Night classes on Monday-Wednesday will be History of the U. S. to 1865, Readings in English Literature, Introduction to Economics, and General Psychology. Tuesday-Thursday night courses to be held will include College Algebra, English Composition and Rhetoric, National Government, Principles of Sociology, and Basic Photography.

The college's low state tuition rates will apply to summer courses, Mr. Scott explained. A three-hour course will cost \$35.25, four hours totals \$44.00, six is \$65.50, and a seven-hour maximum load costs \$74.25.

All classes are held in air-conditioned facilities, Scott said.

Mr. Scott also pointed out that a class must have at least ten students in order to be held, and that any course listed in the CJC catalogue can be offered if there is a demand of ten or more students desiring the class, whether or not it is on the summer schedule.

The Cisco College also has summer school extension programs in Graham and Coleman, and information about these programs may be obtained by contacting the Admissions Office at CJC.

The Monday registration hours will be 8:00 to 12:00, 1:00 to 4:00, and night school registration 6:00-7:00.

## Rodeo Queen Entries Are Now Being Accepted

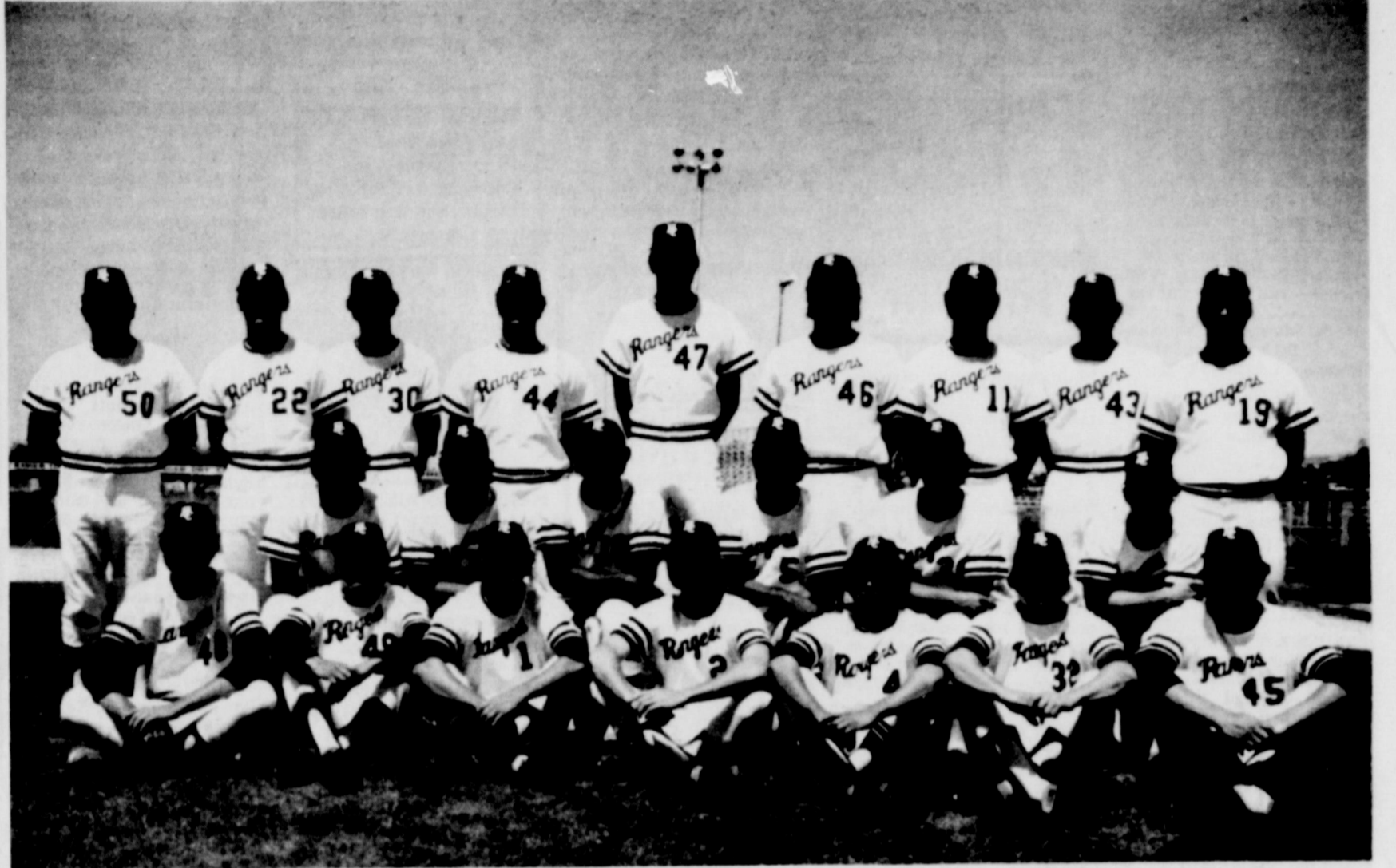

## RJC Rangers Top Team In National Junior College Athletic Association

Freshman righthander Donnie Moore of Lubbock, the tournament's Most Valuable Player, fired a two-hitter here Thursday night in leading the Ranger Rangers to a 5-0 win over Gulf Coast Panama City, Fla. in taking the 16th National championship game.

The win was Moore's fourth of the tourney setting a personal victory record. Moore gave up a line single to right in the third and an infield roller in the fifth for Gulf Coast's only hit.

Moore also aided his cause as Ranger came up with all five runs in the bottom of fourth. Leading 3-0, Moore ripped a triple off the 355-foot mark in right center to make it 5-0 as first baseman Don Flowers and

shortstop Jerry Gonzalez scored from second and first respectively. Moore's booming smash missed being a three-run homer by just six inches.

Bids for roofing and outside remodeling are being invited and considered by the Building Committee of the Centennial Memorial Library, Mrs. Dan Childress said Friday. Mrs. Childress is president of the Thursday Afternoon Study Club which is sponsoring the new library.

Work will begin as soon as contractors are selected. At a recent meeting of the committee it was decided that individual contracts would be let for various improvements such as the heating-cooling system, paneling, carpeting and plumbing, Mrs. Childress explained.

Contractors will be selected as the project progresses and the building becomes ready for the improvement. Information about bidding may be obtained from Dan Childress or Carl Garrett.

