Pearson Grimes Will Receive Army Commission

Cadet Pearson Grimes Jr., along with 42 other ROTC cadets, will receive his commission in the United States Army Reserve Friday at Fort Lee, Va.

The new lieutenant is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Grimes Sr. of 515 S. Mulberry, Eastland.

The commissioning ceremonies will be held in the Post Chapel at Fort Lee, Virginia. Major General Alfred B. Denniston, commanding general of the Quartermaster Training Command, Fort Lee, and the ROTC Summer Camp, along with Brigadier General Fredrick T. Voorhees, special assistant to chief of the transportation corp, will be present to honor the new officers.

Cadet Grimes, a graduate of the University of Texas, is just completing his six weeks ROTC Summer Camp training.

At Fort Lee, home of the Quartermaster Training Command, the cadets became acquainted with Army life and obtained a familiarization with Army operations and equipment. Special attention was given to marksmanship, field problems, and development of command leadership in each individual. A seven day bivouac under simulated battlefield conditions culminated their training.

Highlights of the bivouac was a continuous 36 hour tactical problem in which the cadets "repelled aggressor forces from the Potomac area."

Within the next year Grimes will go on active duty in the Quartermaster Corp for a period of either six months or two years.

FHA Financing Approved for First Federal Area Farmers to Tour Montague Grape Vineyards

First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Ranger has announced that they are now an approved agency for Federal Housing Authority Title II home loans for purchase of existing homes, and for building of new homes.

Under the FHA plan the lending agency, such as the First Federal of Ranger can make loans covering up to 97 percent of the cost of construction, or of the purchase of existing homes. Also FHA financing can go up to a thirty year term for repayment.

The First Federal Savings and Loan of Ranger, in announcing this approval, states that it is expected that the FHA plan for financing will make possible the construction of many more new homes in Eastland, as well as enable prospective home owners to buy an existing home for very little down payment.

Platoon System Returns to Texas JC Conference

The two-platoon substitution system will return to football in the Texas Junior College Conference this fall, according to Conference officials. Ranger College is a member of this conference.

The decision was made at a meeting of conference officials in Waco recently. With the exception of this one ruling, the conference will abide by the standard NCAA rules.

The Texas Eastern Conference (including Tyler, Kilgore, Paris and Texarkana junior colleges) have adopted the same rule.

It also was decided at the Waco meeting that members of the TJCC would hire officials for their home games from the Fort Worth chapter of the Southern Conference of the Football Officials Assn. All will use Fort Worth officials except Blinn JC of Brenham in South Texas.

Wilson Calls Peanut Meeting Big Success

According to Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, the annual meeting of his organization held July 24 at Stephenville was the most successful ever held.

Over 200 interested persons filled the Agriculture Auditorium at Tarleton State College for the morning session. In the first session at 10 a.m. Wilson reported to the members relative to last year's operation. He stated that the Association took under price support warehouse loan some 22,600 tons of peanuts in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. The Association was not able to sell these peanuts to commercial shellers due to heavy purchases of shellers directly from producers last fall. It was explained that the Commodity Credit Corporation decided to carry this inventory over which means maintaining the peanuts in government inventory after August 1. CCC through the Association offered the peanuts to shellers for bidding. Low bidders shelled the peanuts. The shelled peanuts then were placed in cold storage for safe keeping away from summer insects.

The manager also explained his Association's role in the CCC No. 2 peanut program. This is a plan whereby the government agrees to buy a limited quantity of less than top quality shelled goods from the shellers. This is set up to encourage the shellers to sell their top quality peanuts into the edible trade. Wilson stated that SWPGA handled over 12,000,000 pounds of shellers' No. 2 peanuts during the past year.

Wilson described the Association's legislative attempts last year in Texas and Oklahoma. The Association aided peanut growers in their efforts to set up legisla-

tion to enable the growers to assess themselves for funds to carry on research and promotional projects. Representative Ben Suderth of Comanche and Senator Hugh Sandlin of Holdenville, Okla., sponsors of the legislation in their respective states, were present to comment on plans for continuation of efforts during the 1961 session of their legislatures.

In the general session at 11 a.m. Dolph Briscoe Jr., principal speaker, urged lawmakers and citizens to become aware of the pressing need in the Southwest for generally improved programs of soil and water conservation. Briscoe was recently appointed by President Eisenhower to a commission to study the conservation needs of Texas and to make recommendations in this regard.

