Stamp To Salute Soil Progress In United States

COLLEGE STATION - A 4 cent postage stamp saluting pro gress in soil conservation in the United States will be issued Aug. 26 by the Post Office Department said Lynn Pittard, asst. extension soil and water conservation spec

The Nation's first soil conservastamp will be formally re leased at the annual meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of Am erica at Rapid City, South Dakota, August 26. It will go on sale th following day at post office

The stamp, which was develop ed in cooperation with the U. S Department of Agriculture, por trays a modern farmland setting signifying that conservation farm ing brings beauty as well as boun ty to rural living. Soil conserva tion practices portrayed include contour stripcropping, terracing pasture improvement, tree plant ing, and a farm pond. In addition the silhouette of a city in the background symbolizes that urban as well as rural people are highly dependent upon the care and wise use of land as a principal source of food, water, shelter and cloth ing. The stamp will be printed in three colors, yellow, green a n c

Issuance of the stamp, Pittard said, is a tribute to farmers and ranchers, their local soil conserva tion districts and to the profes sional agricultural workers who have helped make the United States a world leader in soil con-
