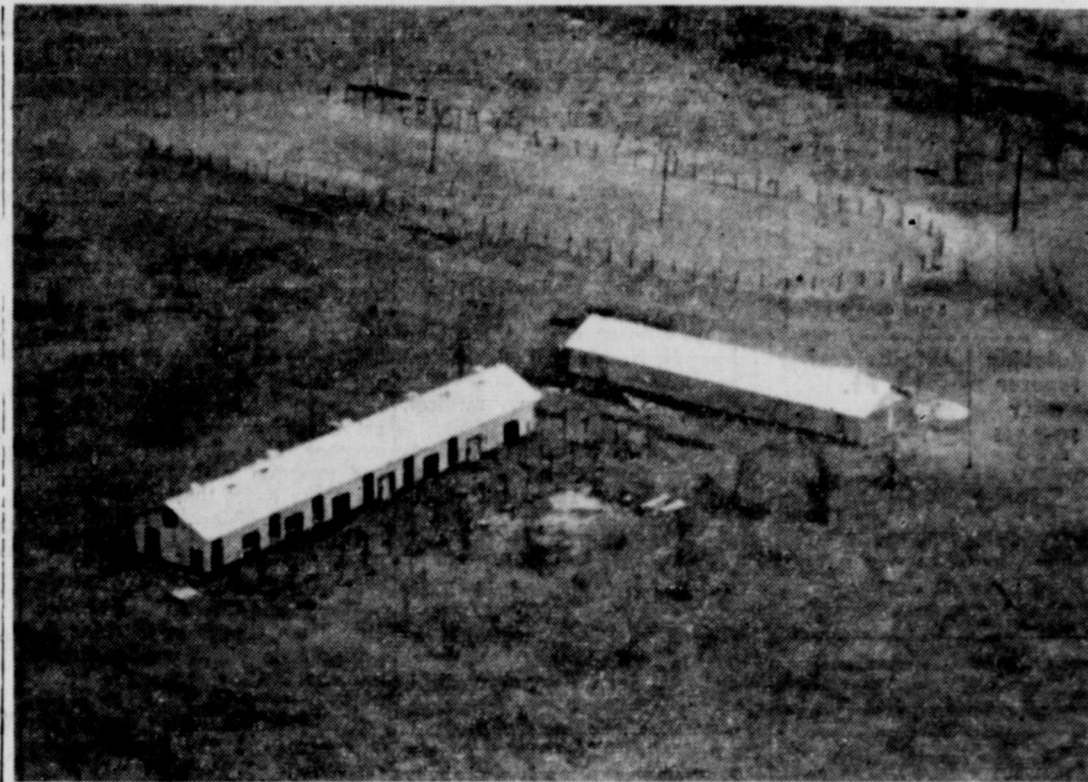
It is a race against time, however, to get the new layout completed before the County Livestock Show, which is to be held March 20-21.

Mrs. Johnnie Aaron, an active member of the Posse Anns (her husband is assistant show superintendent this year), puts it this way.

# Stock Show Grounds Nearing Completion

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## County Stock Show Judges Are Named

All fat animals entered in the Annual Eastland County Livestock Show, in March 20-21 will be judged on a packer basis according to Ed Harrison, Gorman, President of the County Livestock Raisers Association.

A total of 311 fat animals have been entered of which 156 are lambs, 27 are steers and 126 are fat pigs.

These animals will be sold at auction on the night of March 21 at the Eastland Auction Barn.

A registered Hereford heifer will be given away at the time of the auction. The animal was given to the livestock association by Harrison, who is prominent Hereford breeder. The heifer, presented at Faircloth Feed Store in Eastland, will be on exhibit at the stock show.

Jim Tom Warden of Abilene and W. E. Steele Jr. of Graham will judge beef cattle.

Warden, born and reared in Eastland, is a Texas Tech. College

graduate where he was on the livestock judging team. He has been a buyer for one of the largest meat packing firms for the past eight years.

Steele, graduate of Texas A. & M., was on the livestock judging team of that institution, was a former assistant county agent for Hill and Eastland counties. He has been ranching northeast of Graham in that county for the past several years.

Dr. R. M. Anderson Fort Worth, one of the outstanding hog judges in the state, will judge all of the same in the show.

Charles Bell, Brownwood, will judge the dairy cattle & Jack Hancock, Tuscola, will judge the fat lambs, Hancock has judged here for the past years. O. B. Edmondson, Cross Plains Agric. teacher, will judge the goats and the other classes of sheep besides the fat lambs.