Reports at the recent meeting confirmed that the remodeling will cost approximately \$15,000 as originally estimated.

At the present time the fund has received a total of \$18,980 with \$15,000 of that amount already spent to purchase the building at 210 S. Lamar.

# On the Farm

Eastland County will have a role in the dedication of the Texas Farm Bureau's new \$2.7 million headquarters building in Waco June 13.

A sample of Eastland County soil will be mixed with soil brought in from the other 209 counties that have organized county Farm Bureaus. The collection of earth will be placed around a pecan tree that is to be planted on the grounds of the building at 7420 Fish Pond Road.

Jack Cozart, president of the local county Farm Bureau, will take the soil to Waco. He will attend a conference of county presidents being held in Waco in connection with "Farm Bureau Week" in Texas.

A time capsule that will be buried in front of the new Texas Farm Bureau structure will contain the names of the more than 140,000 member families of the Texas Farm Bureau as well as the

signatures of officers and directors of the Texas Farm Bureau and all of the County presidents in attendance. It will also include other historic items.

A delegation of some 10 persons from this county is expected to go to Waco for the day's activities. They will attend the dedication program and open house that afternoon and the giant barbecue dinner climaxed the day-long activities that evening.

Attending from this county will be: Mr. and Mrs. Jack Cozart, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Fry, Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Maynard, Mr. and Mrs. Cyrus Justice, Ray A. Norris and Buddy Aaron.

Governor Dolph Briscoe will be dedication speaker. Others on the program include Waco Congressman W.R. (Bob) Poage, chairman of the U.S. House Agriculture Committee; and Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz will address the dinner audience that evening in Waco

Convention Center.

The dedication, open house, barbecue on June 13 are feature events of the week of June 10-16 which has been designated by Governor Briscoe as "Farm Bureau Week" in Texas.

A county presidents' Conference will be held June 12-13 in Waco, while service agents will have an awards banquet on the evening of June 12. On June 14, servicing agents for the Texas Farm Bureau's group purchase program will tour the General Tire Plant in Waco and hold a business meeting.

**4-H NEWS**

About 100 4-H boys and girls and adult leaders will take a closer look at ecology and the use of natural resources when they gather at the H.E. Butt Foundation Camp at Leakey, Texas, June 19-22.

