Tax Reform **Bill Heads**

WASHINGTON, April 7 -UP-The administration tax reform bill headed Wednesday into a crossfire of sniping from Senate critics demanding priority either for a balanced budget or for personal income tax relief.

The Senate Finance committee opened hearings on the massive neasure Wednesday merning with Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey as the first witness.

The bill, already approved by the House, would postpone a cut in corporation taxes, ease dividend taxes, provide some relief for working widows and people with heavy medical expenses, and liberalize depreciation allowances

The big fight is expected to come on a Democratic move to strike out the dividend relief and instead boost income tax exemptions to provide a general tax cut.

Sen. Walter F. George (Ga) senior Democrat on the finance committee, is the chief sponsor of a plan to increase exemptions from \$600 to \$800 this year and to \$1,-





Since we are naturally a little suspicious of President Eisenhower when he takes a stand compatible with providing more freedom, rather than less, for the American people and to a lesser degree to all the world, we are still searching for the joker in the deck in his reciprocal trade message.

Since his election President Eisenhower has rather consistently backed forces and measures that are not designed to bring additional freedom to Americans. He has repudiated his party's pledge for sound money; he has fought the Bricker Amendment; he has plugged for more social security; he has asked for a higher debt limit; he has asked for an expanding public housing program, etc., etc., In all of his expressions since taking office he has demonstrated what amounts to wilful ignoring of or ignorance of the basic and fundamental laws of economics.

That's why we are still viewing with suspicion his plugging for a lowering of the tariff walls, for such a procedure will be taking a step toward more liberty.

His message on the matter also gives a clue as to the why of some of his previous decisions which apparent-Iv were made on the basis of advice from the outside. In this instance, the President had the good sense to appoint to his commission to study the tariff program men who had some knowledge of the workings of economic laws and then follow the advice they gave him. Thus, it may be argued that many of his previous decisions were not actually his but were the result of naming the wrong men to consult as advisors.

From both a moral and economic standpoint the arguments for the desire of the protectionists to force higher artificial prices upon the market in order that American producers will enjoy special privileges are easily disposed of. They have been pointed out logically and reasonably since Frederic Bastiat fought the battle of protective tariff in France more than 100 years ago. History tells us over and over again that in the long run a high protective tariff brings only hurt to the nation establishing it.

In his message asking a reduction of the tariff, Eisenhower has taken a step in the right direction — and for this we give him credit. We can only hope that, either through greater understanding on his part or better selection of advisors, he will begin to see the wisdom, not only from the viewpoint of politics but from the viewpoint of aiding American people to come a little closer to freedom, of following a course designed to aid the cause of liberty. We don't know of a better test that he could make on his beliefs and policies than to determine whether they are based upon a theory of might makes right or upon a theory that liberty is an inalienable right of all men and that actions toward spreading liberty are actions in the right direction.

What Kind Of Leadership Has The Anti-Defamation League?

I believe the public is entitled to know the kind of leadership that is directing the Anti-Defamation League. The Anti - Defamation League (ADL) is a part of the B'nai B'rith. It issues a monthly magazine called "The Facts" that pays little attention to facts o truth if the issue of November, 1952 is typical of the magazine.

I never knew of this magazine until the book "Apostles of Discord" listed it as one of the magazines from which readers could find further information about R. C. Holies, I wrote to the National Director of the Anti-Defamation League, Benjamin R. Epstein, and secured a copy of this magazine.

The whole issue is devoted to the writer and to some of the columnists carried by Freedom Newspapers. Judging from this issue, one of the main objects of this magazine is to prevent any individual who criticizes any member of the ADL from selling his services to any magazine or newspaper and to prevent any speaking engagements by any such individual if the ADL can bring enough pressure to bear. It of course has that right, but the public also has a right to know what this organization is trying to do.

It objected to The Register, one of Freedom Newspapers, carrying Upton Close, Joseph R. Kamp, Mervin Hart and David Baxter. It also objected to The Register carrying a report of the Gerald K. Smith meeting at Los Angeles under the auspices of the Christian Nationalist Party. It especially objected to our reporting that Smith and Sen. Jack B. Tenney had stated that the ADL was responsible for them not being able to hold their meeting in the Mason's audi-

The whole issue gives evidence that its objective is to intimidate publishers from giving factual news reporting. In other words, it would like to have the power to black out any individual who takes a stand against the Fair Employment Practices Act or what the ADL advocates.

Now, I want to give a little evidence of the dishonesty or stupidity of its National Director, Benjamin R. Epstein, Mr. Epstein has been with the ADL since 1939 and has been its National Director since 1949. In the November, 1952 issue of

The Facts" it makes the statements that I am a foe of education and have a campsign against I wrote Mr. Epstein on February

25. 1954 as follows:

"There were a couple of statements in this issue of 'The Facts' in regard to me that I think were just as irrational and unfair as the one above referred to (referring to accusations against David Baxter). They are that I am a 'foe of education' and the reference to campaign against education.' I do not believe you could ever find anything that I have ever published that would warrant such conclusions. Sure, I am a foe of state 'education,' but only because I do not believe the state can educate an individual to believe in the Commandments and the Declaration of Independence.

"Any man who is a foe of real education or does anything that campaigns against real education would be a silly person and about as irrational a person as it is possible to be. I have repeatedly contended that we are not spending enough energy on education and that it is a race between education and catastrophe.* * "I hope you will see fit to correct

There is no more reason for contending that a man is a foe of education because he opposes tax-supported schools than there is to conclude that a man is against using fire to generate heat and power because he is against incendiary fire that burns down buildings."

Now, Mr. Epstein writes back in answer to this request for a correction in the ADL magazine as follows:

"The other statement in "The Facts' to which you took exception was our description of you as a 'fee of education.' The public schools educate the overwhelm majority of children in the United States and therefor opposition to publicly supported education is tantamount to opposition to education. Since you have acknowledged that you are opposed to publicly supported schools, we fail to see how you can distinguish between that kind of attitude and opposition to education per se."

On the question as to whether public schools educate the overwhelming majority of children, Isabel Paterson contends in her book "The God of the Machine." that "nine-tenths of the useful knowledge the average person possesses is certainly acquired out of school." 


