Nurse Urges Polio Shots

"The attack should shock us to our senses," Mrs. Arther declared. She said the Fuentez boy had not received polio shots.

Mrs. Arther is school nurse for all county schools except Cisco's. She said that less than 50 percent of grade school students in the schools she serves have had polio shots and that not more than five percent of the high school students have been vaccinated.

The school nurse said that all children and adults as well should have polio shots.

"It is well worth the low cost involved," she stated. "For it's better to spend a little money (the shots cost just \$2 each) than it is to see a child crippled for life."

Eastland's first case of polio in 1959 has been reported.

Mrs. Tip Arther, county school nurse, revealed today that Gilbert Fuentez, 13-year-old son of Guadalupe Fuentez, 513 East Main, Eastland, has been admitted to the isolation ward at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

Mrs. Arther took young Fuentez

to Abilene Wednesday afternoon. She said he became ill Friday, July 17, but that he wasn't seriously ill until Wednesday.

The school nurse said a hospital official said that the case is in its early stages and difficult to diagnose. He did not believe the attack was severe, however.

Cunningham Rites Today

Funeral services will be held today (Saturday) at 4 p.m. in Killingsworth Chapel for Mrs. Bertha O. Cunningham, 79, former resident of Ranger, who died at 1:20 p.m. Wednesday in Burns Hospital in Houston.

The Rev. Ralph E. Perkins, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Ranger, will officiate. Burial will be in Evergreen Cemetery.

Mrs. Cunningham was born Bertha Outlaw on Aug. 29, 1879, at Caddo and married George W. Cunningham in Ranger Aug. 19, 1906. They spent the early part of their married life in Ranger. Mr. Cunningham died May 5, 1955.

For the past few years she had lived with a daughter, Mrs. C. C. Black, in Houston. Mrs. Cunningham was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Black, Mrs. J. H. Conine of Midland, and Mrs. V. S. Richardson of Tulsa, Okla.; a brother, Judge George Outlaw of Sweetwater; a sister, Mrs. P. C. Long of Ranger; and six grandchildren.

Funeral services will be V. V. Cooper, Jr., John W. Tibbels, Ben Cunningham and O. D. Cunningham, all of Ranger, and James H. Conine Jr. of Ranger and Dr. Don Cunningham of San Angelo.

New Budget Being Planned
Trustees of the Cisco Independent School District began studying a budget for the 1959-60 school year at their regular July meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday at the school's downtown offices, Board President Garner Altom reported. The new budgets due to be adopted next month.

The proposed budget, as prepared and submitted by Supt. Arlin Birt of the school system, provides for expenditures of \$292,737 with income for the coming year estimated at \$296,425.

Oiler Finaled In Eastland Gas Region

A Marble Falls oil well has been completed in a gas producing area nine miles southeast of Carbon in southeast Eastland County.

It is Coastal States Producing Co. of Abilene No. 2 J. A. Greenwood Estate, J. Rubarth Surry 100.

The well is three miles north of the nearest Marble Falls oil production. The gas wells in the area also produce from the Marble Falls.

Number 2 Greenwood had a daily potential of 44.23 barrels of 41 gravity oil. Flow was through a 1/2-inch choke with 40 pounds casing and 70 pounds tubing pressures.

The well is producing from 176 perforations at 2,646-94 feet opposite the Marble Falls. Casing is set at 3,010 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 275-1. The well was prorated in the regular field.

Football workouts start August 17 for the Ranger High School Bulldogs. The date for the Bulldogs to report for physicals has not been set. Coach Prescott said that it would probably be the week prior to the first workout. He expects about 25 boys to report for workout.

The coaching staff plans to attend the annual coaching school which is to begin August 3 in Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum in Fort Worth.

Study of Rainfall Shows County Is Over Normal

Total rainfall in Eastland County for the first seven months of the year, less the one week remaining in July, now stands at 17.58 inches. That's just 1.99 inches above normal, but that figure doesn't reveal the true story.


The year started out as the driest ever. In fact, January of last year, and it didn't rain a drop in January, 1959, was just .06 of an inch.

February wasn't a lot better, but .82 of an inch did fall. Then March came and just .33 of an inch was recorded. Things picked up a bit in April, but only 1.91 inches fell then. May brought 3.86 inches of rain, but even that isn't normal rainfall.

And then the summer months arrived, June was the second wettest June in the county's history. You have to go back to June, 1940 to find a June with more than 1959's 8.87 inches.

July has also proved to be a wet month. The official reading here so far has been 1.73 inches, but most of the county has had upwards to more than three inches.