## Moon and Venus... ...Court In Sky

Eastland County Citizens, just like a lot of other people, got plenty excited last night when the Planet Venus and the Moon did some close-up courting in the western sky.

Actually the moon and Venus, or the evening star, were a lot further apart than they seemed. The moon is just approximately 238,000 miles from earth, but Venus follows an orbit ranging from 26 to 160 million miles from our planet.

Telephones started ringing off the hook at the Police Station in Eastland and at the Telegram editor's home. A. L. Carmack, who was on the police dispatch desk said he received some 25 or 30 calls. Virgil Moore, Telegram editor, didn't keep a count on his calls, but was kept busy.

Many of the callers thought that either the United States or Russia had scored a direct hit on the moon with a space rocket. Others believed it might be a fire on the moon.

Jim Golden, of the Texas Electric Light Plant, recalled that he and other TESCO workers saw the same thing happen in "about 1930."

United States Weather Bureau authorities say Venus and the Moon get together about every three years, but that when the moon is full the planet can't be seen.

## Horton Getting Plenty of 'Shots' At Wild Animals

Just returned from off a six day safari on the interior of Africa. We left the ship at Capetown and caught it again at Durban. What a country. We covered about 2500 miles via train, motor car and Vis Count turbo jet planes. Turilo jet planes in "darkest Africa." We don't have too many yet in the U.S. and none in Texas.

This is a land of contrasts. I don't have time or inclination to tell you about the diamond mines at Kimberley, or the fabulous Capetown. Johannesburg a city of ever one million with 30 gold mines in sight like oil wells in the old days of Breckenridge. Or the beautiful capitol—Pretoria. I got the biggest kick, naturally out of Kruger Park. It is a small piece of land, according to African standards—about 40 miles wide and 200 miles long, and full of wild game. I must have seen over 1000 head and plenty of big bucks which is something to we local hunters who are used to straining our eyeballs looking for horns on the does "below the hill."

I got the buck ague twice as bad as I ever had with a 30-06. Once on a magnificent bull Kudu rot over 25 feet away. From the ground to the tip of his horns must have been eight feet. Another time a herd of seven giraffes crossed the road and one of them—the old bull—could and was eating out of the tops of 20 foot trees. He was about the biggest wild thing I have ever seen. His body was as big as a speckled brown and yellow barn door. My hand shook so bad I could hardly hold the camera and they all came so close that they would not go into the picture. WOW!

Victoria Falls was beyond words. One of the seven natural wonders of the world. Picture a wall of water falling 400 feet into a gorge and the falls were about 1600 feet wide. Terrific!

When you receive this I hope to be in Nairobi, Kenya Taking more animal pictures.

## Grain Study Is Completed

COLLEGE STATION—A study was recently completed on the importance, location of products and trends for the seven principal grains grown in Texas.

Clarence Moore, Department of Agriculture Economics and Sociology, Texas A & M College, made a report of the findings of this study to SM-11, a Southern Regional Grain Marketing Research Project group.

Moore pointed out that the average yield per acre of grain sorghum during 1953-57 was almost twice that of the 1935-39 period. Annual variations were large, but yields showed a rising trend over the 23-year period.

"There are several reasons for this," he explained. "Use of improved varieties, increased use of irrigation and more widespread planting of superior hybrids had a lot to do with the higher yield. Better cultural practices and wiser use of fertilizer also helped. Too,

acres diverted from cotton and corn to sorghum in the last few years may have been more productive."

The study also revealed average acreage and production of corn during 1953-57 were only about one-half that of 1935-39. Corn declined from 52 percent of the state's total feed grain production during 1935-39 to 16 percent in 1953-57 while grain sorghum increased from 20 percent to over

70 percent. Moore attributes this mainly to the fact that grain sorghum has been in an economically favorable condition over corn due to lower production costs.

Wheat has declined and rice has increased in relative importance since 1950. Moore says this is mostly due to the fact that rice has had a more favorable market since the war, while there has been a surplus of wheat.

Pickles Can Solve Sandwich Problems for You

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

Pickles are an inexpensive addition to sandwiches. They give a big lift to fillings and also contain a good amount of vitamin C.

To keep left-over pickles crisp and tangy, store in their own liquid.

**Cheese-Pickle Special**  
(Four sandwiches)

One 3-ounce package cream cheese, softened; 1/2 cup grated Cheddar cheese; 1/4 cup chopped, sweet, mixed pickles; 2 tablespoons milk; salt and pepper to taste; 8 slices bread with butter or margarine; crisp lettuce.