The event is the seventh annual Texas 4-H Ecology Conference.

Taronna Chambers and William Farnsworth will represent Eastland County at the conference. Darlene Donham was selected as a

District alternate to the camp.

The purpose of the conference is to provide participants and opportunity to get closer to nature, to develop a better understanding of our natural resources, and to discuss and learn ways to utilize these resources more effectively and efficiently.

Group discussions throughout the three- and a-half day conference will center around environmental quality, forestry, outdoor recreation, range, soil and water, wildlife. Each participant will have an opportunity to learn about these vital areas and to contribute his own thoughts and experiences. Discussion groups will be led by Extension Service Specialists.

Guest speakers at the conference will be Dr. Fred Smeins, associate professor in the Department of Range Science at Texas A & M University; Bob Ramsey, a rancher at Bunt; Wayne Hamilton, business manager of the Chaparrosa Ranch at La Pryor; and the Honorable John Bigham, state representative from Temple who is chairman of the Environmental Affairs Committee.

Cooperating with the Extension Service and the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation in sponsoring the event is the Federal Cartridge Corporation, Minneapolis, Minnesota. The Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board of Temple is sponsoring a special banquet and the H.E. Butt Foundation is providing the use of its camp.

**HD NEWS**

The Home Demonstration Council will meet this coming Wednesday, June 5th in the Eastland National Bank Civic Room in Eastland at 2 p.m. New officers for the coming year will be installed. New officers include: Chairman- Mrs. R.W. Gordon, of Ranger; Vice-Chairman- Mrs. D.F. Eaves, of Kokomo; Treasurer- Mrs. Guy Sherrill, of Eastland; and Secretary- Mrs. Bernard Campbell, of Carbon.

Many home gardeners are now beginning to have potatoes from their gardens. If you find that you are going to have an abundant crop, you might like to freeze some. A good way to freeze potatoes is to freeze french fries. This is an easy method with the family will really enjoy! First, select mature potatoes suitable for French frying. Wash, pare and cut into 1/4 inch uniform strips. Heat in boiling water 2 minutes or blanch in steam 3 minutes. Chill in cold water 3 minutes. Drain and tumble dry in towel. Fill fry kettle one-third full of fat and heat to 360 degrees F., keeping the fry basket in the fat. Raise basket and add potato strips to cover bottom of basket. Lower basket into fat and fry until strips are cooked but not brown. Remove basket from fat and drain potato strips before turning out on paper towels. Cool strips to room temperature, package and freeze immediately. Store no longer than 3 or 4 months for best quality. When ready to use, just fry or brown in oven.

The local County Extension Office has an ample supply of free bulletins on canning and freezing of fruits and vegetables which are available to the public upon request.

# Gordon Spot

Homewoners who have elm trees in their yards should keep a watchful eye on the trees to spot infestations of elm leaf beetles. Several people in

Eastland County have reported infestations last week. The beetles are a serious pest of elm trees as they eat the surface of the leaves, leaving

only the veins. The skeletonized leaves turn brown and eventually fall from the trees. The damage weakens the trees and makes them more susceptible to borers that attack elm. The adult beetles are oval and about a quarter of an inch long. They are yellowish to olive-green in color with a black stripe along each side of

the wing covers. The beetles lay yellow eggs on the undersides of elm leaves. Full-grown larvae are about half an inch long, dull yellow in color with black stripes on the back, and have a distinct black head. Although many insecticides will kill the adult and larvae beetles, the major problem is thorough coverage of infested

trees. Trees often have to be sprayed several times because there are at least three or more generations of beetles a year. High-pressure, high-volume sprayers are necessary to completely cover the foliage. Some degree of control can be obtained by spraying the trunk and lower limbs when the larvae move down to the

ground to pupate. The insecticides recommended for the control of the leaf beetles are Carbaryl (Sevin), Chlordane, Dieldrin, Lead arsenate and Toxaphene. Carbaryl is probably the safest to use around the home. Be sure to follow the manufacturer's directions for mixing and applying the sprays.

