Dr. Kuykendall, Ranger Physician Taken by Death

Dr. P. M. Kuykendall, 66, physician for 29 years in Ranger, died at 7:55 p.m. Thursday in Ranger General Hospital, following a long illness.

Funeral services will be held in the First Methodist Church of Ranger today (Saturday) at 3 p.m. with Rev. Lively Brown, pastor, officiating. Burial will take place in Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

Masonic graveside services will be held.

Dr. Kuykendall operated the West Texas Clinic and Hospital since 1930, when he first began his practice in Ranger.

Past president of the Chamber of Commerce, Dr. Kuykendall was also past president of the Rotary Club and the Eastland County Medical Association. He was a charter member of the Eastland County Water Board, a member of Masonic Lodge No. 1147 at Desdemona, past master of Ranger Lodge No. 738, a member of the Elks Club and Fort Worth Club.

A veteran of World War I, he was discharged as a major after serving overseas for 18 months.

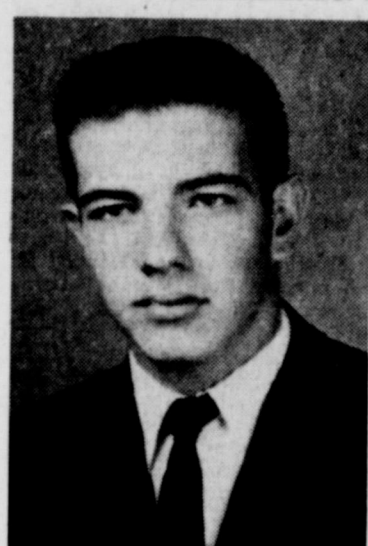

Durhams Named To Membership of Hereford Assoc.

H. H. and N. N. Durham of Eastland today were named to membership in the American Hereford Association, the world's largest purebred registry organization, with headquarters in Kansas City, Mo.

One hundred and eighty seven Hereford breeders were placed on the Association's official roster during April. The Association maintains active accounts for more than 80,000 breeders of registered Herefords over the nation.

The Hereford Association during the last fiscal year recorded 453,632 purebred calves. The year's total recordings were the seventh highest on record, and more than 223,000 above the combined registrations of other major breeds.

Catholics First Met In City During Oil Boom

(Editor's Note: This is the 15th in a series of articles about Eastland churches. Next week's story will feature the United Pentecostal Church.

Eastland County was first visited in 1913 by Reverend Rudolph A. Gerken, dean of Sacred Heart Church at Abilene. In the City of Eastland services were first held in the home of Mrs. James H. Cheatham on S. Seaman St.

The services there were so well attended by the Catholics among the geologists and engineers attracted to Eastland because of the oil boom, that the regular appearance of so many cars in the early morning around the Cheatham residence caused quite a stir. But soon the use of the courthouse (for Sunday services) was allowed to the Catholic community of

Eastland.
In 1921 three lots were donated by C. U. Connellee for the erection of a church. A church was built and furnished in late summer of 1922, at the cost of \$12,500. The Chicago Society for the Extension of the Catholic Faith contributed \$1000 to this building, which was dedicated by Bishop Lynch, of Dallas, on June 16, 1923 and named St. Francis Church. It is on the corner of Halbryan and Foch Streets.

Rev. Rudolph A. Gerken was not only responsible for bringing the Catholic Church to Eastland. He pioneered also in Ranger, (1919), in Cisco (1920), in Breckenridge (1922) and in Pine- neer (1923).

Meanwhile, at the time of the oil boom, Rev. R. A. Gerken had been transferred to Ranger, as pastor of St. Rita's. It is from there that he and his assistants served St. Francis Church in Eastland.

The outstanding services of Father Gerken were recognized by the Church when he was elected bishop of Amarillo, in 1927. Born in 1887 at Dyerville, Iowa, of a family of 13 children, who all reached a mature age, Rev. R. A. Gerken finished a brilliant career as Archbishop of Santa Fe, N. M., where he died on March 2, 1943.

Several pastors of St. Rita's, in Ranger, have served the Catholic congregation of Eastland, during its 37 years of existence. This is a partial list: Rev. S. E. Byrne, Rev. Michael, Rev. John R. Duesman, Rev. August J. ... Rev. Boemans, who left Eastland for mission work in the Republic, W. I.

The actual pastor at this time is Rev. M. Van Hemelryck, known to the Catholics as Father Van. He is a native of Belgium and was born in Brussels in 1904. After graduating from Junior College, he joined the Belgian Missionary Society, called Immaculate Heart Missions, which has missionary priests all over the world. He completed the Seminary Course in Philosophy in Brussels and in Nymegen (Holland) and the Theological Seminary Course at Louvain, where he did further graduate work at the Catholic University. He was sent to North China as a missionary in 1930, two years after his Ordination. He was active in the China Missions, in Shanghai, Jehol and Peking area, until 1946. Recovery from three years concentration camp in Brussels, he was transferred to the American Province

of his order. He served in St. Elizabeth parish, in Philadelphia, Pa., in Missionhurst, headquarters of his Order in Arlington, Va., as a pastor in St. John the Evangelist, San Antonio, where he became a citizen in 1952. He came to Ranger and Eastland, from Arlington, Virginia, where he had served a three years term as Rector of Missionhurst.

Rev. Van Hemelryck is the Catholic priest in charge of Eastland County. Services in Eastland are at 9:30 a.m. on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month, and at 11 a. m. on the 2nd, 4th and 5th Sundays. Catechism is taught every Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 and there is an evening Mass on Tuesdays, at 5:30 p.m.

As representative of the Catholic Church in Eastland, Father Van is responsible to Bishop Thomas K. Gorman, Bishop of Dallas-Fort Worth.

For Catholics, faith means assent to all truths revealed to the Apostles by Christ and contained both in the Bible and in the tradition of the Church which was founded by Christ upon Peter and the Apostles, whose legitimate successors are the Pope and the

agency appointed by Christ to govern and interpret, as well as to dispense the Sacraments to the faithful.

The fundamental Theology of the Catholic includes the following: (1.) Belief in the Blessed Trinity. (2.) Original sin (the fall of Mary above all other saints, and accounts for the presence of evil and sin in the world). (3.) The Incarnation of the son of God. (4.) Redemption of mankind by the sacrificial death of Christ on the Cross. (5.) The veneration of Mary above all other saints, for her close association in the Redemption. (6.) Faith and good works, Church and Sacraments are means to salvation. Catholics believe in 7 sacraments, which came down to us through the tradition of the Church: Baptism, Confirmation, Penance or Confession, Communion, Extreme Unction, Holy Orders and Matrimony.

(7.) Salvation by God's grace, which is union with Christ, friendship with God; man helps gain it by Faith plus obedience to the Divine Law. (8.) Damnation is man's fault, by rejection of Faith or refusal to comply with God's Law. (9.) Salvation depends on final dispositions of the soul at the moment of death.

(10.) Man's final goal is Heaven, possession of God. The normal way to it is membership in Church, living up to Faith by good deeds, by the observance of the Commandments and the Church laws. Failure results in damnation: loss of God for eternity.

(11.) Final resurrection of all men will happen at Christ's second coming; the time is known but to God.

Father Van states: "Those who are invincible ignorance of the true religion are not guilty in the eyes of God and will, aided by the light of divine grace, attain to eternal life."
