Work To Begin; Library Still Needs \$11,000

Phase II of the Centennial Memorial Library Fund Drive is underway with approximately \$11,000 more needed for the project.

Though the Fund has reached the \$19,000 mark, \$15,000 of that amount has been spent to pay

for the building itself (Phase I), leaving a balance of about \$4,000. It and additional receipts will be used for the renovation which is expected to cost a total of \$15,000.

Work will begin in the near future on the outside of the

building at 210 South Lamar and on the roof. Bids are now being considered.

Bids on additional improvements will be invited as their need arises. Information about them can be obtained from Dan Childress or Carl Garrett of the building Committee.

Contributions to the Fund may be made at the Eastland National Bank to either Mrs. Inez Bourdeau or James Ried.

Cheerleader School Scheduled June 10-15

Hundreds of peppy cheers, shimmering pom-poms and smart stepping cheerleaders will bring colorful excitement to Cisco Junior College on June 10-15 during the annual Southwest Cheerleader Camp sponsored by the National Cheerleaders Association and Coca-Cola USA, a division of The Coca-Cola Company.

A highlight of the clinic will be the selection of a District Winner squad who will receive a handsome plaque and become an entrant in the national competition in the fall. "We are convinced," a Coca-Cola spokesman said, "that the

Even The Bible Tells Of Water Gate Confessions

A contemporary translation, The Living Bible, published two years ago and now appearing on best seller lists, tells about weeping and confession of national sins at Jerusalem's Water Gate, 2500 years ago.

Then as now, the participants were high government officials. But in that incident, the confessions were voluntary! It all came about when the Jewish nation, after 70 years of captivity in Babylon, returned and rebuilt the ancient gates of their capitol city. One of these was the Water Gate.

A mass meeting was convened at this gate to discuss the fact that the clergy, political leaders and average citizen alike were disobeying the laws God gave to Moses a thousand years earlier. Two of these same laws, "Thou shalt not steal" and "Thou shalt not lie," are prominent again in today's Watergate affair.

In the earlier event the people broke out into weeping and confession when they realized how many of God's laws they themselves had broken along with their leaders.

But it ended for the good of all concerned. A national reform was decided on, and agreement reached for everyone - politicians and average citizen alike - to obey all of God's laws thereafter. A happy celebration was begun, giving gifts and feasting, because everyone felt so glad that righteousness had again prevailed and God's laws were being enforced again.

The Living Bible tells of this historic event in the Old Testament Book of Nehemiah, chapters eight and nine.

"In mid-September, all the people assembled at the plaza in front of the Water Gate and requested Ezra, their religious leader, to read to them the law of God which He had given to Moses. So Ezra the priest brought out to them the scroll of Moses' laws. He stood on a wooden stand made especially for the occasion so that everyone could see him as he read. He faced the square in front of the Water Gate, and read from early morning until noon." Nehemiah 8:1-3

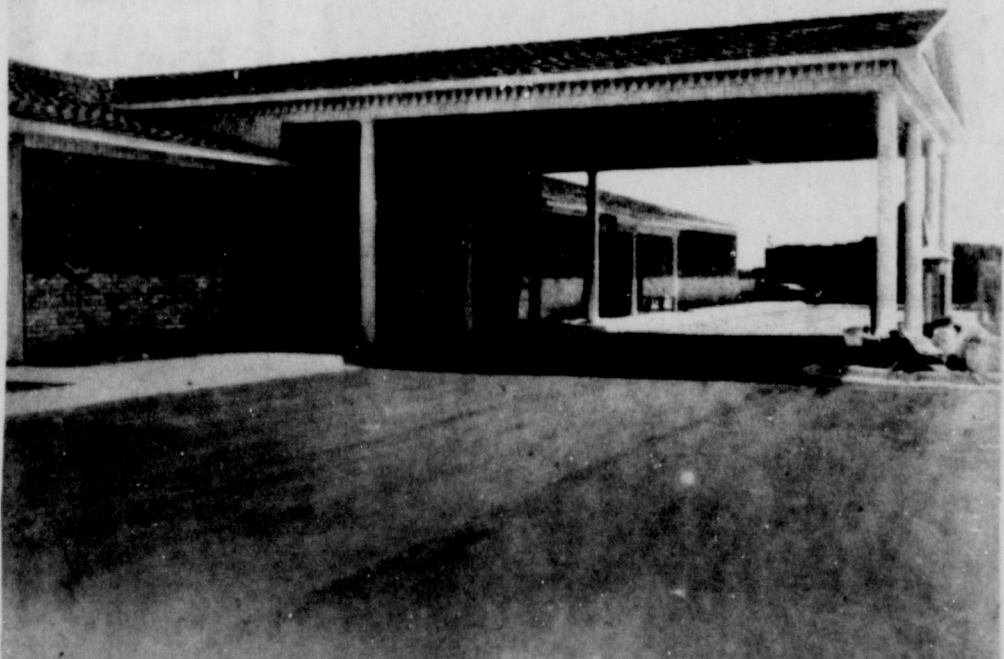
She was a member of Faith Baptist Church in Wichita Falls.

