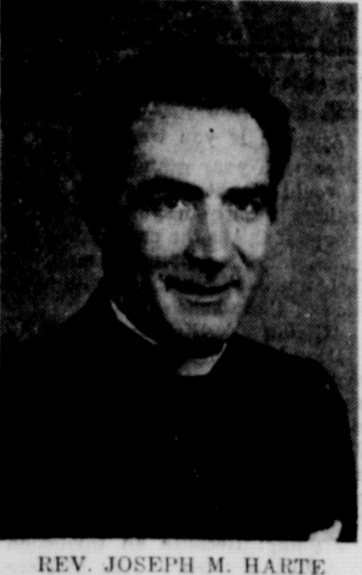

Thomas M. Cary, 49 of Tacoma, Washington died Sunday, October 25, in the Fort Lewis Army Hospital in Washington.

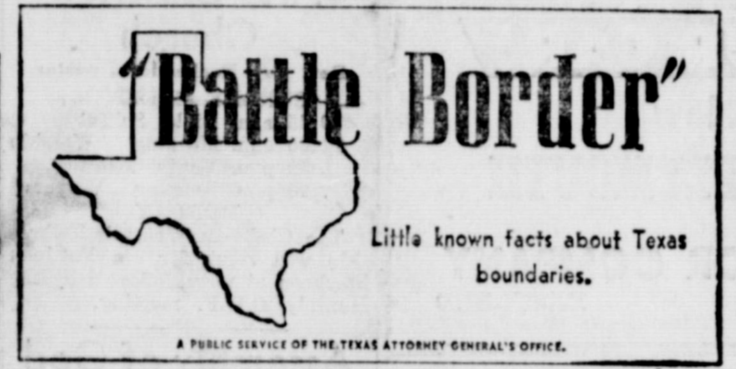
Mr. Cary was born in Stephenville and had lived in Washington for the last five years. He was a retired Army sergeant, having served in the Army for 22 years.

Little known facts about Texas boundaries.

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped Texas of today.)

In claiming the Rio Grande to its source in present day Southern Colorado, the Republic of Texas was faced with establishing possession.

Attorney General Will Wilson points out:

"Since possession is nine points of the law, the Texas weakness was its claim to a chunk of territory not occupied by settlers or patrolled by militia."

In the northwestern reaches of the Texas' claim was old Santa Fe. "Lamar, President of the Republic of Texas, figured that if these people would consent to becoming Texans it would go a long way toward solving the problem of actual occupation," Wilson says.

The Attorney General is an author on Texas history.

Out of Lamar's idea sprang the disastrous Santa Fe Expedition. The real purpose was to persuade the New Mexicans peacefully to accept and recognize the jurisdiction of the Republic of Texas.

Over 300 men, including traders and soldiers, left Brushy Creek near Austin.

"I have a goat ranch on Brushy Creek and I cherish the old camp site which is on the site of Kinney's Fort about two miles east of present Rock Rock," Wilson observes.

The site is recorded by a marker erected by the school children of Williamson County.

They thought Santa Fe was only 500 miles away. It turned out to be 1300 miles in his long way the expedition traveled.

Three months on the trail, Indian attacks, starvation, and poor leadership put Texans in New Mexico in no condition to defend themselves from the sudden appearance of the Mexican militia.

As captives they were marched 200 miles to Mexico City under the order "If one of them pretends to be sick or tired on the road, shoot him down and bring me his ears."

Forty Texans died on the march. Those who lived were put in the dark dungeon of Castle Perote and in other Mexican prisons with lepers and criminals.

News of the Texans' fate reached the United States in January, 1842. Enraged, the Texas Congress resolved to annex all of Chihuahua, Sonora, New Mexico, Baja and Alta California and parts of Tamaulipas, Coahuila, Durango and Sinaloa.

"They believed that if Texas was going to war with Mexico they might as well make it worth their while," Wilson explains.

"Instead of fighting over half of New Mexico they would scrap over the whole hog. It is interesting to note that President Sam Houston vetoed the measure because he feared it would be taken as a bit of legislative horseplay."

Congress, however, immediately passed it over his veto.

Texans wanted war but had no money, troops, or equipment.

The failure of the Santa Fe expedition left the Republic of Texas with no possession of the disputed part of the present day New Mexico and Colorado.

The next two articles will describe the sale of this territory by Texas.

Cisco Downs Mavericks In Hardfought Contest

Powered by four of the best backs in the state of Texas, the Cisco Lobos added their eighth win of the year to their record Friday night, beating a game, but outclassed Eastland Maverick eleven, 35-8, in Chesley Field, Cisco.

The Lobos scored twice in the first five minutes of play, two more times late in the second quarter, and added a fifth tally in the third period of play. The Mavs' lone touchdown came in the third quarter.

Eastland played vicious, charging football, but the talented Cisco backs made up for what gain the locals could make on the Lobo line. Delbert Schaefer, Charles Lipsey, Duane Hale and Joe Martin always were capable of going all the way.

