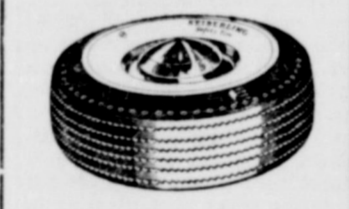

When The Face Of America Began To Change



In mid-afternoon of June 1, 1909, five primitive motorcars started out from New York City Hall headed for Seattle, Wash., in what was officially called the "Ocean-to-Ocean Automobile Endurance Contest."
Two of the five were Model T Fords, designated No. 1 and No. 2. The others were a Shawmut, an Acme and an Itala—names now long since forgotten in the automotive industry.
Ford No. 2 reached Seattle at 12:55 p.m., June 23, nearly 17 hours ahead of its nearest competitor, the Shawmut, and was the first car ever to travel from New York to Seattle under its own power. Ford No. 1 came in third, the Acme fourth. The Itala broke down and was shipped in by freight.
The historic contest is being re-enacted this month by a Ford Motor Company caravan which, as nearly as possible, is following the same route and same day-to-day schedule as the original contestants.

Included in the caravan are a duplicate of the victorious No. 2 Ford; Ford Motor Company's 50 millionth vehicle, a Galaxie four-door sedan; a 1908 Model K Ford which paced the competitors from New York to St. Louis, Mo.; and an exhibit van, the displays of which show a look into the past and a glance at the future of the automotive industry.

in his Austin office, as he discussed one of the newest hazards to appear in the America home.

Musick said that no accurate statistics have been compiled that would as yet give a true picture, but that a poll of 48 state health departments were recently made by the National Safety Council and revealed that as many as 100 children may die during 1959 in mishaps involving plastic coverings.

"News reports alone, in recent months, have given sufficient evidence that thin plastics are a menace when left within easy reach of small children," Musick said. He explained that the danger lies in the fact that thin plastic will cling to the skin, sometimes causing infants to suffocate.

"Static electricity, similar to that on a comb after having been run through hair, is generated on the thin plastic in handling. Any youngster getting the bag close to his face is likely to have it literally grab him through an electrical attraction.

"Also, in at least two cases, children have died from chewing off bits of plastic which lodged in the windpipe.

"Another hazard, especially among older and stronger children, is created if the child puts the bag over his head. Before long he is breathing deadly carbon dioxide. The dizziness, inability to react promptly and muscle spasms occur with more rapid breathing. Before the victim realized it, he is too weakened to tear the plastic from his face."

The safety expert said the remedy for such accidents is merely one of common sense and that once parents are told that these

Two Ranger men were charged with theft, after signing confession, Thursday, before Constable Ralph Veal and Chief of Police Don Butler.

The men were charged with taking pecans from the cellar of Ellis Cooper, located northwest of Ranger, on Thanksgiving. In the confession of one man, he admits selling the pecans for \$37.95 on Nov. 26.

Charges were made against Roy Samuels and Sammy W. Isabell. Samuels will also face charges of swindling with a worthless check, crossing a state line with fictitious license plates and theft by bailey. Last week he was charged with taking an automobile from Ranger to Louisiana, after trading for the car and neglecting to pay the balance of about \$200. He is also charged with changing the '58 license plate to appear to read '59.

Isabell says, in the confession, that he took Samuels to a place near the Cooper house, returned to town and later picked up Samuels with a sack of pecans. The next morning, he says, the pecans were sold in Eastland.

A memorial for Mrs. Lizzie Bandy was read by Florine Martin.

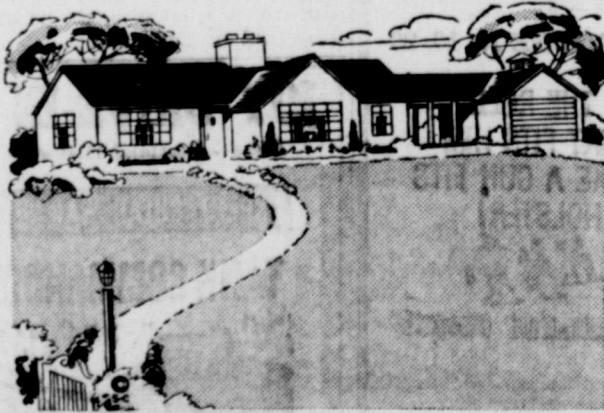
A poem, "Our Get Up Has Went," was read by Mrs. Lela Day.