Bids Let For CJC Building

Construction of a new technical vocational building for CJC is set to begin within a week following the letting of a bid to Burl Nash Construction of Abilene at a regular monthly meeting of the CJC Board of Regents on Thursday, June 7.

The new building will be the second vocational building for the campus, and it will house several vocational programs, including cosmetology, welding, auto body repair, and radio-television repair.

Nash's low bid was \$199,305 for the 14,000 sq. ft. building. \$103,305 of that amount will be local participation while 96,000 will come from State funding, according to CJC President Dr. Leland Willis.

Architect for the building is Richard Buzard, AIA, of Abilene.

Dr. Willis stated the first phase of the building is set for completion by September 1 which will be the portion for teaching cosmetology and welding. The remainder is scheduled to be finished by December 1 in ample time for the second semester of the 1973-74 school year.

Gordon Spot

Eastland County residents were very happy to have a good rains a week ago. The moisture was badly needed after a very dry month. The Eastland weather observer, James Dabney, measured only .85 inch of rain during May. Most parts of the county got about two inches of rain. Desdemona was one area that got about twice that amount.

Damaging winds accompanied the rain between Kokomo and Gorman. Several barns and trees were damaged.

Most peanut farmers were waiting for rain before planting. Now that we have had rain and a week of good clear weather, the peanut planting is progressing at a rapid rate.

Coastal bermudagrass has made slow progress this Spring. This has puzzled a lot of growers, since the moisture condition was so good until the dry month of May. Most guess that the extremely cold and long winter delayed early spring growth. When the soil did warm up it was getting pretty dry. With the recent rains and the warm weather the grass should begin growing rapidly.

The sudan hybrids are making excellent growth. Many say it is the best they have seen in years. We should have excellent quality hay from the first cuttings.

Small grain yields are much better than average this year. Jerry Buckley of Desdemona said he made 100 bushels of oats per acre on one field.

With recent rains, water may be standing in some locations on your premises. Such standing water makes an excellent place for raising mosquitoes.

Mosquitoes lay eggs wherever water will collect and stand for a week or longer. Young mosquitoes develop only in water and prefer polluted water for breeding.

If standing water on your premises cannot be eliminated, check it weekly for mosquito larvae. If any are found, apply an insecticide spray and spray containing 0.5 percent lindane or .02 percent malathion may be used as well as kerosene or fuel.

To prepare your own spray, mix 3½ teaspoons of a 50 to 57 percent malathion emulsifiable concentrate to enough water, kerosene or fuel oil to make one

pint of spray. Spray one ounce (2 tablespoons) of one of these mixtures to each 100 square feet of surface. Do not use kerosene or fuel oil or water containing vegetation.

To keep annoyances from mosquitoes at a minimum this spring and summer, take measure now to destroy breeding places.

Three Eastland County 4-Hers along with over 1800 other 4-Hers from across the state participated in State 4-H Roundup June 5 and 6 at Texas A & M University at College Station.

Those competing in contests from Eastland County included Caryn Lee from Cisco, Public Speaking; Karen Plowman from Eastland, Food and Nutrition Educational Activity; and Cynthia Claborn from Eastland, Home Environment Educational Activity. Cynthia Claborn received a blue award for her presentation.

In order for 4-Hers to participate in Roundup, they must be over 14 years of age and must have won at both County and District contests.

