AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C. — In 1950 the Federal Government will again take a census. Uncle Sam will be taking an inventory of his people as to where they are, what they do and other details about our approximate 180 million Americans.

The machinery is already being put in order to conduct this vast undertaking which will last only a few weeks. Some 170,000 persons will be employed on a temporary basis to assist the Census Bureau officials in this mammoth effort.

Since the executive department is under the control of the Republicans, it will be their first census since 1930. It will be their job to recruit people to do the work. All persons to be hired must pass a qualifying test showing them capable of gathering and submitting the proper information.

Why is all this necessary? It is going to cost a lot of money, as it does every 10 years, but the information obtained is used largely by the business interests in private enterprise and by state and local governments.

Countless decisions are made and actions taken based on the facts concerning the Nation's population. Business depends on these statistics produced by a census in order to plan location, expenditures and other matters of judgment.

Decisions relating to the location of utilities, roads, schools, hospitals, water supply and other public planning is based on the numbers and types of people in a given area and the rate at which the area is changing in size and character. Details used in advertising of almost every product conceivable is a matter of judgment based on information from the census.

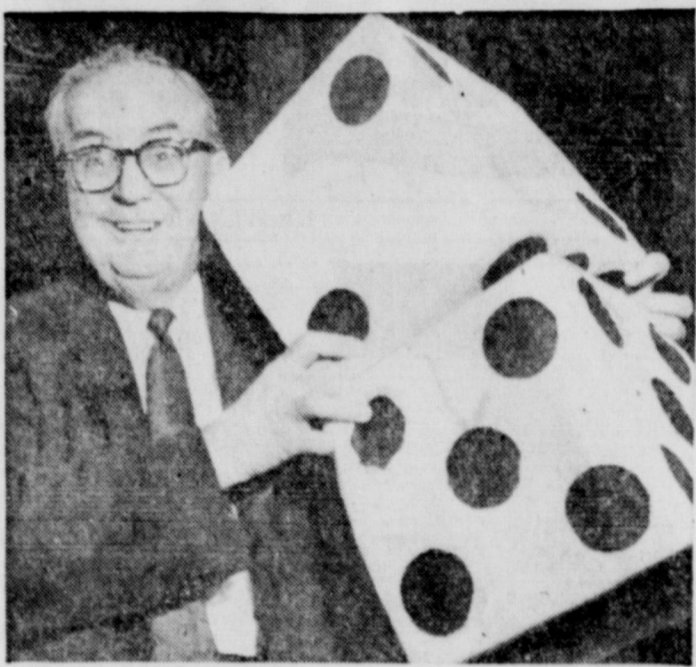

municipal and Federal laws depends on the size of a state, county or municipal population, since this information is a qualifying factor.

Not the least important is the way the census figures affect our Government. The number of Representatives in Congress from the various states are based on population. After results of the census are known, states lose or gain representation in the Congress.

The U. S. Senate Labor Committee has approved a bill by Senator Hubert Humphrey which revises the old Youth Conservation Corps, along the lines known as the CCC in the early depression days. Just what the purpose of it is in this day and time is difficult to understand.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

That interest in O. Henry is still keen, nearly 50 years after his death, is shown by the fact that the two copies of his latest biography in the Austin Public Library were taken out 38 times in 1958. The book is Gerald Langford's "Alias O. Henry". The fact that O. Henry lived in Austin as a young man and the further fact that the biographer is a member of the faculty of the University of Texas may have given the book an appeal greater than in other cities but, allowing for these factors, it is evident that many people find the life story of the short story writer of real interest. There have been many surmises as to the origin of William Sidney Porter's nom de plume. The one often encountered is that it was derived from the name of an official in the prison where Porter served a term for embezzlement—a charge of which many believe he was not guilty. But Porter linked his name and the pseudonym, O. Henry, in an inscription in an Austin album in 1886, which was long before his tragedy.

When I went to Eastland in the summer of 1921, a predecessor as editor of the Daily Oil Belt News had been Hec. A. McEachin (pronounced, approximately, "Mc-Cann") and some of the publicity articles and publications still came addressed to him as the editor.

It was not until years later that I learned that he had been connected with O. Henry's magazine, the "Rolling Stone". The publication announced that H. A. McEachin was "associated in the business and management of this paper." The association was brief for, only four issues later, the career of the paper came to an end.

I met McEachin only one time and that when he paid a short visit to the Oil Belt News office along about 1923. I recall him as heavy-set and as smoking a pipe. Had I known then that he had been O. Henry's companion, he would have been plied with questions. McEachin, being a newspaperman, doubtless could have told much more than did the untrained observers of O. Henry's Austin days. So far as I know, McEachin never wrote down his impressions and experiences and so the information is lost.

Home Accidents Kill 27,000 Persons a Year

Be it ever so humble, there's no place like home — despite the kitchen floor: 1. Water or grease on the floor; 2. An unlighted stair, or toys and boxes piled on stair steps; 3. Oily rags or papers left in a corner of the basement; 4. Dull knives, which are dangerous because they force the use.

To apply too much pressure, and because most people don't have the proper respect for them: 5. Pots on the stove, the handles turned out for little hands to grab; 6. Rubbing alcohol, candy-coated laxatives, and aspirin left for small children to sample.

The statistics might make you wonder about "home, sweet home." 1. Home accidents kill more children 1-4 years of age than any disease. 2. Home falls take 12,000 lives a year. 3. Home fires and other burns take the lives of 5,500 persons annually. 4. Accidental poisoning in the home claims 1,000 victims a year. "Home accidents," the National Safety Council reports, "kill 27,000 persons a year, and injure more than four million. "In view of these facts," the Council said, "you may well be concerned with the safety of your home. "But when you stop and consider the great number of hours spent in the home, the statistics are more understandable even if the danger is just as real. "A hazard-free home, the Council said, results from practicing the safe way of doing things. "You'll soon do them automatically," it predicted. Here are some danger signals to watch out for in the home:

Fertilizer Tests Show Value of Soil Testing

COLLEGE STATION—In eight fertilizer demonstrations conducted on cotton in Hockley County in 1958, soil tests closely predicted the most profitable rate to use in all but one case, W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist.

Prior to establishing the demonstrations, Bill Taylor, Hockley county agricultural agent, sampled the demonstration sites. The samples were then tested by the A & M College Soil Testing Laboratory and fertilizer recommendations were made. These recommendations were then compared to the actual results of the demonstration, said Bennett.

On one farm the soil test showed that a 50-60-0 fertilizer was needed. The highest profit rate on this farm proved to be 45-60-0. On another farm the recommendations called for a 50-60-0 fertilizer. The highest profit rate here proved to be a 50-60-0 fertilizer. Results on two farms showed that a rate higher than recommended by the soil test was the most profitable, but the soil test rate was the second highest profit rate.

Only on one farm did the soil tests not closely predict need. In this demonstration, there was no profitable response to any fertilizer application. Bennett points out that there are many factors that affect crop yields which a laboratory cannot analyze. But a farmer can put a soil test recommendation together with these factors and come up with a better decision on proper fertilizer rates, said Bennett.
