## Million Dollar Bank Deposit Increase Noted

Eastland County bank deposits showed a substantial—almost one million dollars—increase during the past year, reports of banks in answer to a call issued by state and federal banking authorities showed this week.

Deposits in the five county banks totaled \$14,841,069 June 10, compared to deposits of \$13,885,709 in June, 1958. That is an increase of \$995,360 in deposits.

### Three Eastland Students Taking Summer Courses

Three Eastland residents are attending summer school at Hardin-Simmons University. Enrolled at H-SU are James Allison, son of J. C. Allison, 1008 W. Commerce; Stanley Nance Blevins, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Blevins, Jr.; and Burl J. Bailey, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Bailey. Summer school includes two six week terms and four three-week sessions. Enrollment for the first six weeks, including the initial three-week term, totals 496 students, an increase of six percent over the same period a year ago. The summer session will end with commencement exercises on Aug. 21.

Forty-seven regular Hardin-Simmons faculty members and five visiting teachers are on the summer staff. The guest lecturers are L. Wynne Campbell and Richard J. Giesse, both of the staff of the Abilene State School; Edward Vann Tapscott, assistant principal of Abilene's South Junior High; Dr. Lloyd D. Huff, chairman of the English Department at McMurry College; and Floyd W. Parsons, superintendent of Big Spring schools.

Loans and discounts for the five banks in Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Gorman and Rising Star, were listed at \$4,387,297.

The Eastland National Bank showed the largest gain in deposits. The Eastland bank listed deposits of \$3,910,736. A year ago deposits totaled just \$3,564,459, thus the bank had a net increase of \$346,277.

While the Eastland bank was the leader in increased deposits, all five banks in the county showed good gains. The Cisco First National Bank, which ranked second behind the Eastland National in gains, maintained its lead in total deposits. Deposits there were listed at \$4,138,073. That's a gain of \$187,279 in deposits since June, 1958, when they totaled just \$3,950,794.

The First National Bank of Gorman and the First State Bank of Rising Star both showed large increases. The Gorman bank listed deposits at \$1,868,328, or \$161,062 above a year ago when deposits were \$1,707,266.

The Rising Star bank increased deposits by \$157,909, from \$2,332,310 to \$2,490,219.

Deposits at the Ranger Commercial State Bank increased from \$2,330,880 to \$2,433,713, for a gain of \$102,833.

Mr. McCarty was a past president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and had served on the Texas Tech board of regents. He had practiced law in Eastland, Dallas and San Angelo. In San Angelo he served as county and district judge.

Survivors include his second wife, Leah Irion; a daughter, Mrs. W. Dan Latimer Jr. of Mount Pleasant; and a son, Milburn Jr. of New York.

### Entire County Voted Dry In Last Election

The Abilene Reporter-News, in a front page story this morning, raised the question are Eastland, Ranger and Cisco legally wet in view of a recent liquor law decision of the State Supreme Court.

The Reporter-News said that some county citizens believe the three towns may be legally wet because when the county voted dry in 1939 the three towns voted wet.

A check by this newspaper this morning revealed, however, that when the last beer election was held in the county, every precinct voted dry. That was in 1948, when wets petitioned for an election.

Overall, that year, the vote was 4833 against sale of beer and 2571 for. Eastland voted dry by a margin of 870 to 517 and Cisco voters said no to the tune of 1120 to 699.

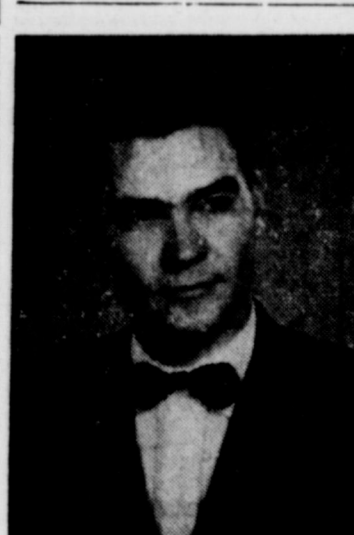
In 1939 the three towns did vote wet.

Wheeler asserted that it is impossible to stand still. He said industrial development is everybody's business and urged a consistent program over a long period of time.

He pointed out that competition is fierce, and told his listeners to get their house in order before seeking new industries.

He urged Eastland citizens to check local streets, schools, recreation areas, future planning, home lawns, vacant lots, local government, parks and teamwork.

President Robert Perkins presided over the meeting, which was held in the White Elephant restaurant.

Harold Lloyd Bildeback of Dallas has been elected head of the music department of Ranger College.

Bildeback is a graduate of North Texas State College in Denton, where he received both his Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees, majoring in composition. He taught band and orchestra in the Amarillo School District, and for the last three semesters he has been teaching classroom piano, band and orchestra in the Dallas Independent School District.

Born in Amarillo, July 27, 1931, Bildeback was brought up in Denison, where at the age of eight he taught himself to read music and at 12 wrote his first symphony. His formal musical education began at the age of 15 with Thelma Braun, student of Silvio Scioni, internationally renowned pianist.

All through his school years, Bildeback played the piano for various organizations. In high school band he played French horn, tuba, percussion, and solo piano. He also played piano in his high school dance band, and was organist for the Lutheran Church for two and a half years.

He was president of the band and sang in the high school chorus. He entered Interscholastic League competition in music at North Texas State College and won first place two years. He also won the Denison Young Artists' Contest for two years.

