New Coca-Cola Plant



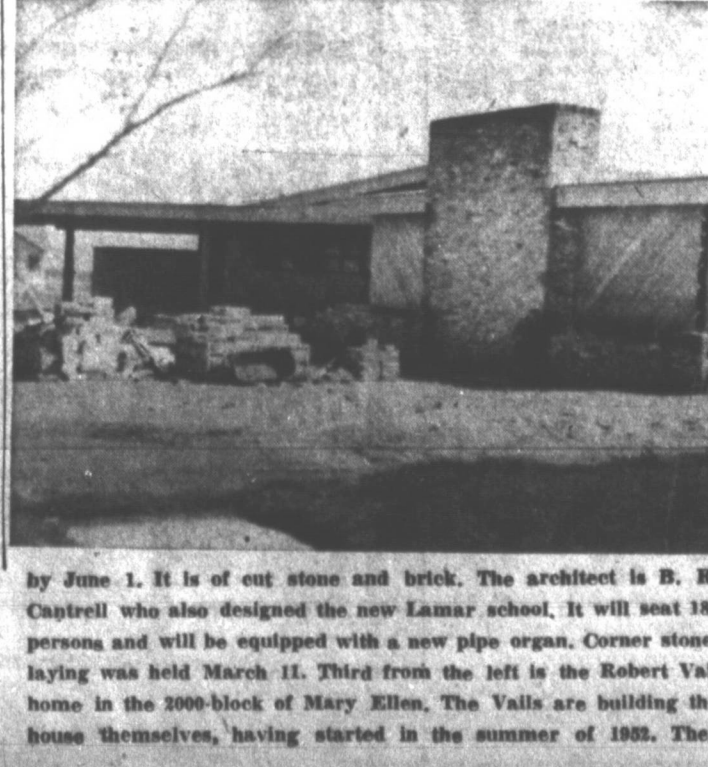

Fastest Gunslinger Ain't No Cowpoke

DENVER, April 13—UP—The Old West's gunslingers seldom lived long enough to find out if age slowed them down on the draw.

But their modern-day counterpart — a man who can yank a revolver from a holster and fire it with greater speed than any other known living person — finds that at 47 he still is as quick on the trigger as he was 30 years ago.

The world's fastest pistol hip-shooter is a modest, soft-spoken Oklahoman named D. A. (Jelly) Bryce.

Attired in an ordinary business suit and equipped with a .38 or .357 caliber revolver and side holster slung on a belt around his waist, Bryce can draw and fire in the phenomenal time of two-fifths of one second, faster than can be seen by any except the most perceptive human eye.

Better Than Wild Bill
As good even as Wild Bill Hickok, and maybe better, he can shoot holes through the edge of a silver dollar tossed into the air.

Twenty-two years ago, while an Oklahoma City detective, he was summoned to arrest an armed and desperate fugitive in a hotel room. The wanted man was lying in bed in the hotel room with a cocked rifle resting across his knees aimed at the door. He had dared anyone to try to take him.

Bryce threw open the door, stepped into the room and killed the suspect before the latter could squeeze the trigger of his rifle.

But great as he is as a shot, Bryce inevitably would disappoint millions of children. His headgear is a snap-brim fedora, his mode of transportation customarily a station wagon or a black government-owned sedan, and his occupation special agent in charge of the Albuquerque, N.M., field office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Bryce, who recently gave a demonstration of his skill at a convention of the Colorado Sheriffs and Peace Officers' Association here, has an extensive repertoire of fancy shooting tricks.

One Run Plenty
In one, he looks into a gigantic diamond ring he wears on his left hand, sighting through it into a target behind his back, and firing a revolver over his shoulder.

In another, he places two clay pigeon targets on the flat side of a sawed-off shotgun stock, propels the discs into the air by a rapid motion of the shotgun, and then blasts both targets before they hit the ground.

He also is adept with the high-powered rifle and submachinegun. But his reputation is based on his ability as a hip-shooter, the standard and best known gun-handling technique of the frontier. Bryce favors, for this, a revolver over an automatic and the .38 or .357 caliber. He's no two-gun man, either.

"One is plenty for me," he says. "If you carry one and learn to use it, you won't need two."

New Mexico Lenten Rites Centuries Old

SANTA FE, N.M., April 13—UP—The weird sound of flutes will be heard again Friday in the remote mountain villages of northern New Mexico as the brotherhoods of the Penitentes bring to a climax strange Lenten rites that have survived here from the middle ages.

In Truchas, Chimayo, Alcalde, Cordova and other Spanish-speaking hamlets in the Sangre del Cristo (Blood of Christ) mountains, the Hermanos de la Luz (Brothers of the Light) will complete holy week rituals of penance and pagentry.

Once the pageants were marked by bloody whippings, the tying of an honored brother to a cross, and other forms of self-punishment. The excesses led to a century-long ban by the Catholic Church and gradually have been eliminated in virtually all chapters.

Re-enact the Crucifixion
Friday, the brotherhoods will re-enact the trial and crucifixion of Christ. One member will carry a wooden cross in a long procession while hooded fellow members follow, chanting hymns of sorrow and penance to the music of a single flute.

Friday night the ceremonies climax — the brotherhood's marauda. There, after hours of prayer, the brothers snuff out the traditional 12 candles one by one. The small chapel in total darkness symbolizes the darkness of the world when Christ died.

Archbishop Joseph Byrne of Santa Fe, who lifted the church ban on the brotherhoods in 1947, praises the organizations in their present form as "pious associations of men joined in charity to commemorate the passion and death of the Redeemer."

