

Work will begin as soon as contractors are selected.

At a recent meeting of the committee it was decided that individual contracts would be let for various improvements such as the heating- cooling system, paneling, carpeting and plumbing, Mrs. Childress explained.

Contractors will be selected as the project progresses and the building becomes ready for the improvement. Information about bidding may be obtained from Dan Childress or Carl

Each participant will have an opportunity to learn about these vital areas and to contribute his own thoughts and Discussion experiences. groups will be led by Extension Service Specialists.



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now beginning to have potatoes from their gardens. If you find that you are going to have an abundant crop, you might like to freeze some. A good way to freeze potatoes is to freeze french fries. This is an easy method with the family will really enjoy! First, select mature potatoes suitable for French frying. Wash, pare and cut into ¼ inch uniform strips. Heat in boiling water 2 minutes or blanch in steam 3 minutes. Chill in cold water 3 minutes. Drain and tumble dry in towel. Fill fry kettle one- third full of 1 fat and heat to 360 degrees F., keeping the fry basket in the fat. Raise basket and add potato strips to cover bottom of basket. Lower basket into fat and fry until strips are cooked but not brown. Remove basket from fat and drain potato strips before turning out on paper towels. Cool strips to room temperature, package and freeze immediately. Store no longer than 3 or 4 months for best quality. When ready to use, just fry or brown in oven. The local County Extension

Homewoners who have elm trees in their yards should keep a watchful eye on the trees to spot infestations of elm leaf Several people in

Eastland County have reported infestations last week. The beetles are a serious pest

The adult beetles are oval and about a quarter of an inch long. They are yellowish to of elm trees as they eat the olive- green in color with a surface of the leaves, leaving black stripe along each side of

skeletonized leaves turn brown and eventually fall from the trees. The damage weakens the trees and makes them more susceptible to borers that attack elm.

trees. Trees often have to be sprayed several times because there are at least three or more generations of beetles a year. High- pressure, highvolume sprayers are necessary to completely cover the foliage. Some degree of control can be obtained by spraying the trunk and lower limbs when the larvae move down to the

ground to pupate. The insecticides recommended for the control of the leaf beetles are Carbaryl (Sevin), Chlordane, Dieldrin, Lead arsenate and Toxaphene. Carbaryl is probably the safest to use around the home Be sure to follow the manufacturer's directions for mixing and applying the sprays.

Another problem that people have been calling about is that "white stuff" on the favorite rose or crepe myrtle. The "White Stuff' is probably powdery mildew, a mold that first appears as whitish patches on leaves and then spreads over the entire leaf. Such surface growth produces thousands of fungal spores daily. Winds

carry these spores long distances to infest other plants. Particularly susceptible are photinia, rose, crepe myrtle, verbena, euonytheus and zinnia

Products containing Benomyl, a relatively new systemic material, are some of the best controls. Other materials including Folpet,

Phaltan, Karathane and Actidione PM are also effective. Unfortunately, not allfungicides will control powdery mildew. Check the label to see if the product contains one of the suggested materials.

Generally a spray schedule of every 10 to 14 days is required. Follow the directions on the label of each material used and handle all with care. After use, the containers should be properly stored or disposed oif empty

If you feel the response to your request from the local Extension Service office has been slow, we apologize. For the last month or two we have been without an assistant agent and a secretary. Because of our shortage of personnel we have been unable unable to assist you as much as we would

A program to remind farmers of the need to use chemical pesticides safely is now underway in Texas and 13 other Southern states. The program known as "Project Safeguard," is designed to emphasize the safe use d chemical insecticides being used as substitutes for DDT. and of other less persistent but generally more toxic insecticides, according to DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent. DDT is no longer registered 59¢ by the state and Federal 57¢ Regulatory agencies for agricultural use in Texas. Insecticides used as susub stitutes for ddt are less per-

sistent but generally more toxic