Combine cream cheese, Cheddar cheese, pickles, milk and salt and pepper; mix well. Spread on four slices bread. Top with lettuce and remaining bread slices.

**Pickle-Peanut Butter**  
(Four servings)

One 3-ounce package cream cheese, softened; 1/2 cup peanut butter, 1/4 cup chopped, sweet, mixed pickles; 8 slices bread, with butter or margarine.

Combine cheese, peanut butter and pickles; mix well. Spread on bread to make sandwiches.

**Pickle Variety Sandwich**  
(Six servings)

One 8-ounce package cream cheese, softened; 1 cup grated Cheddar cheese—(about 1/4 pound)—2 tablespoons chopped, canned pimiento; 8 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled; 1/2 cup chopped dill pickles, 1/4 cup honey, 2 tablespoons mayonnaise, 12 slices bread, with butter or margarine.

Combine cheeses, pimiento, bacon, pickles, honey and

mayonnaise; mix well. Spread pickle mixture on bread.

**Kraut-Corned Beef**  
(Eight sandwiches)

One 1-pound, 11-ounce can sauerkraut, drained; 1/2 cup commercial sour cream, 1 tablespoon

prepared mustard, 1 tablespoon grated onion, 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, 8 slices cooked, corned beef; 16 slices bread.

Combine kraut, cream, mustard, onion and Worcestershire sauce; mix well. Arrange kraut mixture and beef on bread.

Silage Is Possible From Grasses, Clovers

COLLEGE STATION — Highly palatable silage can be made from spring grasses and clover when conditions are not favorable for hay making, report research work-

ers of the Agricultural Engineering Department of the Texas A&M College System.

The use of plastic covers and sodium bisulfite preservative reduced spoilage and improved silage quality, the research workers said.

The studies conducted at the Rice - Pasture Experiment Station, near Beaumont, showed that good silage can be produced when weather conditions during the spring season are unfavorable for hay

making. Farm size silos, incorporating the better known methods of silage making, were used in the tests. The silos used included a 70-ton bunker, two plastic bag silos with capacities of 10 and 25 tons and three horizontal, plastic covered stacks of about 30 tons capacity.

Spoilage losses were higher in 1958 in the plastic bag silos due to difficulties encountered in packing the low moisture silage and from air getting into the bags from punctures in the plastic during the filling operations and from mice damage. In 1957 tests when high moisture silage was put into

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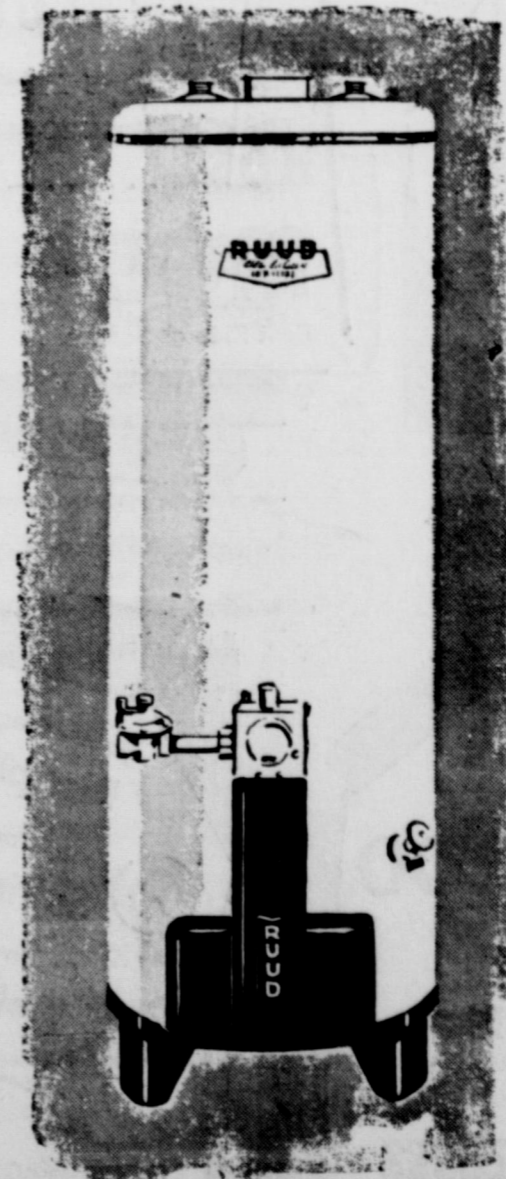
