

Board Names New Hospital Administrator

New administrator of Eastland Memorial Hospital is Dale E. Troutt, formerly assistant administrator of Gladewater Hospital in Gladewater. Troutt's appointment was announced by Bill Hoffmann, president of the hospital board.

Troutt met with members of the hospital board and representatives of the press in the new vital wing Wednesday afternoon.

"It is a pleasure to be in Eastland, he told board members. He

said he would keep patient care uppermost in his mind, and assured the board his efforts would be to run "a good hospital," and "keep its good name."

Troutt is married and has one son, Mike, 4. The Troutts are making their home at 315 North Connellee. Mrs. Troutt's given name is Greta. They are members of the Baptist Church.

Hoffmann also announced that Mrs. Lewis Tiner would serve as business office manager and that Mrs. Mary Sue Lee, a registered nurse, would be director of nurses.

In addition to his duties as administrator, Troutt will serve as X-Ray and laboratory technician.

Plans call for completely tiling the original hospital in the immediate future. The new wing will be put in use as soon as furniture is purchased. Hoffmann said a number of citizens have contributed to a fund to pay for the furniture and more contributions are needed.

The hospital will have 40 beds when the new wing is put in use. The original wing has 22 beds and the new wing will have 18.

Making the trip were Phillip Kline, 12; Gail Whitley, and Jimmy Lowrance, 13.

The camp, operated by the Salvation Army as a recreation spot for children 8 through 14, who might not otherwise have the opportunity of a summer vacation, is located on the old Singleton Ranch.

Seeing the boys off at the early Sunday hour were Chief of Police Ray Laney, local camp chairman; Clyde Young, chairman, Everett Plewman, and James Smith all members of the local Salvation Army unit.

The camp, which is designed for the happiness and welfare of healthy, normal children, is equipped with redwood and brick cottages. Each has facilities for 12 boys, and their counselor. Rains Fill Up Stock Tanks; Aid Farmers

June Rainfall Best So Far This Year

"If we can get rain in June, July and August we will be okay." That's what Eastland County farmers have been saying all during the dry first few months of the year, and if the first few days of June are any reference, the rainfall for the summer months will be excellent.

Already during June a total of 2.59 inches of moisture has been recorded, pushing the total rainfall for the year to 9.97, within two inches of normal for the year. The rain has been on almost a

schedule. It rains between 12 and five a.m. every morning, it would seem. Since Tuesday the total has been 1.33 inches.

Stock tanks in the county are filling up and lakes are catching a lot of water. During January, February and March, when only 1.05 inches of rain fell, stock ponds had lost most of their water.

June is the first month to exceed normal rainfall so far, and that has been done in just four days. The chart below shows official United States Weather Bureau rainfall records for the year.

The rainfall is coming just as farmers are needing the moisture for seasoning in peanut fields.

Farmers agree, if the summer months provide rain, the area will produce another good peanut crop.

State Government Costs Are Studied

(Editor's Note: The following article is the first of two stories concerning state government finances. The first article deals with state expenditures. Sunday's article will tell where the state gets its money.)

It costs money to run any kind of government in this day and time, but for the first time in many years the State of Texas

faces a crisis as far as finances are concerned.

With the State Legislature in special session to solve the money problems, the Telegram feels it wise to study state expenditures and state revenue receipts.

Where does the State of Texas spend its money? That's a question asked often today.

A check shows that most of the money is spent for two things: education and highways and roads. The biggest expense today is education. For since 1948 the State's share of the education bill has increased from less than \$150,000,000 to a total of \$409,197,177 this past year.

