



## Mavs Tame Dublin and Post One-Sided Win

### Locals Look Great In 36-6 Victory

The Eastland Mavericks threw themselves up a solid umbrella here Friday night to completely halt Dublin's passing game, then got tougher than their visitors on the ground to take an encouraging 36-6 victory.

The Mavs completely outclassed the Lions as some of Coach Carroll Shelton's younger charges jelled into full fledged Mavericks. The Mav backfield especially came to life, with seven backs showing up in fine style. Most noticeable change was the complete control Junior quarterback Mickey Garner possessed. Garner showed greatness in the game, mixed his plays well, did some fine running and

extra point, making it 23-0 at halftime.

Dublin got back into the game in a hurry on the second half kickoff. James Williamson picked up the kickoff on his own 18. He ran straight down the middle, picking up some beautiful blocking. It looked like Wilson would be able to slow the runner down enough so that he could be caught from behind, but four blockers solved that problem. The extra point running play failed to click.

The Mavs got themselves a third quarter rally when Lewis powered over from the eight to climax a 62-yard drive. Garner kicked the extra point.

Eastland's final TD came when the Mav line partially blocked a Dublin quick kick. Lewis ran under the ball at the 15 and lugged it across for the final Mav points.

In other 7-AA action Hamlin beat Spur, 14-12, Ranger lost to 3-A Mineral Wells, 42-20, Ballinger was downed by Stamford, 55-6, and Coleman beat Comanche, 22-0.

### Display Shows Part Airport Opening Thursday Due to Attract Flyers

Why overgrazing native grass does not pay is aptly illustrated in a display now in the lobby of the Eastland National Bank. The display shows the root system and crowns of two little bluestem plants which were grown in deep containers last year for a full season's growth. One plant was clipped each 30 days, while the other was not clipped until the end of the growing season. Total forage produced by the unclipped plant was 113.5 grams or about 1.4 pound. Clipping each month on the other plant reduced the total forage yield to only 37.1 grams or about 1-12 pound.

Forage yield is only half the story however. Total weight of both crown and roots was 400 grams or about .87 lbs. on the unclipped plant. Total weight of crown and roots on the clipped plant was 175 grams or about .38 lbs.

The display illustrates the scientific fact that removal of foliage on any plant destroys a portion of the "food factory" and thus reduces the production of organic food within the plant. Application of this principle to grassland management means controlling grazing to the degree of always leaving sufficient leaf and stem growth for the manufacturer of food by the most desirable plants in the pasture. Another application might be the removal of stem and leaf growth on undesirable plants to prevent their manufacturer of food. Unfortunately livestock can be trained to graze undesirable plants and leave desirable ones. This can only be accompanied by grazing management to favor the better plants in different pastures according to their season of growth.

Continued close grazing shortens the root system and the grass eventually dies. Under continued year round grazing naturally the better grasses most favored by livestock die first.

In addition close grazing eliminates the surface grass litter so important for soaking rainfall into the soil for plant growth.

The display was arranged by Lewis Yarett, range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Stephenville, assisting the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District.

### 8000 School Buses Carry 2 Million Pupils Each Day

Texas' largest transportation system is now in full swing—the State's fleet of more than 8,000 school buses. Furthermore, for the next nine months, these buses will carry the bulk of nearly 2,000,000 pupils to and from school each week day.

It is truly a Texas-size task to transport all these pupils — it is an even greater task to transport them safely. No one will deny the school bus driver has a tremendous responsibility.

But, says the Texas Safety Association, motorists are also charged with the safety of our school bus riding pupils. The State law is very precise on this point and reads as follows:

Sec. 104. Overtaking and Passing School Bus

a. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus, which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

b. Every bus used for the transportation of school children shall bear upon the front and rear thereon a plainly visible sign containing the words "school bus" in letters not less than eight inches in height.

c. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway with separate roadways need not stop upon meeting or passing a school bus which is on a different roadway or when upon a controlled-access highway and the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to such highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway.

d. Every bus used for the transportation of school children shall bear upon the front and rear thereon a plainly visible sign containing the words "school bus" in letters not less than eight inches in height.

e. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway with separate roadways need not stop upon meeting or passing a school bus which is on a different roadway or when upon a controlled-access highway and the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to such highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway.

