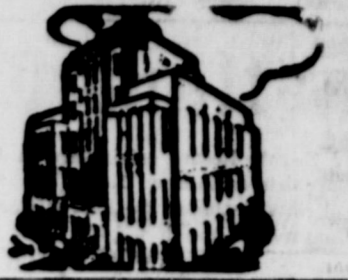

Cisco College Vocational Branch Here

The Vocational branch of Cisco Junior College is located in Eastland. The school has its building on West Plummer Street in Eastland. Three courses are offered and three teachers direct the school program.

O. D. Philips teaches the welding course, which is offered for two years. In this course the student learns the fundamentals of welding, designing and construction. Two types of welding are taught, acetylene and electric.

Olin Odom teaches the bookkeeping and accounting classes at the school. The bookkeeping course is for two years and is divided into introductory and advanced bookkeeping. In the accounting course the student learns to use many types of accounting machines.

Robert Donovan is coordinator for the school. The tuition for the school is \$30.00 per month, depending on the courses taken. There are 25 to 30 students now enrolled, and the classes meet five nights each week for twelve months in the year. This school is open to all. A student can transfer from the school to another of its kind in the state, if he must move for some reason because there are many schools of this kind in the state and they are also under state supervision.

If one does not want to attend college, then this school gives him a wonderful opportunity to learn a trade.