Another problem that people have been calling about is that "white stuff" on the favorite rose or crepe myrtle. The "White Stuff" is probably powdery mildew, a mold that first appears as whitish patches on leaves and then spreads over the entire leaf. Such surface growth produces thousands of fungal spores daily. Winds

carry these spores long distances to infest other plants. Particularly susceptible are photinia, rose, crepe myrtle, verbena, euonymus and zinnia. Products containing Benomyl, a relatively new systemic material, are some of the best controls. Other materials including Folpet, Phalton, Karathane and Actidione PM are also effective. Unfortunately, not all fungicides will control powdery mildew. Check the label to see if the product contains one of the suggested materials. Generally a spray schedule of every 10 to 14 days is required. Follow the directions on the label of each material used and handle all with care. After use, the containers should be properly stored or disposed of empty.

If you feel the response to your request from the local Extension Service office has been slow, we apologize. For the last month or two we have been without an assistant agent and a secretary. Because of our shortage of personnel we have been unable to assist you as much as we would like. We are happy to announce that we now have two new assistant agents. Arlene Hawkins has been working with Janet Thomas since May 15. On June 1 Milton Kellner began his job in our office. We have a lot of confidence in Milton's ability and we know he will make a significant contribution to the Extension program in Eastland County. We hope you will be able to meet him soon.

A program to remind farmers of the need to use chemical pesticides safely is now underway in Texas and 13 other Southern states. The program known as "Project Safeguard," is designed to emphasize the safe use of chemical insecticides being used as substitutes for DDT, and of other less persistent but generally more toxic insecticides, according to DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent. DDT is no longer registered by the state and Federal Regulatory agencies for agricultural use in Texas. Insecticides used as substitutes for DDT are less persistent but generally more toxic and may represent a greater hazard to persons handling, mixing, applying or otherwise exposed to the chemicals. "Project Safeguard" activities in Eastland County will include special emphasis on insecticide selection and safe use as a part of meetings and other educational activities relating to the use of insecticides. Additional activities will include the use of posters and special publications describing the safe use of insecticides. A "Project Safeguard" program aide will be employed by the Extension Service to work in Eastland County beginning within the next two weeks and continuing through most of the growing season. This aide will contact county peanut farmers to provide information essential for the safe use of insecticides. The aide will work 54 eight hour days. Any one interested in working as an aide and who has some experience in peanut farming and using insecticides should contact Gordon at the County Extension Office in Eastland.