Among prominent guests attending the meeting were Bruno Schroeder, executive secretary of the Texas Federation of Cooperatives, E. E. Dennard, head of the Commodity Specialist Staff, Dallas CSS Commodity Office, Dr. R. E. Patterson, Vice President Texas A & M College, Dr. Ralph Matlack, Oklahoma State University, and many others.

James Dickens, agricultural engineer, North Carolina State College, demonstrated recently developed automatic samplers, shuckers and splitters to be used in the inspection of peanuts. Some of this equipment will be used this year and some will need further perfection.

P-K Wildlife Populations On The Rise

AUSTIN — Quail, deer, squirrel, turkey, dove and cottontail rabbit populations in the Possum Kingdom Game Management area now show an increase for this year. Field biologists' reports indicate that in some cases they are over 100 percent above the 1957 population figures for the same area, according to the director of wildlife restoration, Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Early 1959 survey figures show a 36.04 percent higher breeding population of bobwhite quail now than at this same time in 1957. A bird dog census on selected areas conducted in late fall of 1958 indicates a 160.31 percent increase in the total quail populations over that for the fall of 1957.

A deer census in the same section of state showed a fall population of one deer per 19.75 acres compared to one deer per 13.71 acres in 1957 in Bosque County and similar increases in most of the other counties in the Possum Kingdom area.

Regular field observations indicate a higher turkey hatching success but only a slight increase in turkey populations over those for the previous nesting season. Squirrel populations were much higher and cottontail rabbit numbers continued high. Dove numbers were comparable to those for the preceding year.

Sixty-five roadside quail counts were made in 15 counties during the survey, while 5,643 acres in Clay, Wise and Young counties were censused with bird dogs. Methods for determining the population trends for turkey and squirrels included field observations, contacts with game wardens, landowners, and other field workers.

Hunt, well known insurance man and also former civil service employee at Camp Wolters, Mineral Wells, has been a resident of Strawn since 1946. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe S. Hunt of Ranger.

Recent additions to the personnel of the 55-year-old Strawn bank are the result of increased oil development and industrial activity in the area, Encke said.

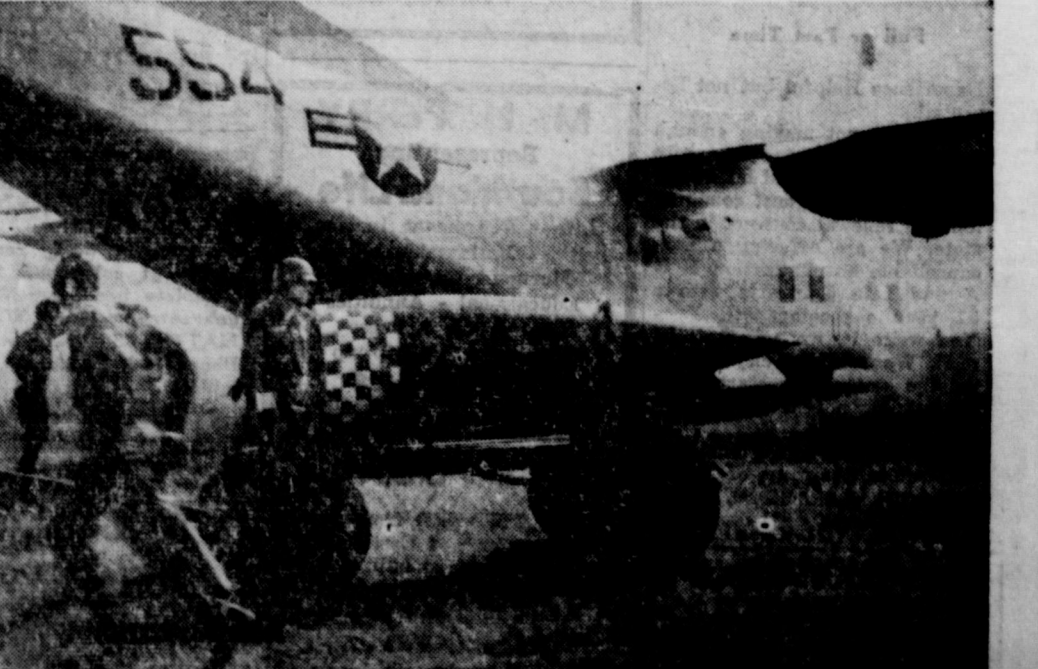
the Newberry Award books as they get two stickers for each of these.

