
would seem that Eastland bonds are considered a better buy these days than Fort Worth

David Fry to Complete Bank School Friday

David Fry, vice president of the Eastland National Bank, will graduate from the School of Banking of the South in Baton Rouge, La., on the Louisiana State University campus after 3 years of schooling. This years graduate banking school began on May 31, and will be climaxed by graduation exercises on Friday, June 12. Fry is one of the 510 southern bank executies from 20 states who are attending every day classes for what is in effect a post-graduate study of banking problems.

The School is sponsored by bankers associations of 13 southern states in cooperation with L. S. U. It offers a two-weeks course once a year ,over a period of three years, with top-flight instructors in banking and related fields. Between sessions these bankers con tinue their study through extens ion problems.

Over 90 expert instructors come from all over the nation to lec ture in this School of Banking. Following successful comple tion of their courses, banker-stuyear 134 bankers representing 13 southern states will be graduated at formal commencement exerci