After finishing high school, he auditioned at the Naval School of Music, in Washington, D. C., and was accepted into the Navy Band. While in the service, he was part of a duo-piano recital in Washington and gave concerts in Pasadena, Los Angeles, Long Beach and San Francisco, Calif., as well as in Japan, Hong Kong and Hawaii.

Another golf tournament will be held in connection with the homecoming. Neil Day will chairman the committee to make arrangements and plans for this tournament.

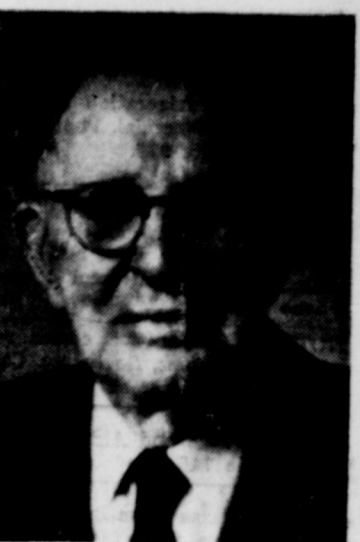
Vice President Gene (Governor) Harrison was assigned to supervise the selection of music and entertainment for the two or three dances to be held the Saturday night of the homecoming.

## J. U. Johnson Celebrates His 90th Birthday

J. U. Johnson, who was in business here for 30 years before retiring in 1948, celebrated his 90th birthday this month. Johnson was born in Campbell County, Ga., and moved to Alabama when he was 14. He was born June 2, 1869. In 1892 he moved to Texas and settled near Anson. He was in business in Baird for several years, then moved to Eastland in May of 1918.

Upon moving here, he bought the E. Roper General Merchandise store, which was located where King Motor Co. now is. In 1930 he purchased Davis Bakery and operated the bakery until his retirement. He was 80 years old when a heart attack forced him to retire.

After his retirement he continued to attend church regularly, missing only three Sunday in three years. This past year he has been unable to attend church regularly, however, due to illness.

## County Charity Costs Down

Eastland County Commissioners have tightened their hold on money being spent for charities, but the flow of money will still exceed this year's budget if even tighter controls are not put into force.

That's what a check of expenditures during the first five months of this year would reveal. Expenditures for direct charity in the county so far, at the end of May, totaled \$3,380. That is a substantial decrease in spending as compared to the first five months of 1958 when the charity bill totaled \$4,781. To be exact, it is a savings of \$1,401.

However, this year's budget calls for expenditures of just \$5,450 during the entire year. That means that only \$2,070 can be spent during the last seven months of the year. If spending continues at the same pace that it did during the period from January through May, total expenditures for the year for charity in 1959 will be \$8,112, or \$2,662 above the budget appropriation. This is based on the first five month average of \$676 per month spending.

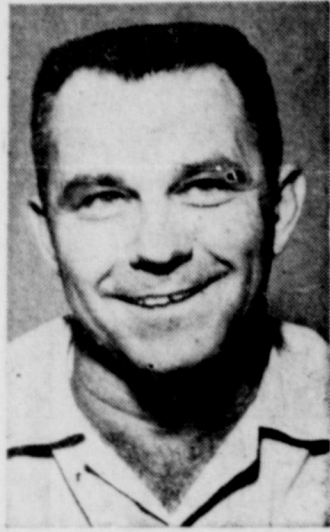

### Stamford Man Is Named Baptist Father of the Year

DALLAS (Spl.) — Alton McClellan, a 37-year-old Stamford father of three children who manages a full-time business from a wheelchair, has been named the 1959 Texas Baptist Father of the Year, denominational leaders said here Wednesday.

McClellan says he believes fathers should play more with their children and be more liberal with old-fashioned discipline when it is needed.

A victim of infantile paralysis

for 16 years, McClellan and his family lead normal lives, filled with hobbies, music lessons and church activities.

Jointly sponsored by the Baptist Standard, state denominational newspaper, and the 1 1/2 million-member Baptist General Convention of Texas, the award is made each year to honor Texas Baptist fathers who have made outstanding contributions to Christianity.

Life as McClellan now knows it began during World War II after he returned from a mission with the first all-American raid over Rome. He was stricken with polio. After weary months he reached Boston on a hospital ship and then spent 14 months in an Arkansas VA hospital.

He came out of the hospital in a wheelchair, only partially recovered. He resumed his education which had been interrupted by the war and transferred from Tarleton State to the University of Texas. Shortly after, he married the former Miss Betty Jo Mahood of Stamford. The couple now have three children—Susan, 13; Bobby, 11; and Billy, 8.

A traveling job was offered McClellan after graduation, but he did not want to "drag the family around the country."

He joined the Stamford radio repair service business owned by his father, who died in 1953. Mac now runs the shop, largest in town, which he has expanded to include television repair.

The McClellan children reflect the Christian stability of the home. All three accepted Christ at the age of five.

Their music teacher said of Mac, "He is interested in what his children are doing and that they are doing what is right."

His plain-spoken advice to young fathers is, "So live before your children that they can see what the Sunday school teacher is teaching them." He believes the greatest problem young fathers have is trying to place the right value on the right thing. He said too often fathers covet Sunday as their day and simply drop the children off at Sunday school.

In addition to teaching a class, Mac has been a deacon for six years, is an officer in Brotherhood, teaches in study courses, is active in Training Union and takes part in all church activities.

He is an avid sports fan and likes to fish and hunt.

And still he finds time to sing with his daughter, wrestle with the boys, and wash the dishes for his wife.

An independent streak in both Mac and Betty makes them like to do their own getting along. And Mac is known, not for his handicap, but for his consecration, his knowledge of the Bible, his faith and his good humor.