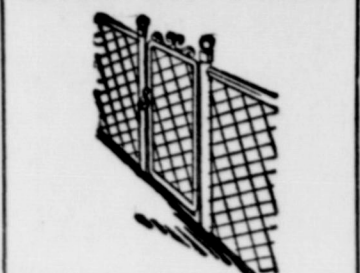

Recommendations Are Approved By Farm Bureau

WACO — The Texas Farm Bureau board of directors, meeting here in mid-July, approved a long list of recommendations made by the organization's 39-member Commodity Advisory Committee. The committee, composed of 25 lay members and 13 state directors from all sections of the state, met for two days prior to the board's regular quarterly session.

Among the major recommendations made by the livestock subcommittee and approved by the board were the following:
1. Endorsement of animal health legislation passed by the 56th Legislature, especially the brucellosis eradication program. County Farm Bureaus were requested to help bring the brucellosis program into operation at an early date.
2. Texas Farm Bureau requested to strengthen its efforts to promote red meats through the state-wide committee of the National Livestock and Meat Board. The state committee was organized recently.

3. Texas Farm Bureau requested to support all possible efforts to inaugurate screw worm eradication program in Texas.
Some of the major recommendations of the field crops subcommittee which were approved by the board included:
1. Texas Farm Bureau to arrange for demonstration of new electronic cotton clashing machine at TFB Institute Aug. 2-5 in Dallas.
2. American Farm Bureau Federation requested to work for a percentage decrease in grain sorghum storage rates in proportion to the decrease in price supports for that commodity.
Among dairy subcommittee recommendations approved were the following:
1. That legislation controlling sanitation of milk shipped into Texas be initiated much earlier at next regular session of Legislature. It was also recommended that a proposed draft of such legislation be prepared for study by Farm Bureau and dairy associations. A bill of this nature was defeated this year in Austin.

2. That TFB board of directors continue to oppose proposed labor department regulations pertaining to farm labor.
The poultry subcommittee made these recommendations which were approved:
1. TFB requested to compile information on provisions of various poultry contracts.
2. Study requested on the advantages and disadvantages of broiler auctions.
3. American Farm Bureau Federation requested to study USDA's proposed amendments to regulations governing egg grading, inspection.

Among approved recommendations made by the water subcommittee were the following:
1. Study should be made of overlapping authority of various agencies, leading to development of legislation to control water pollution.
2. Study should be made of underground water resources with information compiled for users of such water. It was suggested that methods and effectiveness of recharging underground reservoirs be a part of the study.
3. Study requested to be made on necessary legislation to eliminate and prevent federal government from pre-empting state waters.

Sauce is Important to Skewered Foods



By JANE ASHLEY

Shrimp a la Broche is a fine choice for any informal get together. The shrimp and vegetables are marinated in a flavorful sauce, so important to all skewered foods, then cooked over coals or in a preheated broiler. Served with a tossed salad, crusty bread, and iced drink your meal is complete. The sauce is made with a piquant blending of corn oil, vinegar, garlic and hot seasonings in mild proportions. Use the same sauce, by the way, for other foods.

Shrimp a la Broche
1 pound small mild onions
2 green peppers
2 pounds tomatoes
1 pound shrimp, fresh or frozen
1 recipe Marinating Sauce
Peel and cook onions in salted boiling water about 10 minutes or until almost tender; drain. Cut tomatoes in large wedges, halves or quarters. Clean and devein the shrimp. If frozen, defrost. If using fresh mushrooms, wash and remove stems, or cut into suitable pieces.

Place onions, peppers, tomatoes, shrimp and mushrooms in a large flat dish. Pour marinating sauce over the food and let refrigerate three to four hours. Turn occasionally. When ready to cook, remove shrimp and vegetables; drain and reserve marinade for later use.

Arrange shrimp and mushrooms on skewers alternating with tomatoes, onions and peppers. Leave about 1/4-inch between each piece. Repeat to fill skewers.
Grill over hot coals, or cook in broiler. Adjust distance at top of food to heat source to 3 inches. Turn occasionally and brush the food with the marinade to give a high glaze. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Marinating Sauce
1 clove garlic
1/4 cup MAZOLA Corn Oil
1/4 cup vinegar or lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Dash cayenne pepper
1/4 teaspoon Tabasco sauce
Slice clove of garlic into bowl. Add corn oil and remaining ingredients. Stir. Pour over shellfish, fish, cubed meat or vegetables to be grilled or broiled. Marinate food for 3 to 4 hours. Makes about 1/2 cup sauce.

