



Fertilizer Tests Show Value of Soil Testing

COLLEGE STATION-In eight ertilizer demonstrations conducted on cotton in Hockley County in 1958, soil tests closely predicted the most profitable rate to use in all but one case, W. F. Bennett, xtension soil chemist.

Prior to establishing the demon trations, Bill Taylor, Hockley ounty agricultural agent, sampled he demonstration sites. The sampes were then tested by the A & M College Soil Testing Laboratory nd fertilizer recommendations were made. These recommendations were then compared to the on, said Bennett.

On one farm the soil test showed that a 50-60-0 fertilizer was needed. The highest profit rate on this farm proved to be 45-60-0. On another farm the recommendations called for a 50-60-0 fertilizer. The ighest profit rate here proved to e a 50-60-0 fertilizer.

Results on two farms showed that a rate higher than recommended by the soil test was the most profitable, but the soil test rate was the second highest profit

Only on one farm did the soil ests not closely predict need. In this demonstration, there was no profitable response to any fertilizer application.

nnett noints are many factors that affect crop yields which a laboratory cannot analyze. But a farmer can put a soil test recommendation together with these factors and come up with a better decision on proper ertilizer rates, said Bennett.


