called "Scotty"), has the diplomas, certificates, and experience to back up his statement.

In 1931, he entered the old Army Air Corps as a private, and came up through the ranks during the war to become a captain, which grade he held recently upon retirement after 26 years of active duty.

Scott, a native of Eastland County, was reared in Gorman, and attended schools there. However, the lure of travel and excitement led him to choose the military service as a career.

During his 26 years of service, there is hardly a spot on earth he has not seen. Take, for example, this run-down: Hawaii, Midway, Christmas Island, Fiji Islands, New Caledonia, New Hebrides, Guadalcanal, Australia, New Zealand, Libya (where, Scott said, the temperature once stayed at 135 degrees for 27 days, never dropping below 112 at night), Tunisia, Mal-

ta, Sicily, Italy, Capri, Switzerland, Germany, Belgium, Spain, England, Holland, Turkey, Greece and Egypt.

Scott was at Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, and saw the first Japanese bombs dropped. Elaborating on this historical occasion, he said, "I even noticed a piece of bomb fragment with the word 'Studebaker' embossed on it." "This was some of the metal sold to the Japanese in 1939-40, and returned to us by way of their bombers."

Scott's duty in the Air Force consisted of airport construction and maintenance engineer. He estimates he has had 17 years experience along this line, having supervised the construction of runways on about nine major airforce installations. Training for this type of work came from the Air Force Technical Institute, and Denver University. According to Scott, his toughest jobs were on the islands of the South Pacific during the war, due to the sandy nature of the soil.

However, Scott's amazing storehouse of technical knowledge doesn't just stop here.

At one time during his stint in the service, he trained for nine months under the city manager of Dayton, Ohio, for a job as Military Government official. This training included working right along with the Dayton City manager, learning all there was to learn about running a city, including the building and maintenance of streets, sewer lines, and water lines, the delicate city tax structure, and best ways of collecting same, working on the City's Master plan, which is the plan all cities must have, Scott says, if they are to expand their city limits, and grow; he also learned the work and job of the fire marshal, how to run a fire department and keep city fire losses to a minimum; and, the inner-workings of a modern city's police department; "And," Scott says, "topped off with a generous helping of city grounds and park maintenance." And, speaking of airports, and their runways, Scott said, "The best and cheapest form of building airport runways and taxiways in this section of the country, and this applies particularly to small towns, is the 'cement-soil-stabilization' method." Scott said he once supervised the reconstruction of all streets at Shepherd Air Force Base, and this method was used and proved very satisfactory.

Another one of Scott's many facets is his background in photography. According to him, he has had about 30 years experience as a photographer, at one time owning his own studio. Scott says he is proud to hold the title of "master" (Continued On Page Six).

FHA Operating With 117 Fewer Employees Now

Farmers Home Administration will operate its program in Texas this year with 117 fewer employees than it had a year ago at this time according to a statement this week from Walter T. McKay, the agency's state director. Since the break of the drought, the agency, statewide, has reduced its force by more than 27 percent and has discontinued seven of its field offices on a full-time basis. Under the new setup Eastland is now one of the area headquarters.

Insofar as the employees who lost their jobs, McKay said that in practically every case the training and experience they gained during their employment with Farmers Home Administration enabled them to step into jobs with banks, PCA's and other private and cooperative credit institutions—many of them at salaries better than they had with the government.

In connection with the services available to farm families, there will be no change according to McKay. He said that during the past three years more than 12,000 farmers and ranchers paid their loans in full to Farmers Home Administration, and for the most part had reached or regained a position where private and cooperative sources can now handle their credit needs.

Farmers Home Administration will continue to make loans to eligible applicants for farm and home operating expenses; for the purchase of livestock and equipment needed to put their farm programs on a sound basis and to finance farm real estate and improvements.

Mavs Picked In Show Spot

Eastland's Mavericks are rated third in District 7-AA by the coaches of the district. That fact was brought out during the recent coaching school held at Fort Worth.

Cisco was picked to win the district. Ballinger was rated second, Eastland third, Coleman fourth, Winters fifth and Ranger sixth.