Adult leaders who accompanied the 4-Hers to roundup were Mrs. Jeanne Lee of Cisco, and Mrs. May Plowman and Mrs. Betty Claborn of Eastland.

The assistant County Extension Agents, Milton Kellner and Arleen Hawkins also accompanied the group to Roundup.

The Assistant County Extension Agents will be conducting record book workshops in 4-H Clubs throughout Eastland County during the month of June.

All 4-H members who are interested in entering a record book in the County Record Book, contest in July are urged to attend and bring materials to work on their records. The agents will provide record forms that members will need to complete for their projects.

This will be a good time for 4-Hers to get better acquainted with what the 4-H Record Book consists of and to begin work on their individual records.

Rogues' Gallery

Arrested on a charge of gambling, Greg was tried and found not guilty. Later he learned that the police were including his photograph in a public "rogues' gallery," open to inspection by victims of crime.

Greg hastened back into court, this time as a plaintiff. He demanded that the police remove his picture from the gallery, even though they might still consider him a suspicious character.

And the court ordered the police to do just that. Citing Greg's right of privacy, the court said:

"A visitor (to the gallery) might conclude that all the pictures were of criminals. This is not a pleasant thought for one conscious of his innocence."



Most courts agree, frowning on undue publicity given to a person who has been cleared of a criminal charge. Nonetheless, privacy—like all legal rights—has its limits.

Another complaint was filed by a man who had been acquitted of receiving stolen property. He wanted the police to remove his photograph and fingerprints from their private files.

But this time, the court said no. The court said keeping good records is a key to effective police work, adding:

"An accurate identification system may be an assistance not only in finding the guilty criminal but in clearing an innocent suspect."

A different aspect of the problem arose in a homicide case, when the defendant objected to evidence that some years earlier he had been convicted of manslaughter. He said he had already paid his debt to society, and was therefore entitled—under the privacy doctrine—to keep his past a closed book.

But the court ruled that his past could be reopened, because a second offense is more serious than a first offense.

"One who has been convicted of crime (forfeits) whatever right of privacy he may have possessed," said the court, "to the extent that the protection of society requires such forfeiture."

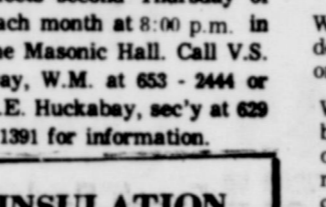

HD NEWS

By Janet Thomas County Home Demonstration Agent

The public is invited to attend a "Food Preservation Workshop" on June 22 at 2 p.m. in the Texas Electric Reddy Room in Eastland. With the rising cost of food, more and more families have gardens in order to furnish vegetables for the families plus lowering the grocery bill.

Demonstrations on the various methods of food preservation will be presented by Mrs. Martha Harmon, Lone Star Gas Consumer Specialist, Mrs. Beverly Nicholson, Texas Electric Home Economist, and myself.

We hope you will attend the workshop which will include canning, freezing, pickling, and the making of jelly. There will

be free recipes and information available on canning and freezing at the workshop.

A meeting to plan the 4-County Home Demonstration Camp will be this coming Monday, June 11 in Comanche. Representatives from Comanche, Brown, Mills, and Eastland counties will make arrangements for this annual event which will be hosted by Eastland County Home Demonstration Clubs this year. Mrs. R.W. Gordon, Mrs. Sue Taylor, and Mrs. J.C. Clearman will attend from our county.

Swimmers who like sewing their own swim fashions aren't

so rare as they used to be. Not just any elastic will stretch out of shape. Swim elastic is treated for chlorine resistance.

To determine exactly how much elastic is needed, measure the swimsuit edge it's to fit. If working with three-eighths-inch elastic, subtract an inch for every seven inches of fabric. If the elastic is three-fourths-inch wide, subtract an inch for every five to six inches of fabric.

Test length for comfort by holding it around the place it's to go. Cut and join the elastic ends. Mark off eight equal parts of the elastic with pins, then do the same with the fabric edge to which it'll be sewn.

Match up pin markings and pin elastic to the wrong side of the swimsuit, putting elastic edge next to the cut swimsuit edge.

Stitch in a wide, long zig-zag, along inner edge of elastic. As you go, stretch just enough to meet the swimsuit.

Fold the elasticized edge to the inside of the suit and stitch next to the cut edge.
