AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Most of the States of the Union, like Texas, are having to look for new sources of tax revenue. Many of the Governors faced with bitter opposition to their tax programs are looking to Washington for help. They ask the question, and quite properly: "Can anything be done to return to the hard pressed States sources of taxes now collected by the Federal Government?"

This should be done, and if an appreciable amount of tax sources were relinquished to the States, grants-in-aid from the Federal Government should likewise be reduced by the same token that States' rights have been invaded by Washington, States would have the responsibility of doing those things for themselves to which they now look to Uncle Sam.

It has been suggested to the President that he immediately appoint a commission of experts to explore Federal-State tax relationships. Similar commissions have made this effort before, including one composed of the Governors of the several States. The problem is not to find out what should be done but simply to set about doing it.

Incidentally, it is understood the President is considering creating another commission of tax experts representing finance, industry, labor and various shades of political opinion, to study our complex tax system and make recommendations for more equitable treatment of taxpayers.

It is seemingly always easy to appoint a commission. Congress itself should do the job with the help and recommendation of the Executive Department.

One of the biggest subsidy payments by the Federal Government goes to the shipbuilding industry. Not only are the shipbuilders subsidized in the construction of vessels, but also for their operation.

American export lines is soon to receive a grant of 48.3 per cent of the cost of four new cargo vessels. The subsidy allowance is based on comparative costs in Japanese shipyards for ships of similar size and speed.

The maritime board determined that vessels of the type to be built for American Export Lines would cost approximately \$5,555,000 each if they were built in Japan. The cost in this country by the National Steel and Shipbuilding Corporation of San Diego, California, the low bidder, will be \$10,894,997 for each of the four ships.

Congressman J. T. Rutherford, representing the District from Odessa to El Paso, came up with a bit of interesting information a few days ago on time zones. Washington has now gone on Daylight Saving Time, which makes it two hours earlier here than in Texas, with the exception of El Paso here the difference is three hours. El Paso is on Mountain Standard Time.

The information turned up by Rutherford was that until 1883 there were no established time standards in the United States. The railroads then adopted the four standards now used. After 1883 each State or municipality (Continued on Page Two)

The meeting will begin at 10 a. m. A Dutch lunch is planned at noon.

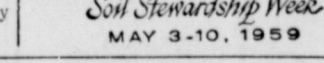
Eddie J. Flippin Completes Army Engineer Course

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

A block of native stone on top of which has been crudely chiseled just two words, "Sam Bass," marks the grave of Texas' most renowned bandit. It was quite a few years ago that I visited the spot, with J. H. Kavanaugh who, for a long time was editor of the Round Rock Leader, as my guide.

In a corner of the old cemetery, under the shade of a large tree, side by side, are the graves of the "Robin Hood of Texas" and his "right hand," Sebe Barnes. A small stone with no inscription marks Barnes' grave.

There have been two previous monuments to Bass' resting place; one was entirely destroyed by souvenir hunters and, of the second, only the base is left. The original monument was erected by Sam's sister. The wording, besides the name and dates of birth and death, read, "A brave man reposes in death here. Why was he not true?"

A debate has gone on almost from the day of Bass' death as to who killed him in the Round Rock battle. One group maintains the fatal shot was fired by Ranger Ware; another group contends that the distinction belongs to Ranger Harrell.

Mr. Kavanaugh took no sides in the debate. However, he did relate that, years before a retired Ranger named Jackson ran a dining hall in Lometa, Jackson and Chris Connor were in the Ranger service together; in fact, they usually worked as a pair. Connor was one of the first Rangers to reach Round Rock when the "tip" came from a traitor in Bass' gang that the Round Rock bank was to be held up. Connor, Ware and Harrell came to the town together to take part in the plan to trap the outlaws.

The injudicious attempt of an officer to arrest Bass for carrying a pistol — (the officer had been advised by Major Jones of the

Rangers to avoid precipitating matters) — set off the battle, prematurely. The officer paid with his life — the only man Bass killed during his career, which included five train robberies and a number of stage-coach holdups.

When the shooting broke out, Rangers and citizens joined in. Barnes was killed and Bass was mortally wounded. Frank Jackson of Bass' gang helped his disabled chief into the saddle, and, at the same time, single-handedly fought back a dozen or so adversaries. The two rode out of town, the outlaw continuing to fire.

Next day, Bass was captured. He had been left by his reluctant companion who had offered to remain and fight to the last. But Sam told him, "I'm done for; you go on." The captured robber was taken back to Round Rock where he lingered in great pain for two days. His mind was lucid and he talked freely but would not "tell off" on his pals. He died on his twenty-seventh birthday.

Now back to what Jackson, the retired Ranger (not to be confused with the other Jackson who was Bass' associate), told Editor Kavanaugh. Connor decided to resign as a Ranger and, on his last day in the service, Jackson asked him who killed Sam Bass. Connor (who had been in as good position to know as anyone) said, in substance:

"There were 50 shots fired and it could have been any one of them."

So it looks as though the mystery will never be solved.

Deelores Cooper Is Nominated for English Award

Deelores June Cooper of Olden High School has been nominated for the annual Achievement Awards program, sponsored by the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE).

In its second year, the Awards program is being conducted throughout the nation to grant recognition to outstanding high school seniors for excellence in English. The writing abilities and literary aptitudes of each nominee will be judged by local state committees. The winners will be announced in January, 1960 by the NCTE, and the names of the Awards winners will be sent to every U.S. college and university with the recommendation that these students be considered for scholarship assistance.

According to J. N. Hook, NCTE executive secretary, the Awards program was initiated last year in response to President Eisenhower's statement that America needs its Emersons as well as its Einsteins. "There were more than 2,000 nominees for the first Awards," said Hook, "and we expect about 5000 for this second round."

"The quality of the writing submitted by last year's winners and runners-up was very high," Hook asserted. "It constitutes a positive answer to statements that American youth cannot write effectively. These students, and thousands more, are learning to use the language with precision and vividness."

Founded in 1911, the NCTE is a professional, not-for-profit organization of teachers of English at all levels. Currently the circulation of the Council's five professional publications is over 51,000.

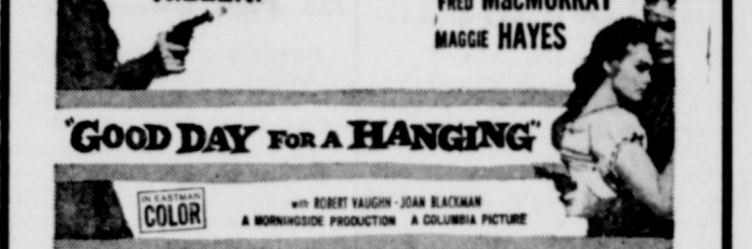

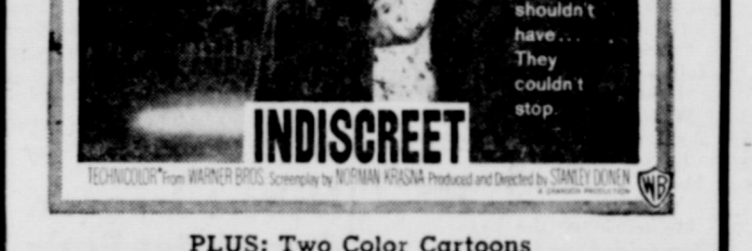

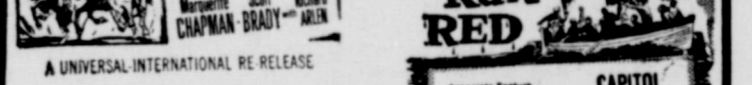