Highways and roads cost \$312,119,359 during 1958. Highway expenditures (Continued On Page Six)

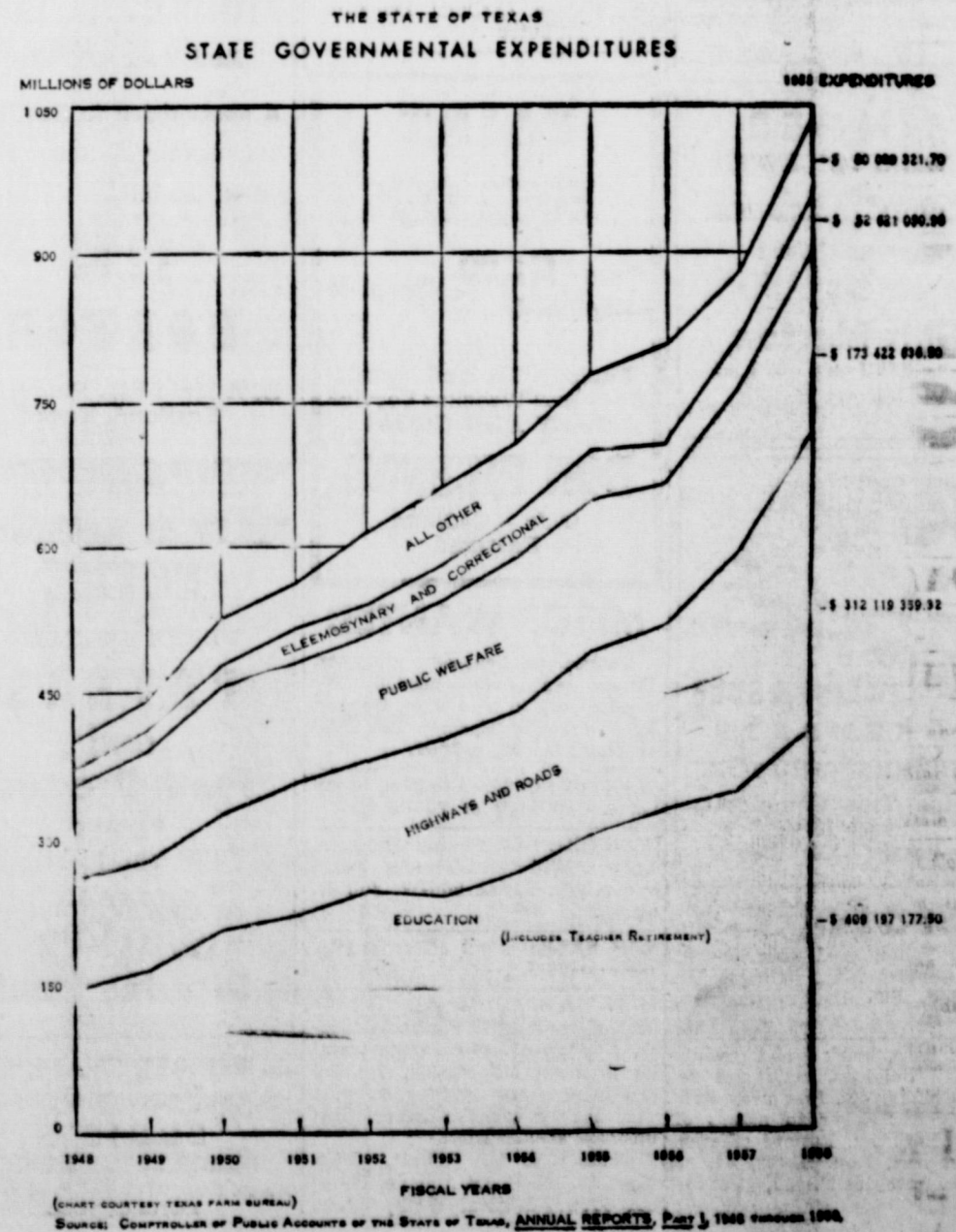
Olden Baptist School Begins

