FHA Operating With 117 Fewer **Employees Now**

Farmers Home Administration will operate its program in Texas his year with 117 fewer employe s than it had a year ago at thi ime according to a statement this week from Walter T. McKay, the agency's state director. Since the break of the drought, the agency statewide, has reduced its force by more than 27 percent and has discontinued seven of its field offices on a full-time basis. Under the ew setup Eastland is now one of the area headquarters.
