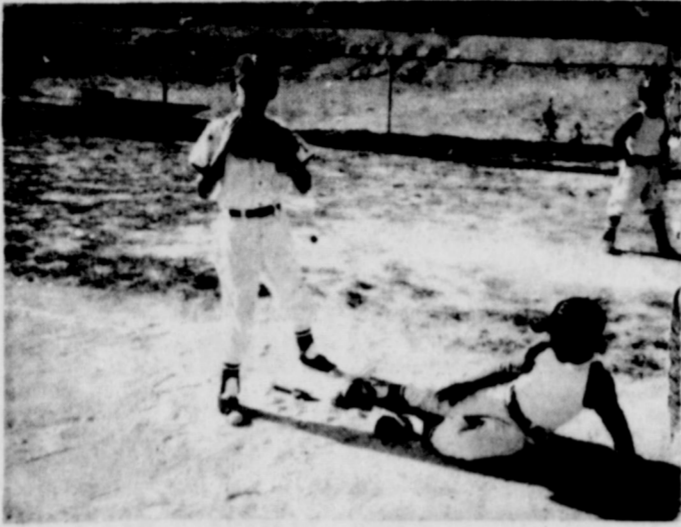
The two lists were released by Carroll Scott, Dean of Faculty and Admissions of the Cisco college. The spring semester ended May 10.

Ricky Harrell Honored At Event By Walters Here

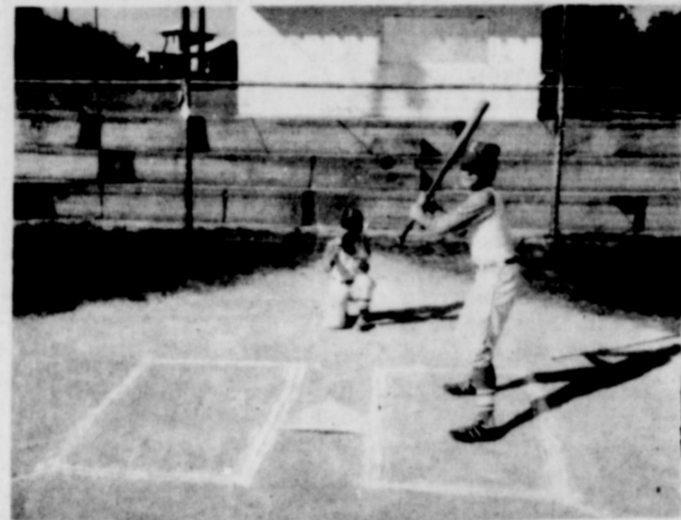

Water Hike Due To Keep Expansion Pace

Slight rate increases are on the horizon for area water customers in order to maintain the stable financial condition and improve the treatment capacity of the Eastland County Water Supply District facilities.

This news first came officially this week when the Water Board officials met with the Eastland City Commission asking for an increase in the amount paid by the city for treated water.

An increase of three cents per 1,000 gallons was approved on bringing the city's cost up to ten cents per 1,000 gallons, and removal of the \$500 credit the city has enjoyed under an original agreement in which the district was permitted to supply certain industrial customers.

This is the first increase asked by the board since the early 1960's.

Additional cost of the water will have to be passed on the customers, it was agreed, and this will include rates to users including those customers on the Carbon, Olden and Staff water systems and the 1,400 in Eastland.

A similar increase is also being asked in Ranger which would also affect Morton Valley and other Staff System customers.

It is estimated that the rate hike would become effective in July. Actual amount of the increase to the individual customer has not been determined.

In other action in the long city meeting at which all commissioners were present: a dispute between union employees and Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. was heard; permission was granted to a firm to operate an amusement center primarily for youth at Fireman's Hall; and other routine matters handled.

Appearing for the Water Board were President Willard Griffin, Charles Freyschlag, H.T. Wilson and M.H. Perry. They explained that the district has adopted a program of up-

dating and expansion rather than a replacement route to increase the plant's treatment capacity. It was stated that engineers are estimating that currently-planned projects will increase the capacity by 50 percent, but the board members guess that it might not go that high. Also the board has been advised by its bond-holding companies to increase the reserves necessary for debt service, adding to the necessity for the water rate increase.

To keep the district on a sound basis, and to be in a position to continue to provide the ever-increasing water consumption demands, the board elected to seek the rate hikes.

It is estimated that the City will be paying some \$14,000 more a year for the water it buys from the district.

Mayor Durel Reid, presiding, invited visitors Mrs. Betty Hart and Communications Workers of American Local President Norris Staff, both employees of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., to explain their problem to the commission.

Stating that the company's plans to shut down the Cisco Traffic Section in mid-1974, thereby doing away with some 45 jobs and some \$20,000 a month in payroll in the traffic department, is causing hardships on many of the employees.

The employees are being given the opportunity of transferring to other jobs in other cities with the company but Union President Starr indicated that the company's method of advising employees of openings is less than adequate.

Specifically, Mrs. Hart, a 27-year employee, holds that the company failed to give any notice locally of a job opening which came available in Eastland recently and which was filled by the company's Fort Worth employment office, without proper notice to employees here. She feels that she is qualified for the job and should have been given an

Pecan Field Day May 25 In Rising Star

Pecan insect and disease control and field demonstrations of spraying equipment will be featured at the pecan spring field day in Rising Star, Friday, May 25. Dan Childress, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, said the field day would begin at 9:30 a.m. in the American Legion Hall in Rising Star. The afternoon session will be devoted

to the examination of pecan trees for insect development and demonstration of various types of sprayers.

The field day is sponsored by the Eastland County Growers Association and the Agricultural Extension Service.

County Agent De Gordon said speakers will include three area extension specialists from Stephenville. Dr. Cliff

Hoelscher, Entomologist, will discuss the pecan nut casebearer situation this year and the control of all pecan insects.

Dr. Thomas Lee, Plant Pathologist, will discuss pecan disease and their control. The third speaker will be Dr. Earl Puls, Horticulturist, who will discuss the pecan crop prospects for 1973 and the effects of the late freeze damage.

A panel of specialists and pecan growers will answer questions on freeze damage to various trees and orchards in the county.

The afternoon field day will begin at 1:30 p.m. in the Rex Hudson orchard. This orchard is about 3 1/2 miles south of Rising Star, just off Highway 183. Four or five types of power sprayers will be demonstrated at the orchard.

A total of 22 field test were conducted. Results for both years showed that the liquid nematicides, dibromochloropropane and those containing dichloropropenes give best control of root-knot and lesion nematodes down to the root zone.

The granular nematicides tested gave good control of root-knot and lesion nematodes in the pegging zone. The granular types were more effective when applied at pegging than when applied at planting and one-half at pegging, on irrigated peanuts.

Pegging applications were not tested on dryland peanuts. Ring nematodes were also controlled by the nematicides in the same way but no increase in yield or grade were obtained indicating doubtful economic damage at infestation levels encountered.

Calcium applied as gypsum at 500, 1000, or 2000 pounds per acre in a 12-inch band 30 days after planting was superior to nematicides and fungicides-nematicide combinations in controlling pod rot in LaSalle County tests. SMK was increased up to 4 percent. Pythium was the dominant

pathogen. Lesion nematodes were presented in low numbers.

Some fungicides and fungicide-nematicide combinations reduced yields below untreated plots. Gypsum gave