The Archbishop said when he lifted the ban that the brotherhood leaders had acted to eliminate "what excesses may have existed."

Flourished After 1800
The brotherhoods were founded in the mountain villages by the first Spanish settlers in the late 16th and 17th centuries. Religious historians say they were first founded in Europe in the 13th century but they were banned in the old world centuries ago.

The Penitentes flourished after 1800 when the Mexican government ordered Franciscan priests out of what is now New Mexico. When the Franciscans returned 30 years later, the brotherhoods had adopted the bloody practices which led to their ban.

Some chapters in the more remote areas reportedly still give initiation — the traditional cross-clashes across the back and 30 lashes for penance despite disapproval of the church. But the last time a brother was reported to have been lashed to a cross was in 1930.

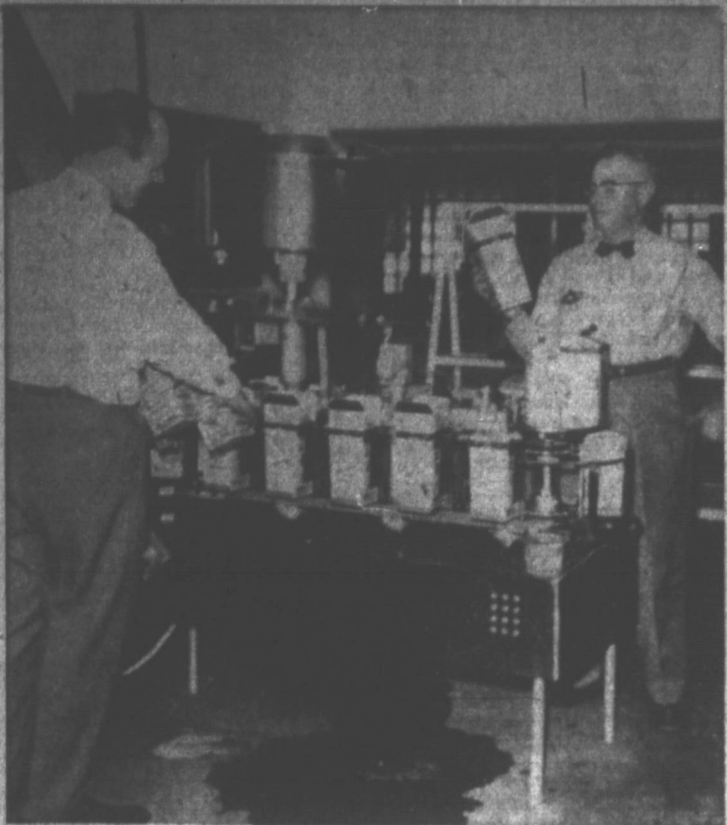

Aly Khan's Valet 'Boils' When Boss Called Playboy

HOLLYWOOD, April 15 —UP— Aly Khan's valet says "it makes me boil" when his boss is called a playboy, for Emris Williams thinks the prince is a "marvelous" person and serious businessman. As the Moslem potentate and his valet were preparing to fly to New York for a visit with Aly's ex-wife, Rita Hayworth, Williams gave a different picture of the controversial prince. The valet said Aly takes his job as a prince and horse-trader seriously, despite his trip halfway around the world to woo Gene Tierney here. "So many people of all classes do that (playboying) a lot more than he," said the valet at Miss Tierney's home. "His work comes first. We have eight million people in Pakistan to see every winter. He goes into the villages and deserts to see everyone. "We have no poor people. They have their own hospitals and schools. When the Aga is weighed in platinum, he doesn't keep that, you know. It goes into a trust fund for the people. "He controls all his father's 500 horses, including 20 studs. We're the biggest horse breeders in the world and they have more money and a him makes me sick. Why, anyone is tired. Aly decides which stallion he would get down on his knees and which mare. We have a lot of work to do." The Welsh valet chuckled that Aly calls him "daffy" after the daffodil, national flower of his native Wales. Williams got his job because he happened to be driving along a road in England and started an impromptu race with another driver. His competitor turned out to be Aly, and "he asked me to work for him." "The valet had been 'connected' with horse racing, but he wouldn't say how. While Aly and Gene were making the rounds of nightclubs and dinner parties during his stay, Williams was visiting an evangelist in Long Beach. He said he listens to the preacher on short-wave radio on his globe-hopping trips with the prince. Williams' wife and two children still live in England, and he sees them only between trips. "This job does keep me away from home, but I've been able to put my children through college," the valet said. "It's an interesting life. We've been nearly twice around the world the last two months—Paris, Rome, Rio, Africa, Spain, Lebanon, Bombay, Kashmir, Egypt, Canada, Mexico. "I am the closest person to him in the world. Accidents Dip In Gray County During March

A big decrease in the number of fatalities and accidents on highways in 26 Panhandle counties was shown for the month of March as compared with the same month last year, according to a report released by Capt. J. W. Blackwell of the Amarillo District office of the Texas Highway Patrol.

During last month only two persons were killed on Panhandle highways and 53 persons were injured, while during the same month of 1953 there were 18 fatalities and 43 were injured, the report showed.

Accidents during March this year totaled 96, of which 75 were on state and federal highways, seven on farm to market roads, 12 on county roads and two in small towns with population under 2,500.

Property damage during that month this year amounted to \$61,529, as compared to \$64,650 last year.

During February, 1954, four persons were killed, 57 were injured, and property damage amounted to \$86,680, Capt. Blackwell said.

Principal violations as causative factors in last month's accidents were listed as speeding, driving while drinking, driving on wrong side (not in passing), careless or reckless driving and failure to grant right-of-way.

