## Safety Rules For Flying Kites Outlined

Safety rules for boys and girls who fly kites were outlined today by Frank Sayre, Manager for Texas Electric Service Company, in anticipation of the opening of the 1955 kite flying season.

As explained by Sayre, the five safety rules in order of their importance are: First, fly your kite out in the open where it won't get caught in wires or trees. Second, use only string made of cotton, silk, linen, nylon or rayon. Third, use only wood in your kite frames. Fourth, fly kites only in good weather. You don't want to get them rain soaked. And fifth, if your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Company. They will send someone to get it down for you, Sayre explained.

"Local youngsters who fly kites have been very careful in the past about where and when they flew their kites," Sayre stated. "We had a perfect record last year with not one boy or girl being injured and only a few kites demolished. This year, I fully expected that every year, our boys and girls listen more carefully to our warnings."

## Safety Award Given Lone Star Gas Employees

Lone Star Gas Company employees in the Eastland District of Distribution have attained a five-year perfect safety record representing 113,512 hours of company work without a lost-time accident.

District Manager H. C. Westfall has been advised of the accomplishment by A. W. Breeland of Dallas, assistant personnel director in charge of safety.

Mr. Breeland pointed out that the Eastland District is one of 107 Lone Star units in Texas and Oklahoma with perfect safety records through December 31, 1954. These records range from one through 25 years and their cumulative total is 457 years.

Mr. Westfall lauded his fellow workers for their "day-in and day-out efforts toward accident prevention."

"Our safety record," he said, "reflects Lone Star's constant program of training personnel on the importance of safety, not only to protect their lives but the lives of the men, women and children who represent the public we serve."

A framed certificate pointing up the safety accomplishment will be presented to district employees at the next regular safety meeting. It will bear the signature of President D. A. Huley and other Lone Star officials.

The Eastland District, averaging nine employees, consists of Eastland, the district headquarters, and Morton Valley, Strawn, Gordon and Lipan.

## Moisture Totals As Much As 1.40 Inches

Heavy, winter clouds brought up to 1.40 inches of moisture to the Eastland area Thursday night, Friday and Saturday and additional thundershowers were forecast from a low pressure area in West Texas.

After a night of intermittent showers and drizzle, a heavy downpour near 3 a.m. Friday morning deposited most of the water here. Heavy fog preceded the rain Thursday night.

New Lake Leon was still rising steadily after Saturday's downpour.

Early grain and cover crops were greatly aided by the showers which replaced the moisture that had been carried away by dry winds in the past weeks, farmers within the county reported.

Tornado warnings were issued in parts of Central Texas, but no twisters were reported and the warning was removed as nightfall enveloped the area.

In other sections of the state, a five inch down pour hit Harris County from a line squall moving with a cold front.

Weather officials described the rains as the best moisture that Texas has experienced this year. They warned however, that more was needed to restore soil that had been sapped by five years of drought.

Small grain crops, including winter wheat were greatly aided by the moisture and stock tanks throughout the state were replenished.

Lightest rains over the entire state were in the extreme Panhandle, where snow falling and freezing weather made the winter picture Friday.

In local areas, rainfall reported was: Eastland, 1.01; Rising Star, 1.20; Cisco, 1.02; Breckenridge, .68; Clyde, .80; Fort Worth, 1.22; Houston, .38; Mineral Wells, .77; and Abilene had rains within the city running from .73 to 1.46 inches.

As the rains continued early Saturday morning here, the weatherman called for clouds over the entire weekend with light showers to continue for the next two days.

## Eastland Guard Members Draw Quarterly Pay

It's pay time again for the members of the Cisco National Guard unit.

At the end of each quarter a payroll is submitted to the Finance Officer, Fourth Army, at Fort Sam Houston, for payment of the Guardsmen by check. About 10 percent of the guardsmen are from Eastland.

The amount varies with the strength of the unit, but it ranges between \$4,000 and \$5,000 each quarter, quite a large sum considering that each man is drawing pay for only one day per week. In addition to the armory drill checks, the men draw another \$5,000 while they are at field training each summer. All that adds up to nearly \$25,000 a year in training pay.

On top of that, the salary of the full-time administrative assistant and money allotted for local purchases will run the total to over \$30,000 annually.

At full strength the unit would bring in approximately \$70,000 annually in salaries, drill pay and payment of expenses incident to armory maintenance.

## Fire Destroys Farm Home Near Eastland Friday

Fire ravaged a farm home four miles east of Eastland Friday, destroying most of the property of the family that made their home in the frame structure.

The W. B. Wilson family was left homeless after the blaze. Friends and relatives were preparing temporary shelter for them.