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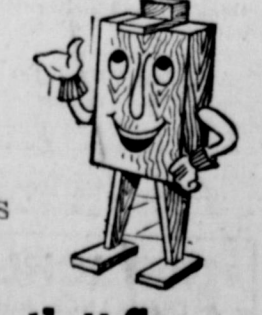

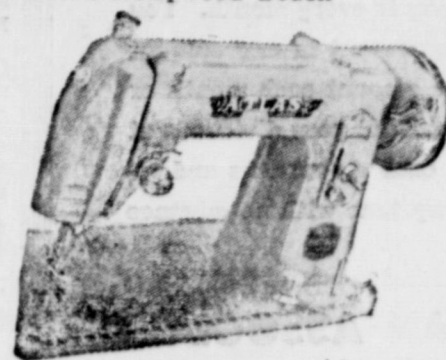

Texas Farm Bureau Institute to Be Held in Dallas

DALLAS — The 11th annual Texas Farm Bureau Institute will be held at the Hotel Adolphus here Aug. 2-5, according to J. H. West, president of the state farm organization.

Purpose of the three-day school is to train county Farm Bureau leaders in the operation of a "grass roots" farm and ranch organization on the county level. Theme of this year's Institute is "The Challenge of Change."

Registration gets under way at 3 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 2, in the lobby of the hotel. Some 350 county leaders from nearly 100 counties over the state are expected to enroll.

Nine regular courses will be offered. In addition, two half-day assembly periods will be devoted to a discussion of dangers to the American way of life and problem areas in public education. The training school will close at a noon luncheon Wednesday, Aug. 5, with an address by Frank K. Woolley of Washington, D. C., legislative counsel for the American Farm Bureau Federation. Dr. George S. Benson, president of Harding College, Searcy, Ark., will lead the Aug. 3 general assembly discussion of "Our American Way of Life Under Fire." The second assembly discussion on Aug. 4, "Problem Areas in Our Public Education System," will be led by Robert H. (Bob) Lawrence, Dallas, executive director for the Texas Bureau for Economic Understanding.

Dr. John C. Stevens, assistant president of Abilene Christian College, will speak at the vesper service Sunday evening. A recreation party Tuesday evening will be under the direction of Miss Lucille Moore, College Station, state extension specialist.

The faculty will be composed of Texas Farm Bureau staff members and officers with the exception of three guest instructors. They are Dr. Michael Kolivosky, academic dean of Hillsdale College in Michigan; Mrs. Marie Daugherty of Chicago, director of women's activities, American Farm Bureau Federation; and O. R. Long, also of Chicago, director of AFBF field services division.

Dr. Kolivosky will teach a course of "Principles of Motivation." Mrs. Daugherty will instruct a class in "Women and Youth in Farm Bureau," and Long will teach a course on "Equipping Farm Bureau to Meet the Challenge of Change."

Other courses to be offered deal with history and philosophy of Farm Bureau, public relations, services for members, membership acquisition, policy development and policy execution, and agricultural policies and economics.

State Department Of Health

"School days, school days. Good ol' golden rule days!" Here they come again, and if you're a wise parent you'll get ready ahead of time.

There is lots to do - buy clothes, fit shoes - and if your child is entering the first grade, chances are you need a birth certificate copy.

School districts in Texas require that entering students be six years old before September 1. Otherwise they must wait until the following year.

The best means of proving your child's age and birth date is to have a certified copy of his birth certificate.

In many areas of Texas, copies are available from local registrars of vital statistics in health departments or county court houses.

You may also obtain a birth certificate copy from the Division of Vital Statistics of the Texas State Department of Health in Austin.

To do so, you must send one dollar requesting a copy. Be sure to include the child's name, date and place of birth and the parent's name.

It is important that parents take care of this chore as early as possible.

During August and September the Division of Vital Statistics is swamped with literally thousands of requests each week for birth certificate copies.

If you want to be sure your child has his birth certificate when school starts, request it now. Rough estimates place the number of upcoming first graders at about 250,000. That makes for a lot of birth certificate copies.

In addition to birth certificates, it would be wise to check with your school district regarding any vaccinations that may be required. It would be a good idea - if you have not already done so - to get your child started on his series of three Salk polio shots before school starts.

Also, a fourth shot or "booster" is generally recommended for added protection a minimum of one year after the initial series.