Capt. Blackwell's report did not include accidents in cities with population over 2,500.

Total number of traffic arrests during March were 547, with 208 of these being for speeding and 28 for driving while intoxicated.

The speaker was referring to those boys when he said, "Somehow you always get the initiative to go on." Kelly has been editor of the Amarillo club bulletin for the last 18 years.

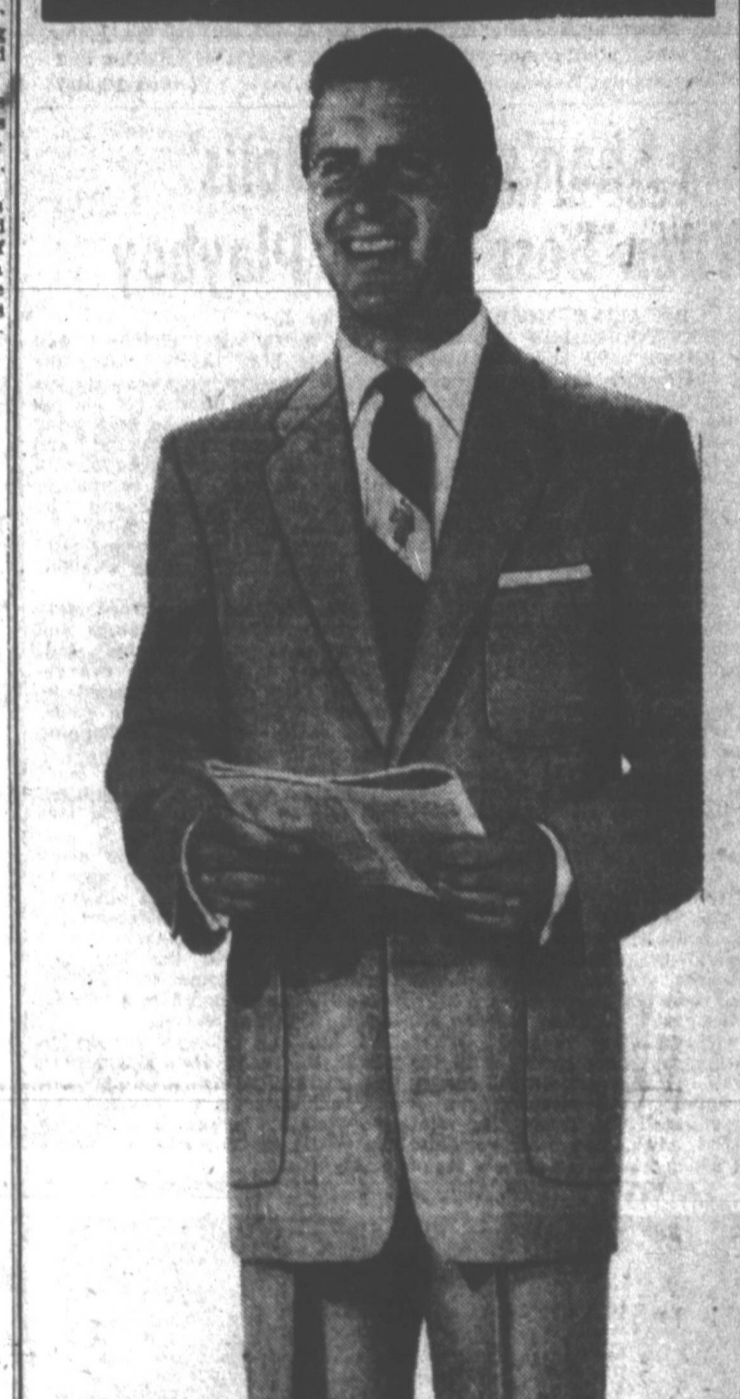

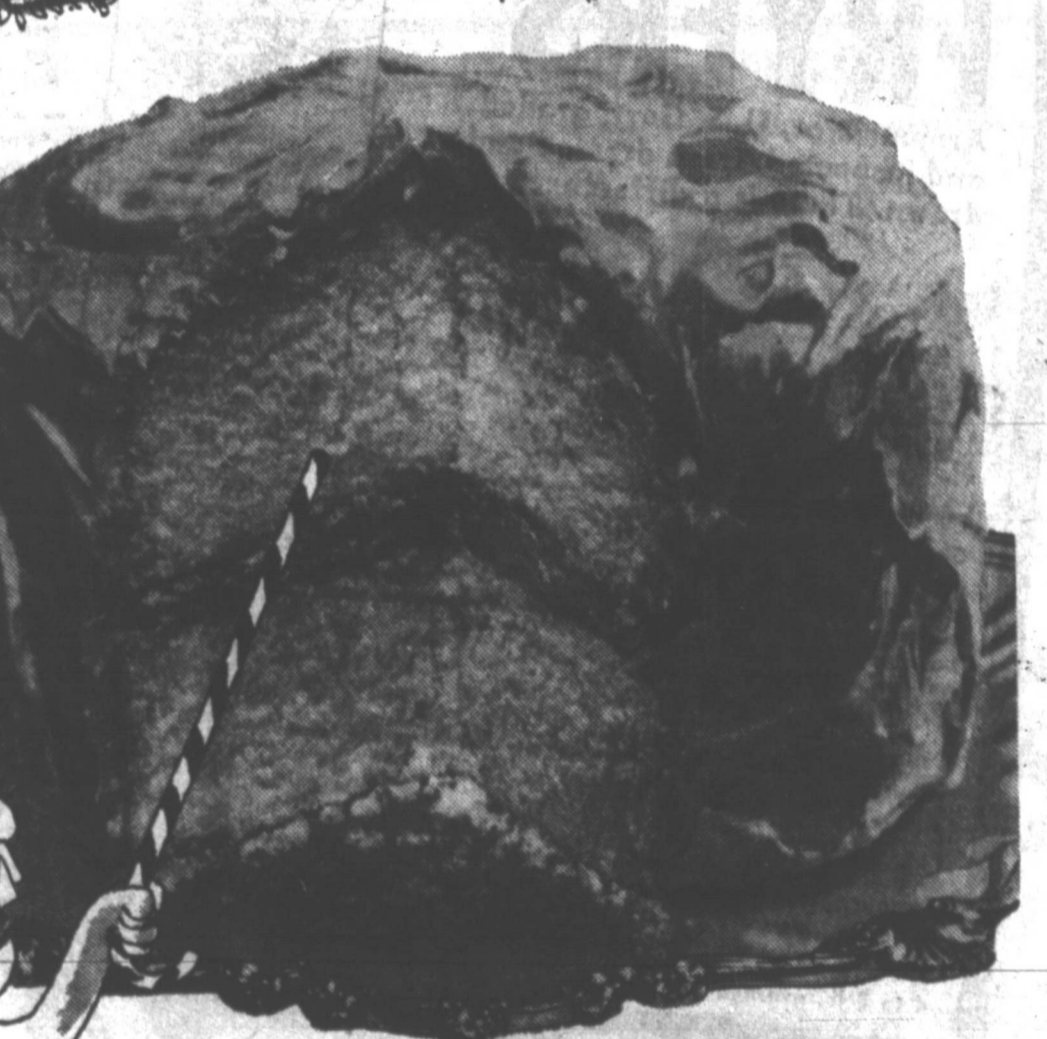

Federal Health Reinsurance Would Bolster Existing Plans

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — The nine people who worked the hardest to dream up the Administration's new "Limited Federal Health Reinsurance Plan" are divided on whether or not this scheme will work.

Chiefly responsible for the plan are Undersecretary of Health, Education and Welfare Nelson A. Rockefeller and these eight eastern insurance executives: C. Mantel Eddy, Connecticut General Life Ins. Co., Hartford, Conn.; Henry S. Beers, Aetna Life Ins. Co., Hartford, Conn.; Jarvis Farley, Massachusetts Indemnity Ins. Co., Boston, Mass.; Dr. Charles G. Hayward, Massachusetts Blue Shield, Boston, Mass.; William S. McNary, Michigan Blue Cross, Detroit, Mich.; H. Lewis Reitz, Lincoln National Life Ins. Co., Fort Wayne, Ind.; J. Henry Smith, Equitable Life Assurance Society, New York, and James E. Stuart, Hospital Care Corp. (Blue Cross), Cincinnati, Ohio.

McCarthy Working On Texas Speech

HOUSTON, April 15 — UP — Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, (R-Wis.), was working Thursday on the speech he'll give on Texas independence day, but there was no hint of the subject.

Douglas Marshall, son-in-law of millionaire oilman Hugh Roy Cullen, said Tuesday he had a long distance telephone conversation with McCarthy, and was told the Wisconsin Republican had just started to prepare his speech.

Cullen invited McCarthy to give "such an impartial and non-political" speech no one could find fault.

The opening of a Senate investigation into McCarthy's dispute with the Army was postponed a day so the senator could keep his April 21 engagement at the San Jacinto battle of Texas' war for independence from Mexico was fought 115 years ago.

Cullen, himself, said he hadn't heard from McCarthy since the latter asked for all available material on the battleground, east of Houston.

the only voluntary plan that would be acceptable to the private insurance companies. But only four of them seemed as all enthusiastic that it would work. They were Undersecretary Rockefeller and Messrs. Eddy, Smith and Stuart.

Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Oveta Culp Hobby approved the plan, however, and recommended it to the President.

So now it is before Congress in the form of two nearly identical bills, written in Mrs. Hobby's department, and introduced by Rep. Charles A. Wolverton and Sen. H. Alexander Smith of New Jersey.

There is a fair chance that Congress will pass this legislation. The cost is considered not too great. A \$25 million capital fund would be created, but it is claimed this will be eventually returned to the Treasury, if the plan works and doesn't cost too much.

The federal government would also pay administrative costs for the first five years. They are estimated at maybe a couple million dollars a year. After that it is hoped that the profits from the reinsurance capital fund will pay all administrative costs.

The main attraction of the plan to the administration is that it leaves the job to private insurance companies and to private medical care. Government participation is held to a minimum and state laws will regulate the whole business.

Anyone digging into the whys, the hows and the wherefores of this plan, and what premiums the private insurance companies will have to pay to buy this federal government reinsurance bumps into a completely blank wall.

Nobody knows the answers to most of the questions because this whole field of health insurance is so new that actuaries can't calculate the risks. All that will have to be learned by experience.

The general theory of the plan is that the federal government will reinsure private health insurance companies against three-fourths of their abnormal losses. These losses might come from selling policies which pay the beneficiaries more money than collected in premiums.

The purpose of the plan is to encourage insurance companies to sell more liberal health insurance policies, with full coverage for general medical and dental care, hospitalization, and catastrophic illness on a noncancelable, lifetime basis. If the companies go broke at it, federal reinsurance is supposed to bail them out.

One thing must be made clear. The government's new reinsurance plan isn't going to help people who can't afford to buy regular health insurance from private organizations like Blue Cross.

Sixty-three million Americans now have no such insurance. An estimated 22 million have some form of hospitalization or limited health insurance. Only about four million have really comprehensive coverage.