The Eastland rating came as a surprise to most local observers. It is a lot higher than Eastland fans expected. Here is a summary of teams in the district made by the coaches themselves: The rating of the district team as predicted by the district coaches will be: Cisco, Ballinger, Eastland, Coleman, Winters and Ranger. The basis of these predictions are 1. Cisco lost several top boys and the areas leading scorer (Randall Hess). But have several experienced backs returning and one of the top fullbacks (Duane Hale).

The line will be fairly weak. 2. Ballinger returns several starters and returns more lettermen than any district team. They have a good size and speed. Not too surprising if they upset Cisco. They lost two outstanding backs in Jerry Candler (all-state mention) and Ken Wiggington. They seem to lack the top boy, such as Hale of Cisco, to go in the clutches. 3. Eastland returns several starters. Have a well coached team with lots of desire. The dark horse of the district. 4. Coleman, well coached, well drilled team. Young but aggressive. Have several sophomores and juniors starting. By district play they could be capable of beating any district team. 5. Winters lost nucleus of ball club in Jimmy Largent, 183 pound half-back, and Jerry Kroetz, all-area guard. Real small with starting line average 152 pounds and only three boys on team over 165. Strong on desire—short on depth and size.

Soil Stamps to Go On Sale In Area August 27

Supporters of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District and persons interested in commemorative stamps will be able to purchase a four-cent soil conservation stamp locally starting August 27, C. M. McCain said today.

Although the Post Office Department is printing 120 million copies of the three-color soil conservation stamp, which portrays a modern conservation farm, the edition won't last long, McCain predicted.

The stamp is being issued at Rapid City, S. D. on August 26 as a tribute to conservation farmers and ranchers, their local soil conservation districts, and the professional conservationists of State and Federal agencies who assist them.

"I'm sure that most everyone in the Upper Leon SCD district will want to buy these colorful and historical stamps when they go on sale here," McCain said.

Those who are interested in a "first-day cover," a souvenir envelope, can mail addressed envelopes plus a remittance for postage, to the postmaster at Rapid City, S. D., who will place the soil conservation stamp on the envelopes, cancel with a special cancellation mark used only on that day and at that place, and mail as addressed anywhere in the country, McCain pointed out.

ter photographer", and he considers the highlight of his photography career happened in New Mexico during the war when he was selected to make the portrait of the Scientists and Military officials connected with the exploding of the first atom bomb. He has had advanced training in the intricate, delicate, and highly technical field of color photography, a skill which is normally restricted to large city laboratories that process color negatives.

Scott's other varied activities include football and coaching. While coaching air force teams, he has had seven championship teams.

As a hobby, Scotty took up playing bridge many years ago. It culminated in 1955-56 when he, and his partner Stanley Mills, treasurer of the UN in Libya, were awarded the "European championship" in matched pairs by beating the Italian team. Scott considers Oswald Jacoby of Dallas the world's greatest bridge player, even above Charles Goren. And, rather modestly admitted that he had beaten Jacoby several times at his own game. Scott says, "That guy can actually sleep for a few minutes while the cards are being dealt." "And, he's the only person I ever saw who could play bridge, play chess, and read a book... all at the same time."

Scott, who has conducted several bridge classes, and directed bridge tournaments, said he hoped to get a group of interested bridge players started in the tri-cities area playing "Duplicate" bridge.

Now that Scott has retired, at the relatively young age of 46, he plans to fish, boat, hunt and play bridge.

Scotty said, "I suppose I'm one of the few remaining proponents of the split bamboo rod. I make my own".

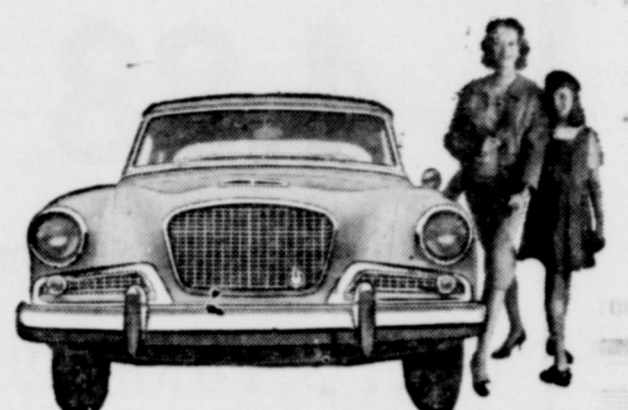