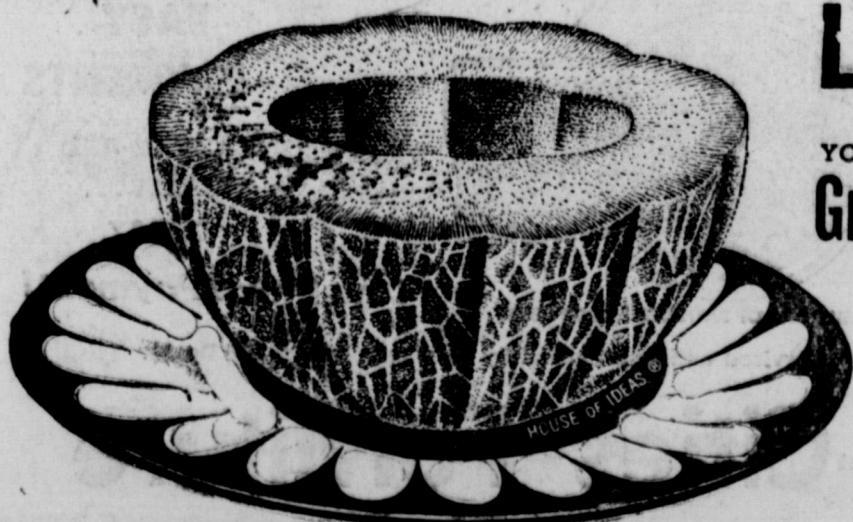

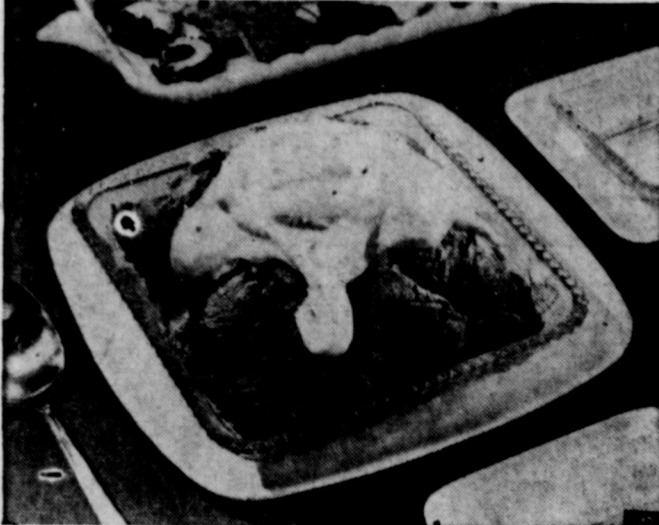

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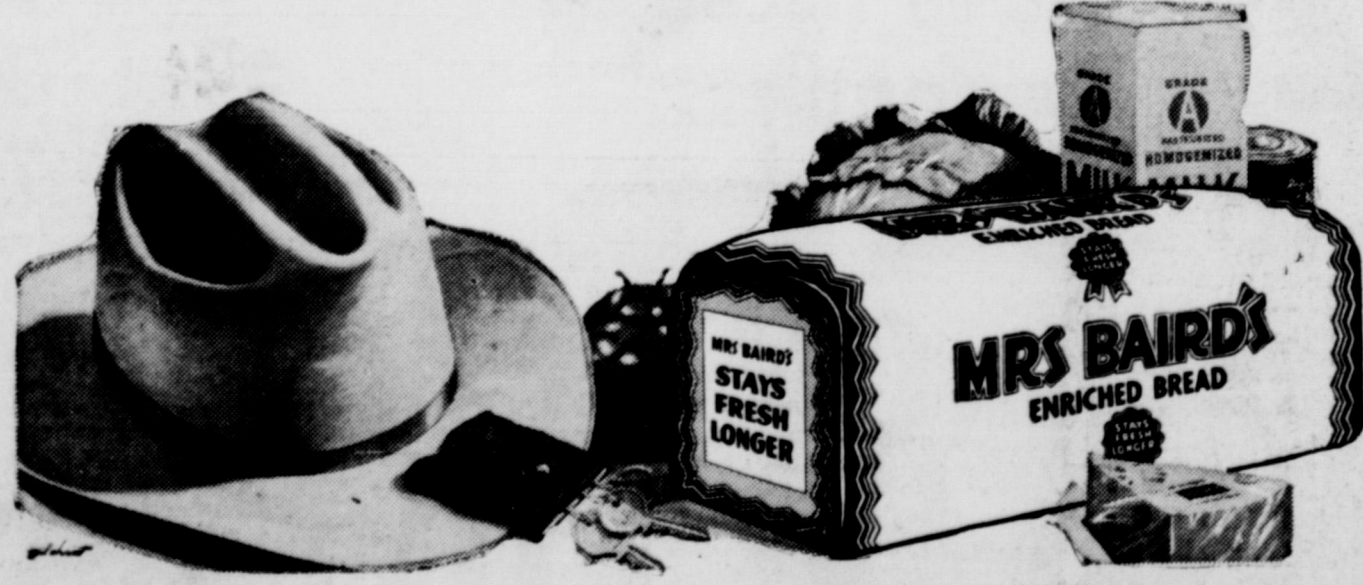