Nearly 900 companies and coops now offer some form of health insurance. Their annual premiums are about \$1.8 billion and their benefits paid out approximate \$1.2 billion.

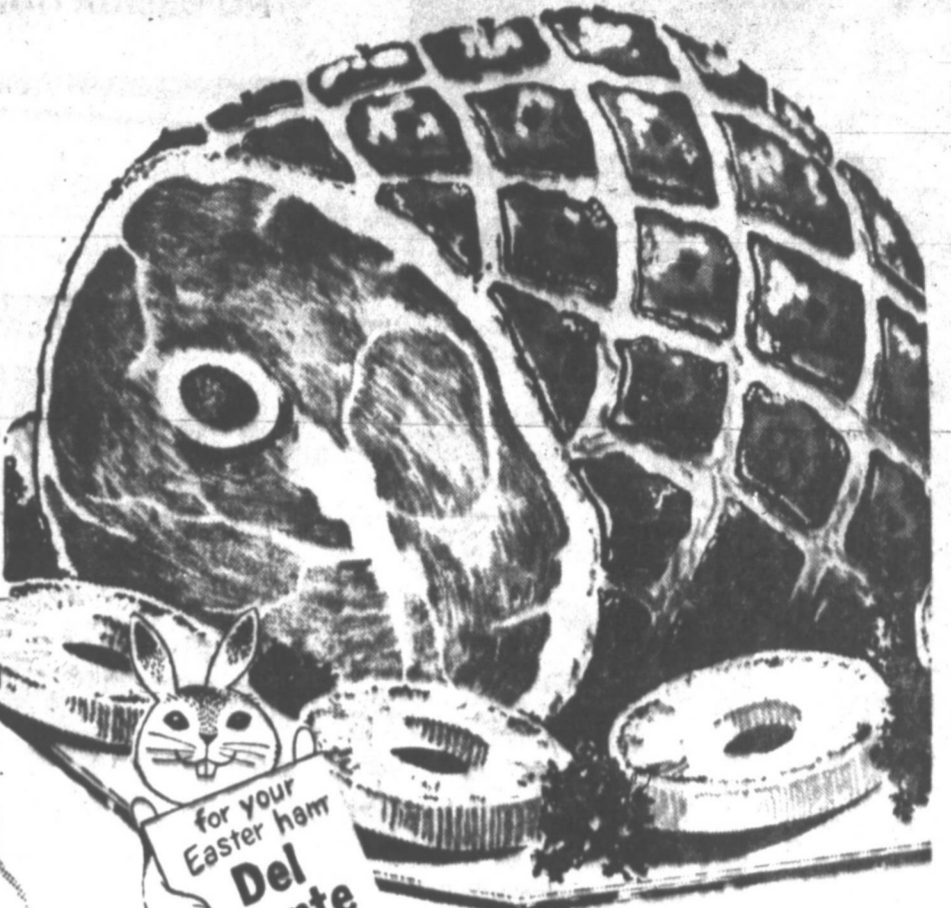

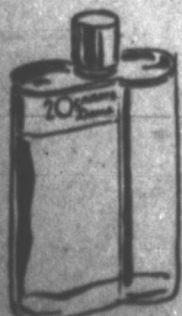

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Free Asia NATO Looks Impossible

The Face Of Asia

NEW YORK (NEA) — Is there a chance of organizing the free nations of Asia into a military bloc similar to NATO in Europe?

Even though most of them are now being armed with weapons "Made in U.S.A.," the answer is: "It looks impossible at this time." Why? Travel by plane, ship, jeep and oxcart along the skirts of Red China from Pakistan to Korea. Speak to barefoot soldiers, generals and diplomats — white, black, yellow and brown. These are the questions and answers you'd get:

A. What is the main obstacle to an Asian NATO? After all, they have a common enemy, Dictator Mao and his Russian supplied Chinese Army.

A. While our friends have the common enemy — and a common friend, the U.S. — there are more blood feuds among them than a parcel of Hatfields and McCoy's.

For example: Behind the spanking new front of neon-lighted Manila is still the awful wreckage of World War II. And a brooding fear of a re-armed Japan still clouds conversation.

You'll note how difficult it is to get the French, so recently occupied by the Nazis, to agree to a new French army. The Philippines were occupied by Japan and too often Hirohito's brass-knuckled general made Hitler's rough stuff in Paris look like a pillow fight.

It would be just as silly to defend the Orient without Japan as it is to defend Europe against Ivan without a new Wehrmacht. But no Philippine politician is willing to risk his party by sharing secrets with Tokyo's General Staff.

Q. Are there other serious divisions?

A. Too many. A fine native anti-Communist army is being mothered to security in Malaya by the British. The British recognize and trade with Red China.

On Formosa, Free Chinese forces are being trained by Americans. But Her Majesty's British Government is unwilling to loan its Malaysians for joint maneuvers with our Formosans.

Q. Have we given up dreaming of a united force powerful enough to threaten hungry Peiping?

A. No. The best way is to let it grow like Topsy under local pressures. Already Presidents Rhee and Chiang Kai-shek, who together own the Orient's largest mass of anti-Red body-power, have urged union.

And the Philippines' new President, Ramon Magsaysay, nods yes. His Foreign Minister suggests economic discussions first. If you can get these bitter rivals around the tea cups they might forget what they're supposed to be mad about and take a small Step One.

American Oriental experts feel a series of regional arrangements might be a wise Step One.

Siam's soldiers, featherweights in brown but wildcats in brawl, could easily co-operate with their Indo-Chinese neighbors, soon to number a half-million native troopers complete with elephant brigades.