Kelly is serving his second year as Texas president after having served as local, Association and District president. He is noted in his district at a young layman who is interested in men and boys.



TO CURB DEFICIT SPENDING

City Increases Water, Trash Pickup Rates

Eastland City Commissioners, in a called meeting Saturday morning took steps to halt deficit operations in two departments. Commissioners voted increases in water rates and for garbage and trash pickups.

The water rate increase, which will become effective August 1, will be from \$3 to \$3.50 for the minimum billing. Eastland has a 3,000 gallon minimum. Also increased was the charge to out-of-city users. Their rates will be increased from \$5 minimum to \$6.50 per month. All commissioners voted in favor of the water rate increases.

The trash pickup charge for residential users was hiked from 75c a month to \$1. Businessmen in the past have paid from \$1.50 to \$10

monthly, according to the amount of waste they had to be hauled off. Business rates were increased to a scale ranging from \$2 to \$13.33.

Overall the trash and garbage increase was a 33 1-3 percent hike. All commissioners voted in favor of the increase except Jack Germany.

Mayor Cyrus Frost summed up the thinking of the majority. "Our obligation," he stated, "is

to run our city in the black."

Commissioner Virgil Seaberry Jr. said he believed citizens had rather see small increases now than wait until the City is in real trouble and face big rate increases.

City Manager Jimmy Young told the Commission that the City operated at a loss of almost \$200 last month in the trash-garbage department. And he estimated that the deficit would jump to \$500 this month since twice weekly pickups were started in the residential areas for the summer months.

The water rate increases also stemmed from low income, Young pointed out. He said that heavy summer rainfall has cut the use of water this summer, forcing the City's hand.

Disabled workers who have not applied for social security disability benefits because they are receiving disability payments from another Federal agency, or under a State Workmen's Compensation program, should get in touch with their local social security office without delay.

According to R. R. Tuley, Jr., manager of the Abilene social security district office, many such workers can now get social security disability benefits. Moreover, benefits can go back as far as August, 1958, if an application is filed before Sept. 1, 1959.

Under the law in effect prior to August 1958, a worker's social security disability payment was reduced by the amount of any other disability benefit he received under a State Workmen's Compensation program, or from another Federal agency. In a number of cases this meant that no social security disability payment could be made. As a result, many workers who would not have benefited by the "disability freeze" did not file a claim. These workers could check with their local social security office not later than Aug. 31, 1959, Tuley emphasized today.

A representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration will again be in Eastland on the mornings of Aug. 3, 17, 31 at the City Hall.

Seaberry Named On Constitution Revision Group

Appointment of Eastland attorney Virgil T. Seaberry to a key committee of the Texas State Bar was announced Thursday by Bar President A. J. Folley of Amarillo.

Seaberry, a former State Bar president, was named to a three-year term on the constitutional revision committee.

One of the state's best informed lawyers on the Texas Constitution, Seaberry served in 1948 as chairman of a state committee to study the Constitution and possible need for its revision or re-writing. He is a leader on the present committee studying proposals for constitutional revision.

Ranger Cats Down Eastland In Teenage Play

Ranger Cats out-scored the Eastland Greenbacks 15 to 10 Friday at Eastland.

Dean Richey of Ranger, gave up only three hits in beating the Greenbacks, but he walked five runners, and a host of errors let Eastland score 10 runs. The cats climbed on Elmo Webster for 13 hits and 11 walks to tally 15 runs.

Dean Richey was Ranger's power, getting three singles to lead the batting. Webster, Shoemaker and Howell collected one hit each to furnish all of Eastland's hitting.


Crawley entered the post office service in Ranger in 1923, and has had 16 years of continued service in the one office.



Mrs. Dragoo and Mr. and Mrs. Beall Return From Tour of Two States



 Combine pudding mix, water, and pineapple juice in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat, until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat and add pineapple. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Pour over crumb mixture in pan. Sprinkle reserved crumbs over top. Chill until firm. Garnish with pineapple wedges and sprigs of mint. 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TELEPHONI TALK

The other day a fellow asked me, "Why does your company advertise?—you have no competition." I have waited a long time for someone to ask me that question. Reason?—I already know the answer!

We do have competition. People can write letters or they can go see the person instead of calling. We have a lot of ways of competition. But to me that is not the main reason we advertise. Another reason is that we owe it to our employees, our stockholders, and our customers to be a prosperous company. It takes a prosperous and well known company to attract the investors' dollars.