Eastland firemen answered the call but arrived at the scene too late. The house was located near the Texas Electric power plant.

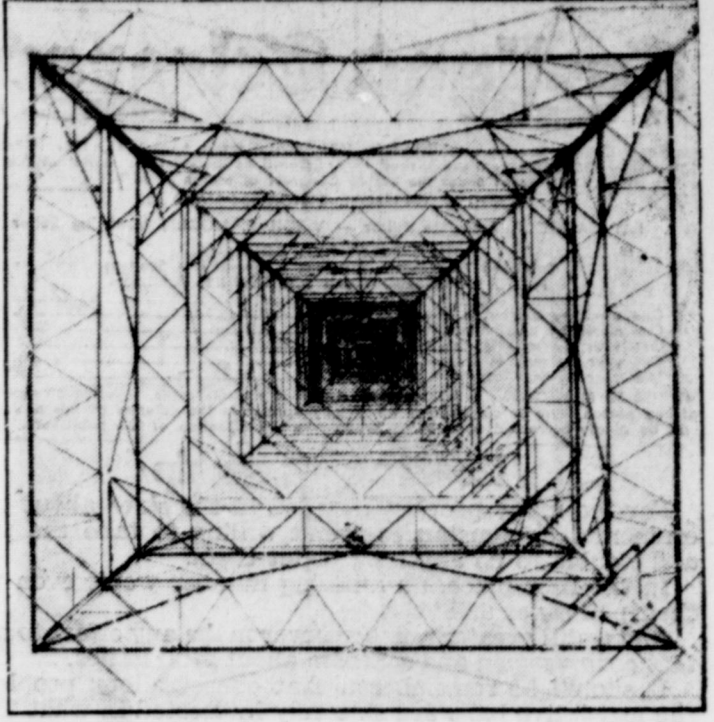

# Nine Million Dollar Gamble Told By State Dimes Head

W. F. Elmendorph, state March of Dimes representative from Austin, viewed the Eastland County program during a visit to the county recently.

The representative was particularly complimentary "in the manner in which teenagers and high school students were implemented into this year's drive within the county."

Highly optimistic as to the possibilities of the Salk vaccine, whose success will be tested in April, Elmendorph said that the National Foundation has spent nine million dollars in the tests and preparation of the drug and that enough was now stockpiled to inoculate nine million first and second grade children throughout the nation if it is proven safe.

"Some have thought that the vaccine would only be administered in larger cities, but with the cooperation of county and city health officers, it will be administered to all children within the first and second grade group who request it, free of charge," he stated.

national Foundation had been so optimistic of the vaccine, that pharmaceutical companies had also invested another nine million dollars in the development.

If the drug does prove successful, it will soon be sold through drug stores as "one now buys penicillin."

The only real tests so closely awaited on the performance of the drug is its safety.

Before it can be licensed, which is necessary before being put on the open market, the vaccine will be required to prove that no radical reactions of the human body are probable upon inoculation.