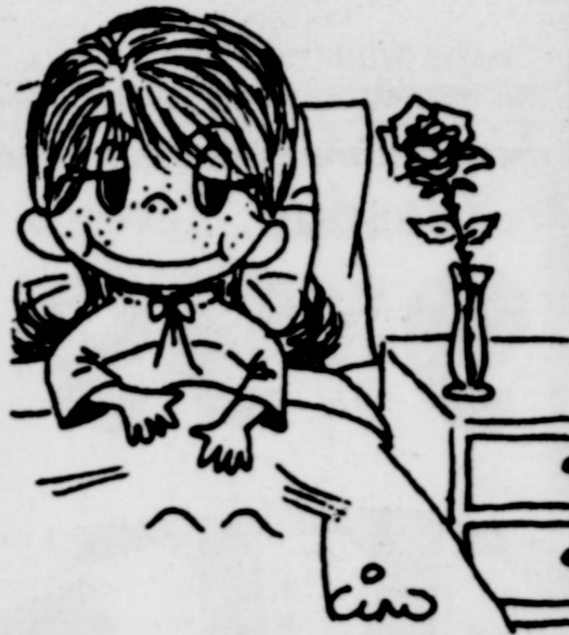

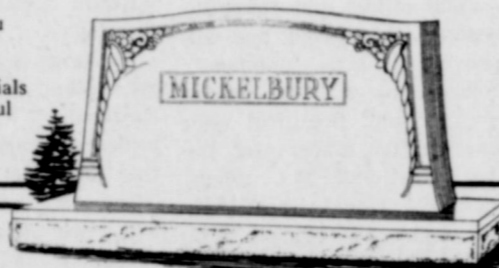

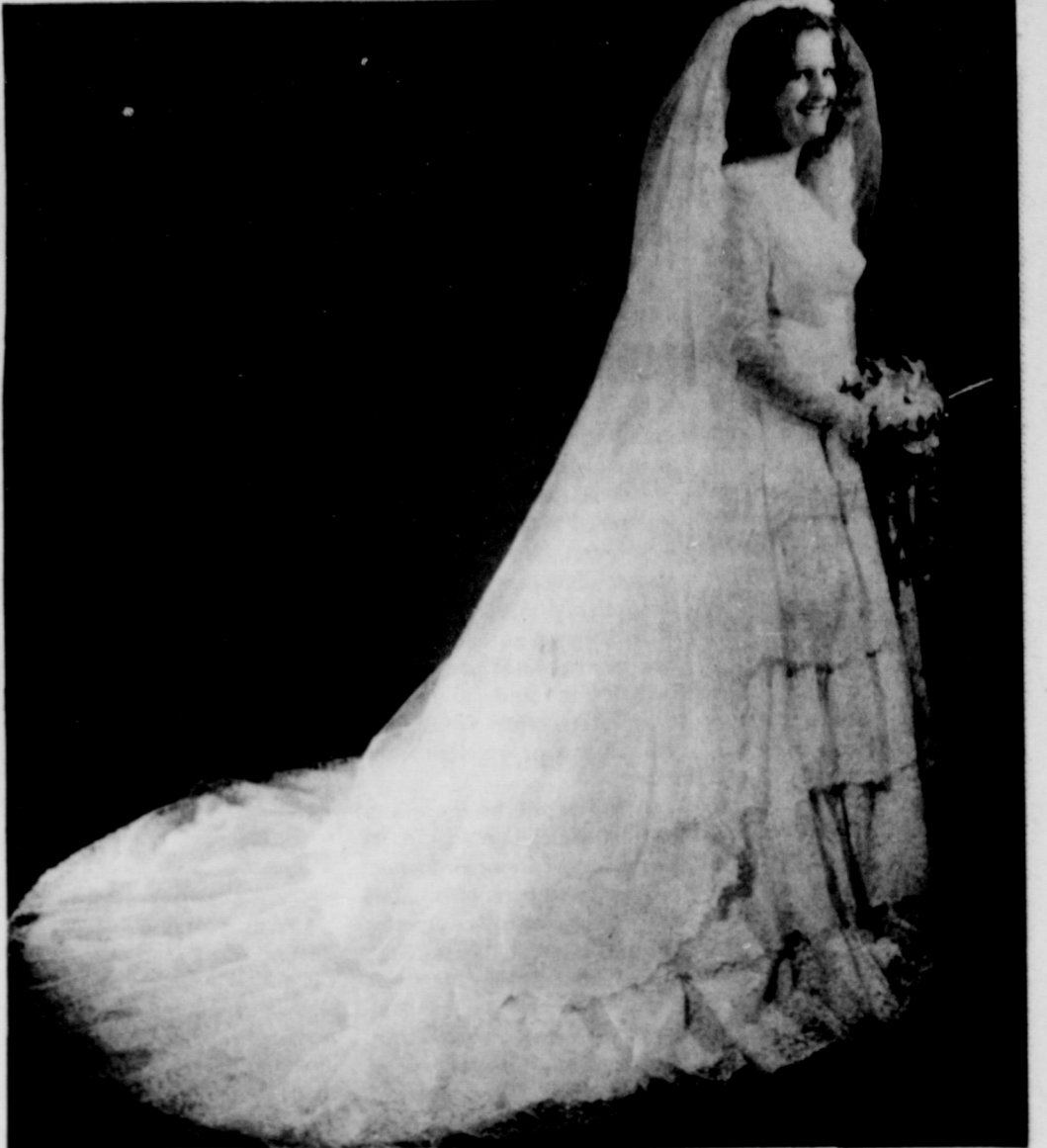

Mrs. Frailey wore a floor length mint green empire dress with ruffles around the neck and sleeves. She wore white accessories and a white glamelia corsage.

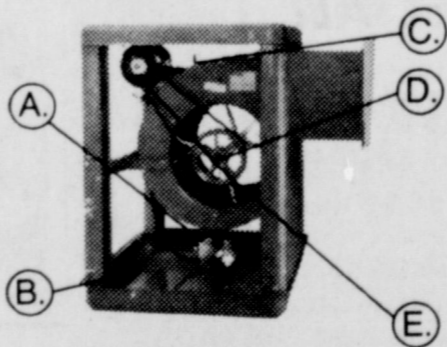