And Pakistan, now unwrapping fresh U.S. artillery, could swap ideas with neighbor Iran, in our camp as long as the Shah keeps his pink marble palace.

Q. What would be the advantage to such unity?

A. Suppose our 48 states were threatened by a muscular Canada? And each state, supplied by an overseas friend, insisted on keeping its own defense secrets? That's the comparison — with Red

China substituted for Canada. Remember the tragedy of the last war, when Belgium and Holland were allergic to staff talks with London? When the panzers jumped them they hollered "Help." American, someone like General Van Fleet who knows the Chinese highway markers. Surely it's more costly for us to keep military missions in each country than it would be if we had an Asian GHQ working with generals representing each friend.

Q. Who would be the best titular leader?

A. The only possible candidate now is young Ramon Magsaysay, who like all good candidates refuses to run.

Q. Isn't he relatively unknown?

A. That's the point. He's not involved in ancient bickerings like Rhee or Chiang, Kai-shek, old men



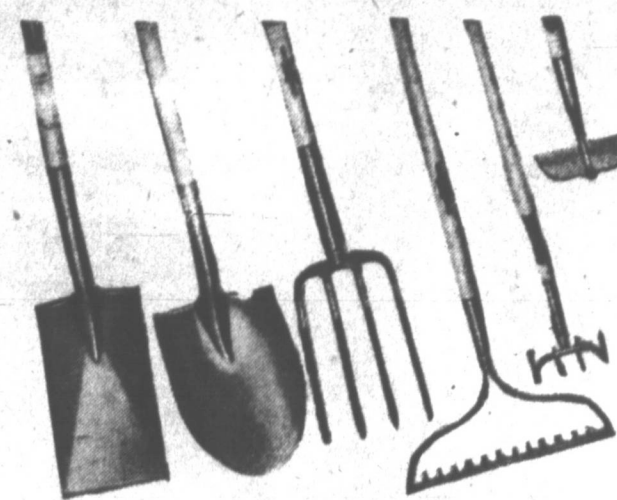

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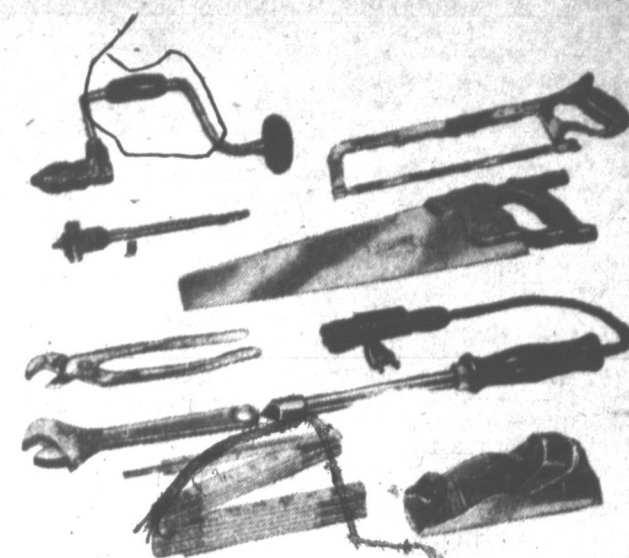

Boyer Not Discouraged At Stage Try

HOLLYWOOD, April 13 (UP) — Charles Boyer, back before the cameras for his television program, said Thursday his recent unsuccessful Broadway try didn't discourage him from trying the stage again.

Boyer is back in Hollywood after a New York play, "Kind Sir," which he admitted "would have closed in a couple of days if there hadn't been such a big advance sale."

Most of the critics frowned on the play, but theatergoers already had bought tickets on the strength of the names of Boyer and Mary Martin. But Boyer shrugged off the defeat.

"I enjoyed the play enormously," he said. "It was fun to do. Actually the audiences seemed to like it. Probably after reading the reviews they expected to come in and be hooked for their money. They expected the worst."

The play closed ahead of schedule and Boyer returned to the cameras, not for theater movies, but for his share of the popular dramatic series, "Four Star Playhouse." Though "Kind Sir" was not as popular as expected, the actor is celebrating his third year in video.

Boyer, David Niven and Dick Powell made entertainment history three seasons ago when they launched a permanent series of dramas on TV with the "Fourth Star," a guest celebrity.

Mothers Neglected At Dinner Table

WASHINGTON —UP—The housewife is neglecting herself at the dinner table. Another study by the U.S. Department of Agriculture cites several recent studies of women's eating habits and concludes that the distasteful side of the family is most in need of diet improvement.

One study of the Nebraska Experiment station showed that next to teen-age girls, mothers were the worst fed of all members of the family. Another study by the New York Experiment station showed that children fare best nutritionally, men and teen-age boys next best, younger women third and teen-age girls last. A study of diets of expectant mothers in one Massachusetts town showed that 63 per cent had too little calcium, 40 per cent too little riboflavin and iron, and 30 per cent too little protein, thiamine, and vitamin C.

Worldwide Preview Of Easter Parade

New spring wardrobes will go on display in the four fashion capitals of the world Easter Sunday. But the riot of color from gay bonnets and dresses will be accompanied by a quiet observance of the Christian holy day.

The women of Rome, London, Paris and New York traditionally show off their spring finery, but Fifth Avenue, famous fashion street, will as usual outdo Piccadilly, the Champs Elysees or the Via Veneto in the clothes parade.

Here is a look at the fashion picture, city by city:
FANCY DRESS PARADE
NEW YORK — Fifth Avenue plans its fancy dress parade without the shenanigans of other years. The Fifth Avenue Association, representing merchants along the street, said that it, the New York police department and the major radio and television networks are cooperating again to keep the parade from turning into a sideshow. The parade, which millions see in person or on television each year, reached the peak of zanyness two years ago, and then officials stepped in.