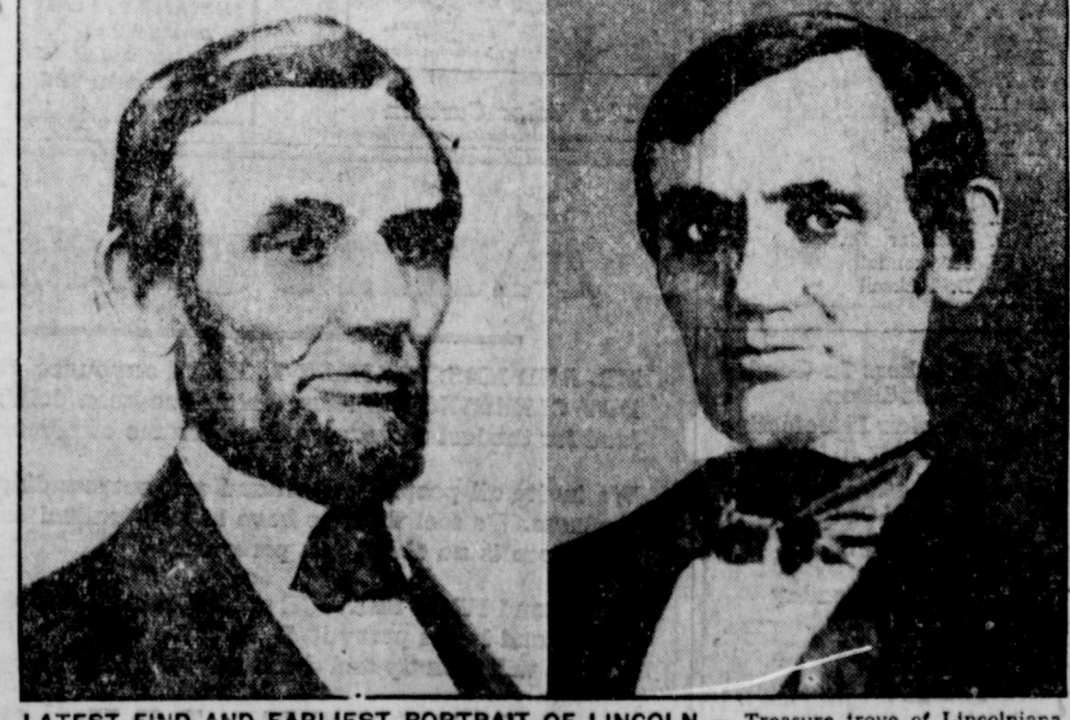

Located in the Springfield, Ill., paint store of Paul Redeker, who bought it from a customer several years ago for \$3.50, it was taken by Photographer Thomas Peaker in his Springfield studio, about 1859 or 1860. Identification and valuation of \$10,000 was made by Van A. Graham, of Tuscola, Ill., associate of the late Herbert Wells Fay, noted collector of Lincolniana. At right is pictured the earliest known photograph of Lincoln, also taken in Springfield, Ill. The beardless Lincoln is believed to have posed for this picture, a daguerreotype, in 1845, at the age of 37.

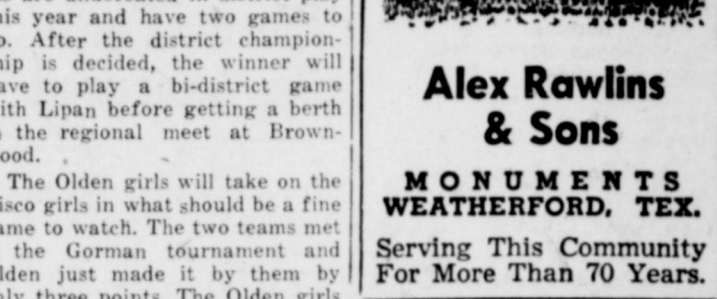

Elmendorph said that the vaccine had to be stockpiled if it was to be used before the coming spring and summer months when polio cases reach their peak in number.

He stressed that if the approval is given in May, the warm weather will have begun to creep into some of the southern states, and if various quantities were required to be ordered after that date the supply could not meet the demand until late in the year in most cases.

He called the stockpiling truly a nine million dollar gamble.

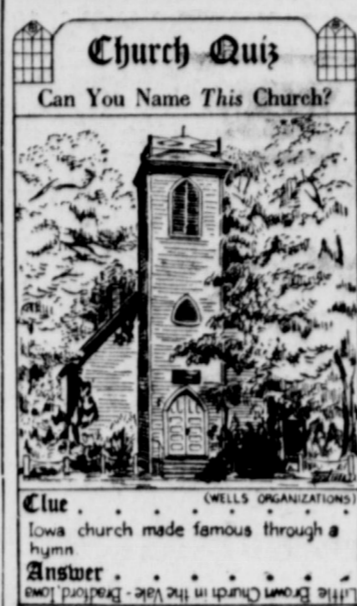

## Mrs. Murrell Reviews Book At Thursday Afternoon Club Meet

Mrs. Arthur Murrell reviewed the book, "American Ways of Life," by George R. Stewart at the regular meeting of the Thursday Afternoon Club at the Woman's Club. She spoke of America as being the "Melting Pot," as she traced many of the qualities of this country. Language, she pointed out, "has not been influenced much by immigrants, because they wanted to be like us" and she said the author was surprised that there are not more "brogues."

Mrs. Murrell gave the history of communications and religion, saying that religion has been on the upswing since the Revolutionary War. The influence of the land and the native Indians here were slight, except as to foods produced by the land, and even these are more varied than anywhere else in the world, because different nationalities bring their own which are added, she explained. But hereditary of the settlers has been the dominant influence — they were Christian and this is a Christian nation; dress, houses, recreation and other qualities of living all are influenced more by hereditary than by the land and the natives, basketball, she said, being the only strictly American game.

The drink was changed from ale to water by the early settlers up arriving here and drinks rank in popularity in this order: water, milk, tea, coffee and sodapop — and "we are the greatest milk drinking country in the world," she added, alcoholic beverages, contrary to some opinions, ranking much below these. "Our literature is the best, but our painting, sculpture and music are not," she explained. The language — English — is strictly hereditary, with very few changes. The author speaks of America as unique and wonders how it has kept from being more

so and, in his interesting book, is complimentary of a great and unique country.