Martin, who played as a Maverick two years ago as a sophomore, had himself an extremely fine night. He accounted for 36 of the 51 yards the Lobos made on their first touchdown drive, and bucked the ball over from the one yard line himself. Hale carried the extra points over.

Cisco went to the air for their next touchdown. Schaefer passed

to Lipsey for 54 yards and the tally, after it looked like the Mavs would hold for downs. This time the extra point try failed.

Neither team could get going in the remaining 6:55 of the first stanza. But in the opening seconds of the second period the Mavs began to march. In 16 plays Eastland moved the ball from their own 9 to the Cisco 19 yard line. The Mavs had a first and 10 at that point, but the locals failed to move through the air from that point. Twice during the drive Eastland had to punt, but on both occasions jarring tackles knocked Cisco ball carriers loose from the ball and Eastland recovered.

The Lobos marched from their 19 for their third touchdown. Again it was a Schaefer to Lipsey pass which did the trick. The play covered 26 yards and was something to see. Schaefer was badly rushed, and found himself surrounded by Mavericks. The cool quarterback flipped the ball to Lipsey, who was running across field at the line of scrimmage. Lipsey made a beautiful run, faking with fine form. This time Martin was stopped short on his try for the extra points.

Lipsey got himself another touchdown on the next play Eastland ran. He intercepted a Maverick pass and ran 35 yards into paydirt. This time Martin lugged the ball over for the extra points.

Cisco took the opening kickoff of the third quarter and marched 56 yards eight plays. Hale carried the ball on six of the plays, getting 43 of the yards, including the final one yard plunge. Lipsey kicked the extra point.

The Mavs got themselves a quick touchdown early in the third period. Mickey Garner passed to John Garrett for 22 yards to the Cisco 35, and James Lewis took over from there. Lewis hit a fine hole on the left side of his line, and off he raced into the promised land. Garner ran over the extra points.

The rest of the game was even-

ly fought. Cisco used liberal substitutions on offense, but played their first unit on defense. The Cisco second unit ended up with minus yardage for the night, with the exception of yardage made by Martin, who was left in most of the time.

Around District 7-AA, Ranger surprised everyone by holding Ballinger to a narrow, 14-6 win, and Coleman beat Winters, 8-6.

Next week Eastland will host Ballinger, Winters plays at Cisco and Coleman is at Ranger.

J. O. Earnest, owner of the Clover Farm Store at Eastland has returned from the annual convention of the Clover Farm System held last week at Cleveland, Ohio.

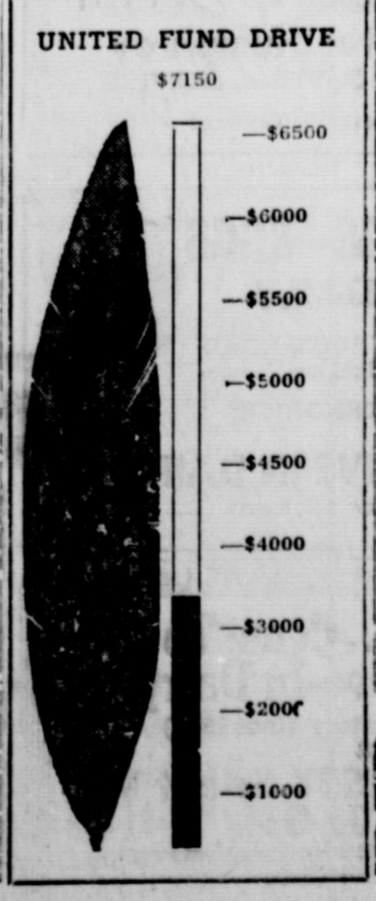

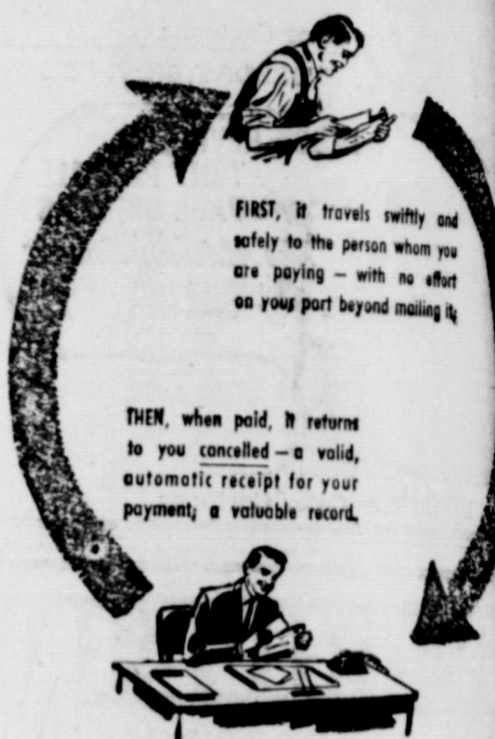
