Records Show Lake Popular

It all started about ten years ago, back in 1949 the people of Ranger and Eastland got together and made plans to build a new lake that would assure them of an ample water supply. After much planning and work the lake became a reality. The building of Lake Leon has done more for the Eastland-Ranger area than any project ever undertaken by either of the two cities.

Besides furnishing an inexhaustible water supply for the two towns, it is becoming to be known as one of the most wide-known fishing and recreation spots in West Texas. Some of the finest catches of catfish, bass and crappie reported this year came out of Lake Leon. In the spring of this year when crappie fishing was at its best it was not unusual for strings of crappie averaging three pounds each to be brought in. Good strings of channel and yellow catfish have been taken out of the lake all of the past few years. Bass have been taking the hook all summer in the early hours of the morning. This has brought fishermen from all over the state and from as far away as California and Washington, D. C. to try their luck in the fish-infested waters.

Out of the total amount of annual fishing permits sold in 1959, 21 percent have been bought by out-of-county residents. To give some idea of the distance that people are traveling to fish in our lake the out-of-county cities are: Fort Worth, Kermit, Breckenridge, Munday, Austin, Abilene, Palestine, Stephenville, Tomball, Goldsmith, Midland, Odessa, Sweetwater, Maryvale, Elden, Dallas, Hillsboro, Dublin, Palo Pinto, Plains, Amarillo, Crane, Seymour, Evant, Plainview, Hale Center, Lubbock, Caddo, Mineral Wells, Andrews, Galveston, Snyder, and Alice. Also two from New Mexico and one from California.

Two Eastland Students to Get H-SU Degrees

ROTARIANS HEAR OTHER SIDE

Red Terror Described By Former Hungariain

A former Hungarian army officer, in a speech to Eastland Rotarians Monday, charged the Soviet Union with using "unprecedented cruelty" to bring nations behind the Iron Curtain under their control.

Paul DeCleva, now a Fort Worth oilman, also condemned the upcoming visit of Soviet Prime Minister Khrushchev to the United States. He said it would make persons living behind the Iron Curtain think the U.S. accepts some of Russia's political views.

DeCleva was introduced by Mike George, program chairman, and a friend of the Fort Worth oilman.

DeCleva would not say how he escaped from behind the Iron Curtain.

"Until 1948," he told Rotarians, "I was in the Hungarian military service and I was confined behind the Iron Curtain without any hope that I would ever get out from Hungary or better my position inside Hungary. As a matter of fact, as the communist forces grew stronger, it was more and more evident that they would oppose my physical existence, which in their language means concentration

camp or some convenient form of execution. In order to be accused you did not need to have too much reason. My father was a doctor in a resort place and we were, you may say, well to do citizens in our community.

"These factors were considered as bourgeois type of citizenry, therefore unnecessary and a class enemy to the workman. The liquidation of these elements had started on an upper level and it was just a question of time that it would reach me, unless I wanted to make a large concession to the communist, namely to volunteer to become a communist party member and assume the obligations it takes to be a communist."

DeCleva said that Hungary enjoyed freedom before World War II.

"When the Russians occupied Hungary in 1944, they immediately established those institutions which they could not live without under any circumstances, therefore by decree they have nationalized all banks, railroads, department stores, mines and air-lanes. To be sure that their program is carried out, the chairman of the board or the so called advisor, was a communist Russian

at each place. There was a stiff opposition, which cost the lives of many of the Hungarians when this program was to expand. However, nothing could stop them, they felt fit to put a stop to any kind of private ownership. Therefore they have taken possession of apartment houses and residential homes. In order to show the legality of their action, they have elected to raise the taxes of these real estate to the total value of the property, which of course nobody could pay."

Speaking of Khrushchev, the visiting speaker declared, "If there is anybody responsible for creating miserable central Europe, it is certainly Mr. Khrushchev. His idea about freedom and liberty has been expressed during the revolution in Hungary in 1946 and the uprising of the Tibetans last year. It is regrettable that a man of Khrushchev's quality can come into consideration in connection with an official state visit or any diplomatic mission at this time. The interpretation of his visit behind the iron curtain means only some kind of acknowledgement of his political views and we may not consider it that way, but I wonder if you would sit hopefully in Budapest or Bucharest, what you would think about the red carpet treatment of the hated dictator. The dangerous part about it is that this part will completely do away with any willingness for further resistance or revolution as a hopeless cause, unsupported by anybody."

DeCleva admitted, however, that some good could come from the visit. He said it may be possible that more Americans will be able to cross behind the iron curtain after the Russian leader's trip to the U. S. He said this would be a great victory for the U. S. since Russian people are not informed about events and would have the opportunity to meet Americans first hand.

The speaker, who was speaking to the same men who just a few short weeks ago heard a Russian diplomat paint a peaceful picture of Russia, told his listeners that the secret police behind the iron curtain are highly feared.

"It is not just a tale that they have established brain washing methods and torture chambers for the unwilling populous," he declared. "I myself have witnessed some of this and I know of at least a half-dozen Hungarians who can describe to you and show you the effects of some of the most torturous treatment which they have received in communist jails for no reason."

In conclusion, DeCleva said, "If I could describe you properly the feeling which I had felt after I left the iron curtain, you could perhaps appreciate what I meant, therefore I feel it is a patriotic duty of mine to remind you that our responsibility towards our own future and that of our children lies in our hands by properly adjusting the current events."