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### Darkness Is Now Major Traffic DANGER

AUSTIN — J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, said today that "darkness" is one of the major traffic dangers faced by pedestrians and motorists alike.

"With the approach of shortening Fall days, it is doubly important that we adjust our walking and driving habits," Musick said.

"When driving at night a motorist can't see an object until it comes within range of his headlights. It's obvious that if he is driving at a speed that won't permit him to stop within the range of his headlights he will hit whatever is in his path.

"However, lowered speed is not the whole solution," Musick added. "To see danger quickly and act immediately to avoid it, the driver must be aware there is always the possibility that danger lurks in the shadows ahead."

Musick pointed out that the pedestrian is similarly handicapped at night. But the pedestrian has the advantage of being able to see a vehicle's headlights long before the motorist can see him, so the prime responsibility for his safety rests with himself.

The safety expert advised pedestrians to wear something made of white or reflectized material when walking at night. Carrying a flashlight, or even a newspaper, will help drivers spot him sooner.

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

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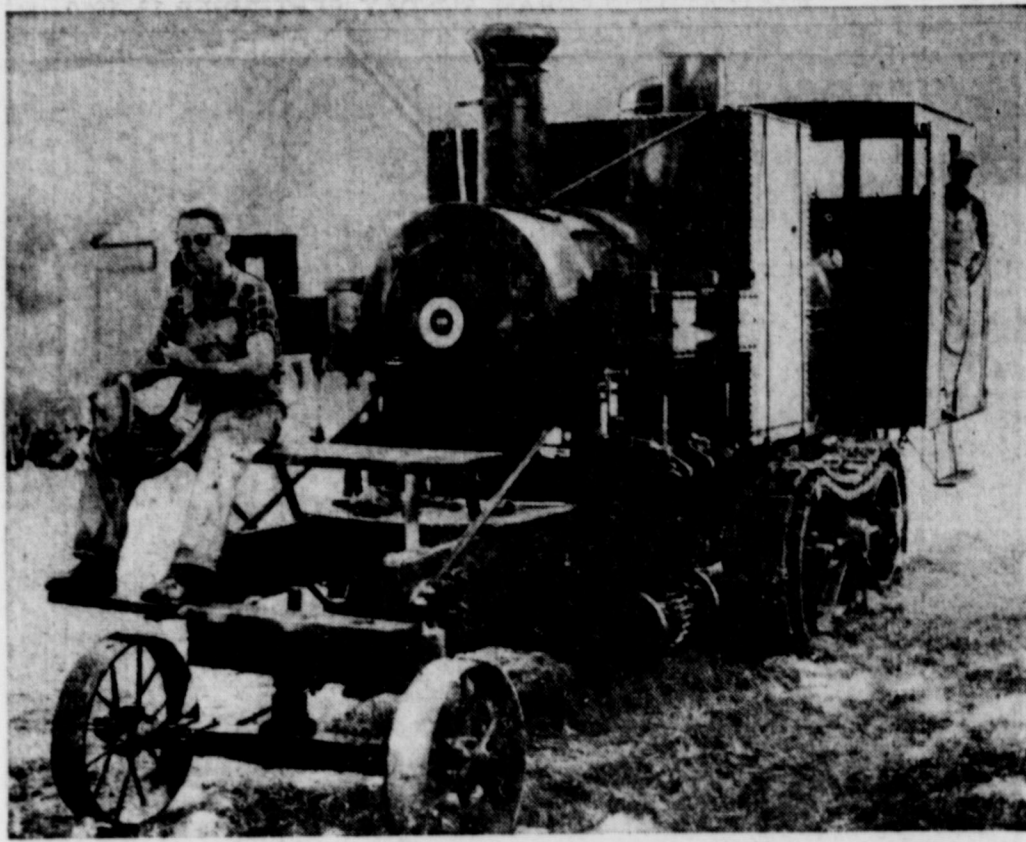