The clothes in this year's parade will look much like last year's in silhouette, with full and slim skirts about equal in popularity. But the skirt lengths on the Avenue will be about 14 inches from the sidewalk, one-half inch shorter than last spring.

Easter bonnets have more brim than last season, but those which will be worn on the Avenue won't be representative of spring styles. Feminine paraders have found that one way to get their picture in the paper is to blossom out in a hat they'd never be caught in again.

PLAIN RELIGIOUS FETE
PARIS — The French women celebrate Easter as a religious fete and there is no clothes-horse parade, although some women will appear on the Champs Elysees in something startling if the weather is good. French styles feature suit, with pleated skirts, a la Christian Dior, or fitted suits called "corset" by designer Jacques Fath. Paris women are flower happy.

Flowers comeon hats, in flowing printed silks or embroidered organzas. Navy blue is the leading spring color and iridescent straw the new hot material.

Paris families will attend elaborate masses at the celebrated Notre Dame cathedral, the Madeleine church and the Sacre Coeur, atop Montmartre. Many French families will be on a three or four-day country holiday.

ROME RUSHES SEASON

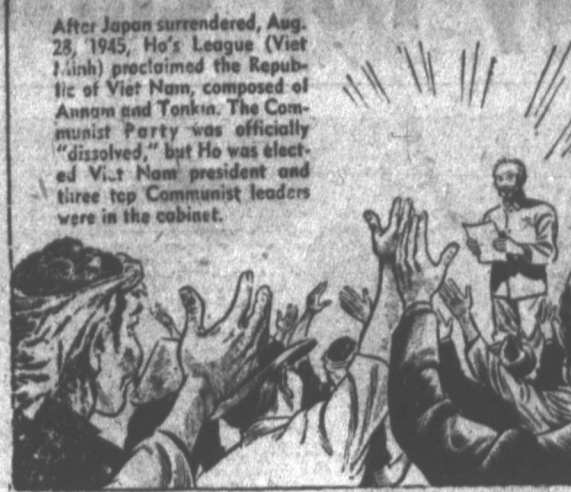

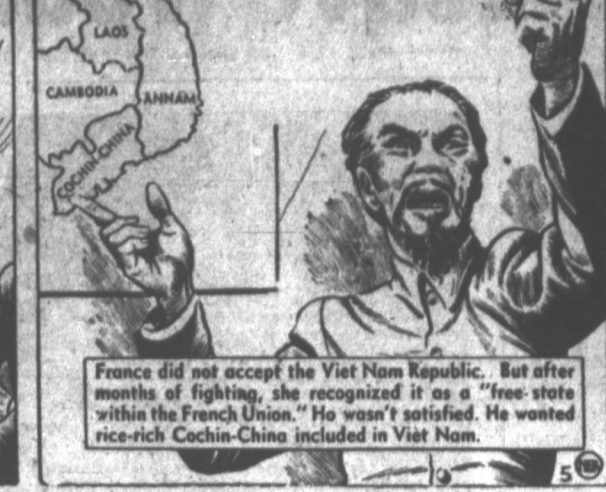

After Japan surrendered, Aug. 23, 1945, Ho's League (Viet Minh) proclaimed the Republic of Viet Nam, composed of Annam and Tonkin. The Communist Party was officially "disbanded," but Ho was elected V. I. M. Nam president and three top Communist leaders were in the cabinet.



France did not accept the Viet Nam Republic. But after months of fighting, she recognized it as a "free state within the French Union." Ho wasn't satisfied. He wanted rice-rich Cochinchina included in Viet Nam.



In 1946 Ho went to Paris to negotiate. French Reds welcomed him and he spent a lot of time with Russia's Andrei Vishinsky. France finally recognized Viet Nam as a "democratic republic" and proposed to settle the Cochinchina dispute by a popular vote there. But before it could be held, there was a "Pearl Harbor" sneak attack by 11,000 fanatical natives in Annam and Cochinchina.

Sanction Is Given Road Bill

WASHINGTON, April 13 — UP — A Senate-House conference committee has reached agreement on a billion-dollar "better roads" bill strongly backed by President Eisenhower. The measure, a compromise between differing Senate and House versions, would authorize a federal outlay of \$966 million a year for highway building, compared to the current spending level of \$675 million. Mr. Eisenhower had urged in his budget message last January that highway aid funds be sharply increased. The compromise, which is virtually assured of speedy acceptance by both chambers, was worked out after the House authorized \$875 million and the Senate \$1,010,000,000.

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Kremlin Has Bad Luck With Spies

The Kremlin is having bad luck with its spy agents.

Vladimir Michalovich Petrov, the spy chief of the Russian secret police in Australia, has come over to the West.

He follows in the steps of Igor Gouzenko, confidential code clerk in the Soviet embassy in Ottawa, Canada, and Yuri Rastvorov, spy chief in Japan.

Petrov told the Australian security and intelligence organization to which he surrendered:

"I no longer believe in Communism since I've seen the Australian way of living."

That is a weak spot in the vast Soviet spy system. The MVD, the secret police, sends its most trusted men abroad to spy. They see how people live in free countries, and sometimes they choose freedom.

When Gouzenko surrendered himself to the Royal Canadian

workers who recently refused to load war goods intended for India. First dispatches said the Petrov documents did not concern attempts to ferret out the British-Australian atomic and guided missile tests in the Monte Bello Islands and the Woomera rocket range. But this could come later.

