Boiling all the drinking water is the biggest chore. The water tastes good and is very soft, very unusual for a mining camp.

We have a maid now. She is a good worker, a little on the slow side, but she gets the job done She is part Indian which makes it difficult for us to understand her (of course she speakes Span ish). It's not what she says, but the way she phrases that throws us. However, we are picking it up gradually. Homer likes the work situation

fine - the most modern equipment and a fine bunch of men to work with - so what more could you ask for? And it is simply amazing to see what unskilled and untrained Peruvian men have been able to do. They hope to have the mill in operation by September, but that remains to be seen for it's still under construction.







What is NATO? It stands for North Atlantic Treaty Organization, an alliance of 15 free nations, including the United States, which have banded together to protect themselves against aggression. These nations are Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Greece, Iceland, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands. Norway, Portugal, Turkey, the United Kingdom and the United States.



What is its purpose? Primarily, NATO is a military alliance, but its great purpose is peace, not war. The 15 members of NATO have pledged that they will regard an attack upon any