Another smart idea that will pay off, is adjusting your child's schedule to approximate that of school time including bedtime, meals and especially waking time. (This is a weekly feature of the Division of Public Health Education, Texas State Department of Health.)

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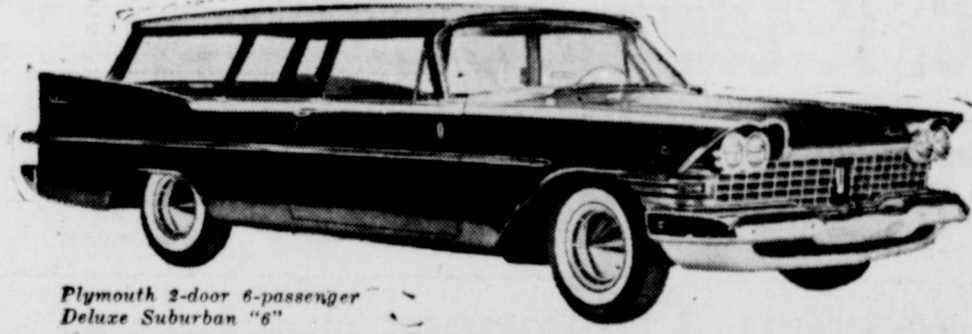

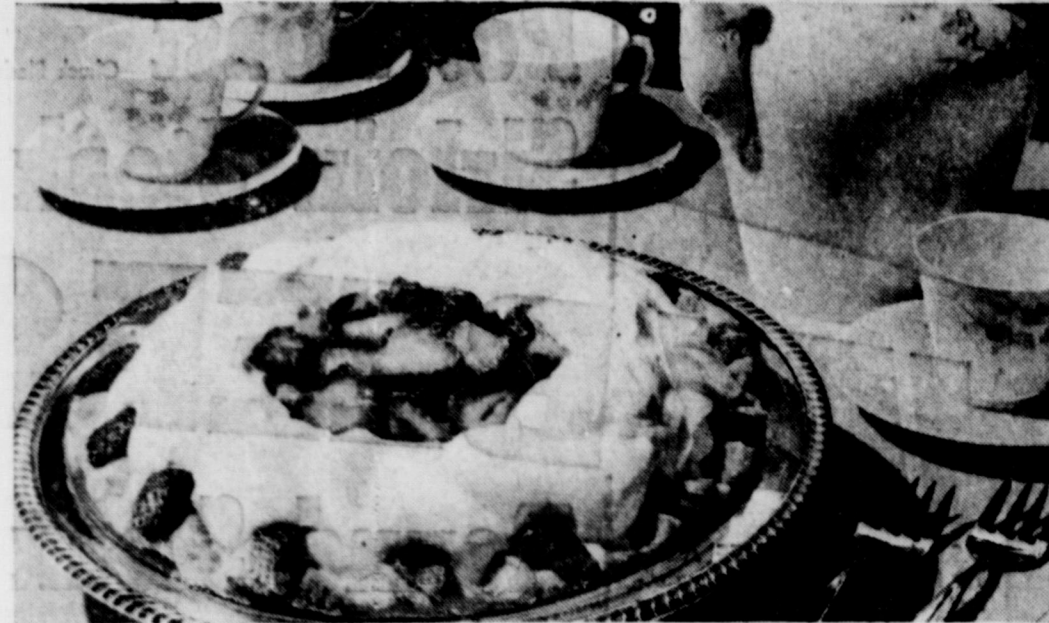

Strawberry Lemon Pie (One 9-inch pie) One package (3 1/2 ounces) vanilla pudding mix; 1 can (6 ounces) frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed; 3/4 cup water; one 9-inch baked pastry shell, 1 cup sliced, fresh strawberries; 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 1/2 cups whipped, instant nonfat dry milk crystals. Combine pudding mix, lemonade concentrate and water. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until pudding thickens. BY DOROTHY MADDOX and starts to boil. Cool slightly. Turn into pastry shell. Chill until firm. Combine strawberries and sugar; mix well. Arrange strawberry mixture over pudding and top with whipped, instant crystals. Spiced Strawberry-Pineapple Cups (4-6 servings) One-half cup sugar, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 2 cinnamon sticks, 2 cups diced, fresh pineapple; 1 pint fresh strawberries. Combine sugar and water; heat to boiling point. Add nutmeg and cinnamon sticks; cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, 10 minutes. Add pineapple and strawberries; mix lightly and chill.