Just what information Rastvorov gave when he handed himself over to the United States intelligence agency in Tokyo last January is still not known. But it is understood he disclosed every detail of Soviet spy activity in Japan—which would include Korea.

Petrov, when he surrendered, handed over documents which Australian Prime Minister Robert Gordon Menzies said involved both other MVD agents in Australia and members of the Australian Communist party.

A lot of wise baseball men were predicting last year that Simmons might surpass Roberts, but the quiet lefty got his toe tangled up with a mower and after being out nearly a month, never regained top form.

This year Simmons has looked much sharper. That durable Roberts, who has yet to win a game, Robin lost the Philly opener to the Pirates after being cuffed conse-

quently by the hitters in exhibition competition, in which he suffered four defeats, being combed for 53 hits and run in 43 innings. That's not like the Roberts of old.

All of the Pittsburgh hits were singles, and Simmons also struck out four. The Philly fans also were panned over the hitting of Willie Jones, who had a two-run homer and three singles, batting in three runs from his head left spot in the lineup. Simmons had two singles himself.

In the only other National League game, the Dodgers got even with the Giants, topping them, 6 to 4, with a 12-hit display as Don Newcombe limited New York to six hits. The Indians made it two in a row over the White Sox, 6 to 3, as Bob Lemon pitched a three-hitter. The Yankees scored their winning run without a hit in a 2-1 victory over the Mets, who ended the long hitting streak of Washington while Baltimore gained its first triumph 3 to 2 at Detroit in American League action.

There were no other game scheduled.

Brooklyn piled up a 5 to 0 lead against the Giants then coasted—almost too much. Newcombe appeared to tire in the late going and catcher Ebbas St. Claire stirred things up with two-run giant homers in the ninth. Newk ended the rally after that. Gil Hodges hit a homer, double and single, while Newcombe himself drove in two runs with a sacrifice fly and single. Junior Gilliam also homered for the Dodgers.

Fireproof Stables Will Receive Test

Limited TV Voted By NCAA Members

KANSAS CITY, April 15 —UP—A vote overwhelmingly in favor of a limited television program for college football in 1954 has been cast by member colleges and universities of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, Walter Byers, NCAA executive director, announced Thursday.

The association's membership has approved the proposed telecasting plan of the 1954 NCAA television committee by a vote of 184 to 26, Byers said. The plan and ballots were forwarded March 29 to presidents of all NCAA member institutions and to officers of all athletic conferences.

Terms of the mail referendum required that marked ballots be returned with a postmark date showing no later than midnight, April 9, and that at least two-thirds of the votes cast must approve the plan to make it operative, said Byers.

The plan was drafted by the TV committee after a series of meetings, including hearings at which interested parties appeared to advance suggestions. In effect, it provides for a national game-of-the-week to be telecast on each of the 13 Saturday dates of the season with as many games as feasible to be telecast on the 13th date (Thanksgiving).

NEW YORK, April 15 —UP— Edward R. Murrow, the news commentator recently embroiled in a verbal fight with Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, Wednesday won a Peabody Award for his "fair minded" radio and television programs.

Murrow, who mixed with McCarthy over the Wisconsin Republican's investigating techniques and the question of who was lying, was offered for "courage that has compelled him to take on assignments above and beyond the call of duty."

Murrow, a CBS commentator, was already a three-time winner—Station WBAW, Barnwell, S.C. won the award for outstanding public service by a local station for its program "Church of Your Choice."

Shivers Set To Sign Commie Bill

AUSTIN, April 15 —UP— Gov. Allan Shivers was scheduled to sign into law Thursday an act of the recent special session which outlaws the Communist party and all types of subversion in Texas.

The new law was the result of a hearing last December by the Texas Industrial Commission into Communist activities and plans in Texas. It was one of Shivers' major recommendations to the legislators when the special session began March 15.

Shivers Wednesday signed the \$26 million tax increase bill, which takes effect Sept. 1, and announced he would sign the bill raising teachers' pay by \$402 a year at a ceremony April 22.

The Communist control law confiscates the property of the Communist party and subjects individual members and subversives to a maximum penalty of 20 years in prison and a \$20,000 fine. Individuals convicted under it also are barred from holding public office.

The tax increases were levied on beer, natural gas production and corporation franchises. The beer tax was hiked from \$1.57 to \$2 per barrel, and the corporation rate went up from \$1.25 to \$2 per \$1,000 of corporate assets.

The natural gas tax will be increased from 6.72 per cent of the wellhead market value to 9 per cent. But the tax will drop to 8 per cent on Sept. 1, 1955, to 7 per cent in 1956 and remain at that level.

Ranger Asks Change Of Venue

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., April 15 —UP— Judge Arthur Klein was to hear a strange type of request Thursday when attorneys for Texas Ranger Capt. Alfred Y. Allee ask him to transfer Allee's trial to Alice, Tex.

The trial, slated to begin Monday, originally was scheduled for Alice but was moved to Brownsville by C. Woodrow Laughlin, former 7th district judge.

Allee's attorneys said Wednesday that Laughlin should have disqualified himself before taking any action in the case.

Allee was indicted by a Jim Wells county grand jury on a charge of assault to murder South Texas political boss George B. Parr, the Duke of Duval county.

Since Laughlin moved the trial to Brownsville he has been ousted from the 7th district bench by the Texas Supreme Court, which appointed A. S. Broadfoot of Bonham as temporary judge for the district.

Ranger Joe Briggs was indicted along with Allee, but Klein dismissed that indictment. The charges grew out of a courthouse corridor scuffle last Jan. 18, in which Parr's ear was twisted and bloodied.