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**MOBILE ACCIDENT
RULES SHOULD BE
MEMORIZED**

Vacation time is near. Soon millions of people will be driving about the country, and automobile accidents will occur with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident?

At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory.

1. Stop! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.
2. Render Aid. If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) Stop bleeding. (3) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both. (4) Do not move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.

3. Protect the Scene from Further Damage. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlights beams on the wrecked vehicle.

4. Call an Officer. Policemen, Highway Patrolmen, Sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.

5. Gather Information... Write it Down. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess — be specific. Measure and mark. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver—and he must do the same.

6. Be Careful What You Say. Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission. You may learn later that the other driver was equally at fault, or more so. Emotional comments can be misconstrued by others, or may be misquoted. Whatever you say, make it factual.

7. See Your Doctor if there is

Corn-Crisped Chicken



A new chicken recipe, like a new pair of stockings, is something no woman can have too many of. When the recipe is both easy and delicious, it becomes a real collector's item.

- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- Aluminum foil
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk

Combine corn flake crumbs with salt and pepper. Line shallow baking pan with aluminum foil. Dip chicken pieces in evaporated milk then roll immediately in seasoned corn flake crumbs. Place chicken pieces, skin side up, in foil lined pan; do not crowd. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F) one hour, or until tender. No need to cover or turn chicken while cooking.

Yield: 4 servings.

8. Consult Your Lawyer Immediately. The sooner your lawyer is brought into the matter, the better he can advise you and protect your rights. 9. Inform Your Insurance Company Promptly. Failure to do so may void your policy.
10. Report the Accident to the Department of Public Safety. This is required by law if there is any injury, death, or total damages exceeding \$25.00.

An official accident report form may be procured from the Police, Sheriff's Dept., Highway Patrol, or State Dept. of Public Safety.

COLLEGE STATION — The old distinctions between farm and city are rapidly disappearing, said Reagan Brown, extension rural sociologist. Rural nonfarm people now outnumber farm people by a ratio of 5 to 3 and it appears certain that more nonfarm people will live in rural areas.

More than a third of farm operators work off their farms 100 days or more per year. In 1957, about 40 percent of net income of farm families was from nonfarm sources, he said.

Family operated farms will increase in size since technological improvements are by no means complete. Agriculture, said Brown, appears to be only in the middle of revolutionary changes both in size and capital structure. Larger farms mean larger investments, not only for land and buildings, but for all the machinery and non-agricultural supplies needed in

modern farm production. Based on present trends, investment per commercial farm by '975 may amount to over \$80,000 in 1958 dollars compared to a little less than \$40,000 now, he said.

Various new financial devices may be worked out to meet the need, some based upon methods now common in industry. One development already underway is the use of land-purchase contracts under which the title of the land remains with the seller until all or a specific percentage of payments have been made.

Commercial family farms will probably continue to be the dominant form of organization in American agriculture. Labor requirements have not increased with

the size of farms except in some limited areas. For the bulk of farmers, efficient operation seems likely to require no greater labor force than has been needed in the past, he added.
