# So Far So Good

On April 1, substantial reductions took place in the retail exclse taxes. An officer of an association of retailers which represents some 7,000 stores, chains and independents among them, hailed this as an important forward step to "unloosen the shackles that have so long acted as a brake on the sale of the affected categories of merchandise." And in addition to the stimulating influence the reductions will have upon production and distribution, he added, "They also constitute a lessening of the inequities that have so long been part of our excise tax laws, and to represent the American tradition of equal treatment to all citizens and all segments of the economy. They also represent the first step towards the complete and desirable elimination of all war time imposed excises which have proved a heavy burden to the sale of many types of consumer goods."

The excise taxes have often been referred to as "luxury" taxes. Actually, in a country with our accepted living standards, many of the goods involved are in universal use by people in all income brackets and are considered necessities — good examples being cosmetics and leather goods. And this is true also of services subject to excise taxation, such as railroads and other transportation, and the telephone and telegraph.

More important, the key to good times in this country is consumption - the volume of goods which people go into stores and other retail outlets and buy. Anything which abnormally burdens and reduces consumption is bad for all. And there can be no question but that the excise taxes have been such a burden.

The hope is that, in time, these war-imposed taxes can and will be eliminated entirely, not just reduced. But unless such tax cuts are accompanied by drastic cuts in the cost of government, they will be a prelude to more debt and inflation rather than sound pros-





Subordination Of Religion To Politics Primary Cause Of Disintegration Of/ Civilization

In D. C. Somervell's summary of Arnold J. Toynbee's "A Study of History," he seems to summar the cause of disintegration of civilization to be a result of the subordination of religion to politics. He expresses it in this manner:

"It (subordination of religion to politics) is being recognized, that is to say, as the supreme danger to the spiritual health and even to the material existence of the hotly canvassed and loudly advertised political and economic maladies. This spiritual evil is now too flagrant to be ignored: but it is easier to diagnose the diesease than to prescribe the remedy, for of commerce that can be procured on demand. It will be hard indeed to refill the spiritual vacuum which has been hollowed in our Western hearts by the progressive decay of religious belief that has been going on for some two-and-a-half centuries. We are still reacting against a subordination of religior to politics which was the crime of our sixteenth and seventeenth cen-

tury ancestors." That is pretty much a summary of Toynbee's "A Study of History." As Somervell points out it is harder to analyze what brought this about than it is to recommend a

Belief In Aggression

Toynbee has a lot to say about different nations falling because of their belief in aggression. Aggression usually starts in local communities in such beliefs as aggression in education and zoning and planning and in money and credit regulations. As civilizations evolve, aggression takes various forms. Toynbee seems to be of the opinion, and it seems to me correctly, that disintegration comes from standardization. He seems to agree with Herbert Spencer that the higher the state of civilization the more heterogeneous the species are. zation begins to deteriorate. Toynbee remarks that:

"This tendency towards standardization is the more remarkable when we consider the extent of the diversity which it has to over

And of course, the higher the state of civilization, the more diversity there is to be overcome. Not Atraid Of Anarchy

He quotes a letter from Dr. Edwyn Lievan that pretty well expresses his opinion and which seems to me is rational. It reads: I do not think the danger before us is anarchy, but despotism, the loss of spiritual freedom, the totalitarian state, perhaps a uni-

versal world totalitarian state. As a consequence of strife between nations or classes there might be local and temporary anarchy, a passing phase. Anarchy is essentially weak, and in an anarchic world any firmly organized group with rational organization and scientific knowledge could spread its dominion over the rest. And. as an alternative to anarchy, the World would welcome the despotic state. 



Leaders in spiritual affairs should strive diligently to ascertain and keep clearly in view the purpose of true worship, and everything that does not comport with and contribute to this holy end should be eliminated. Worship is not for the purpose of entertaining men, nor is it for social, political or finanical advancement, Praying, singing, preaching, giving or anything else done in the service of God for the purpose of pleasing men may do just that, but it certainly does not please nor honor God, (Gal, 1:10).

In John 4-24 Jesus sets forth three essential elements for acceptable worship. "God is a Spirit: and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and truth." First: God is the proper object of worship. Throughout the Bible men are warned against worshiping idols (See Acts 17:29). It is made plain in Acts 10 that man is not to be worshiped; when John fell before an angel he is told, "See thou do it not, worship God" (Rev. 19:10). Second: Worship must be done in sprit - we must enter the spiritual realm and worship him honestly and sincerely. One should never engage in worship simply as a matter of form; but he should center his attention upon the Lord and spiritual things and concentrate wholly upon the thing being done. Third: Worship must be done in truth as well as in spirit. This means that every act of worship must be according to truth, or according to the word of God. Anything not provided in God's word in worship will render the worship vain. Jesus said, "But in vain do they worship me, teaching as their doctrines the precepts of men" (Matt. 15:9).

We have an appointment with Christ every Lord's day, "For", said He, "where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them' (Matt. 18:20), If properly done, worship honors and glorifies God, refreshes and edifies man.



# Phone-Wise, Pampa Far Above Average

(Special to the News)

NEW YORK, Apr. 23 — Talk in Pampa — over the telephone — has become more golden than silence. More golden because the extent to which telephones are used and the amount of business activity in a community are shown to go hand-in-hand.

Residents of Pampa do more phoning, in proportion to population, than is done in most cities in the United States. As of the beginning of last year, there were \$.059 telephones in operation locally. This was equivalent to 44.2 in service for every 100 people considerably more than the 30.3 per 100 people in the country as a whole. In the state of Texas there were 26.6 per 100.
