## **Water Supply Outlook Good** Says McKay

Secretary of Interior Douglas Me-Kay said Friday the water outlook for the new crop year "is generally good" in all parts of the West except the Rio Grande basin and other parts of the Southwest. He said rains in the Southwest during April may have improved the situation there somewhat. A month ago he described the out-look in the Rio Grande drainage

area as "discouraging." He said the situation has "im-proved considerably" in the Colorado, Gila and Platte River drain-

Some spot areas in other basins have a poor outlook, McKay said, including the Umatilla and Baker projects in Oregon, the North Platte project in Wyoming - Nebaska, and the Angostura reservoir in South Dakota.

In some other areas, he said, the runoff from the winter snows will be light, but there is sufficient holdover in storage reservoirs to insure an adequate water supply for





### Red Problems

It has long been a Communist hope that the capitalist nations, most particularly the United States, would be ravaged from within by economic upheavals and the resulting social unrest.

Now the evidence is appearing that the shoe may be on the other foot — and the Soviet Union and her satellites are facing very serious internal problems of an economic and social nature.

In a speech made in mid-March, Director Harold E. Stassen of the Foreign Operations Administration said: "There are increasing reports indicating real economic trouble inside the Iron Curtain... They have taken millions of their people and placed them at sub-standard conditions under veritable slave labor . . . They have pulled down these groups while they make a tremendous effort to make some improvements in living conditions of a minority . . . That very process is starting to show very real strains and cracks and stresses." Now U. S. News & World Report has featured an article, based on reports from Bonn, London and Washington, which sums up the available evidence.

The article bears the unequivocal title, "Depression Hits Communist Empire." It observes, "People throughout the Communist empire are ill-nourished, ill-clad, illhoused. In the satellites, they are obviously restless. Prosperity is not to be found anywhere within the Communist realm.

This, in the magazine's view, is largely the consequence of a breakdown in planning. Communism has gone allout to develop heavy industry, and has neglected consumer industry. And the upshot, says U. S. News, is ruined fields, short crops, shortages of food, clothing and housing; famine and general misery. Workers, underfed and without promise of reward, have little incentive to produce."

Some figures tell a revealing story in themselves. Since 1916, before the revolution, Russia's human population has increased 40 per cent — but her livestock populaion, which is an excellent barometer of the food situation, has actually declined by three per cent. Since 1937, Russian industrial production has more than doubled, a considerable achievement. But the consumer's share has gone down and down — where it amounted to 42 per cent of the total in 1937, it was but 28 per cent last year.

If the U. S. News-survey is correct, the economic blight is intense everywhere - in Poland, Hungary, Rumania, and in Czechoslovakia which, prior to communization, was self-sufficient in food and also was a highly-advanced and prosperous industrial power. Czech coal production, a vital element, has gone to pot, primarily because of the poor food and housing allowed miners. Strong efforts have been made to bring product tion up, but it seems to be a case where even Communist methods can't get blood out of a turnip. In China, there are famine conditions. Famine is nothing new to that wast land, but the Reds had promised to prevent it.

It is significant that top Russian officials, from Malenkov down, in speeches made for internal consumption, are promising all kinds of improvements in the living standards of the masses. Soon, they say, there will be more food, more and better goods of all kinds, more medical services, and so on. They are apealing to the people's loyalty and patriotism. This, in itself, certainly shows that there are grave troubles back of the Cur-

## Different Situation

The Pacific Northwest is undergoing a psychological readjustment that is hard for some people to swallow. For more than a generation the region has been dependent upon federal approriations and political expediency for development of a large part of its electric power needs. The investor-owned taxpaying electric companies of the Pacific Northwest conducted their businesses in the shadow of nationalization while the public was conditioned to a federal power monopoly by an unending barrage of dramatic announcements from politicians. Now the situation is different. The federal government is attempting to withdraw from its dominating position in the electric power field. The Pacific Northwest has been given an oportunity to reassert its independence and its nitiative. This is not easy after more than two decades of dependence. Some feel that Uncle Sam ought to at least remain in the Northwest as a "senior" partner in the power business, even if he has forsaken the roll of boss. However, there is plenty of evidence that the Northwest will readjust quickly and reassert the resourcefulness which led it to great electric achievements long before a federal power program was ever head of.

According to J. E. Corette, president of the Montana Power Co. and currently heading a five-company power development program, "Enough kilowatts of new electrical energy to meet the estimated needs of customers for twenty years can be generated at no cost to the federal government." The five companies have proposed a plan to meet this goal. It has been approved by the Department of the Interior. "The companies," declared Mr. Corette, "see a combined need for 150,000 to 200,000 kilowatts a year for the next twenty years and they are willing to spend about \$50 million a year to provide that

Can State Teachers Be Trusted Responsibility?

The American government was based on the theory that individuals were responsible for their own development and support. That it was not the province or

A responsible person is a re-liable and trustworthy person. He standpoint, it means that he has agent, capable of determining one's own acts. In other words, person who believes in individual responsibility does not believe that coercion or fraud to make someone else help support him. He is the kind of citizen we must have if we are to have a society and a government that will permit man to develop both materially and spiritually.

Thus, it is of the utmost importance that the youth of the land come in contact with teachers and others who can instill into them the belief in individual responsibility.

Now, it seems difficult to comprehend how state teachers can really teach their pupils to believe in individual responsibility when these teachers do not believe that it is their responsibility to teach well enough that people will voluntarily buy their services. When the youth of the land are encouraged to believe that public or tax-supported teachers are really individuals of high character and individuals who believe in and practice responsibility, then it is very difficult for them to believe that they should follow a different course of action or a different belief from the public school teacher.

The parents and the public in

general are sending the youth to public schools because they want their children to be educated. Because they want their children to know the difference between right and wrong. Because they want their children to know that there are certain moral, eternal principles that they must use as guides for their conduct if they are to develop and promote justice and go through life courageously without fear of ever being embar-

But these children are going to eachers who believe in the tenure aw - who believe that because they once get a permit from the state to teach it is not their responsibility to teach well enough that people will voluntarily pay their salaries. They have become exalted. They seem to put their trust in the power of the state instead of their own ability to be able to compete with all who would teach.

Pupils Imitate Teachers And since most people learn hat they learn by imitating others, it is only natural for the pupils not to believe in individual responsibility when they grow It is only natural for th believe that the state should also protect them from competition, as believe the state owes them an opportunity to get an education, it is then natural for them, when they grow up, to believe in "so-cial security," minimum wages and old-age pensions and all those and old-age pensions and all those things that go with individual ir-

Reaping What We Are Sowing And since the only way to judge anything is by its results, then and to initiate force to make other people help him.

The results are just as could e expected -- ever - increasing government power, ever - increasing government debts, ever - increasing government taxes, ever increasing discriminatory laws intended to get more votes, irredeemable paper money that is constantly becoming worth less and less, federal laws that take away from an individual his individual responsibility to support himself, long periods of unemployment, government monopoly n controlling credit and attemptng to control the value of money and one war after another. These are the natural fruits of an "education" under the direction of men who themselves do not believe in ndividual responsibility.

We need to be more afraid and nore watchful about what our children are being taught than we need to be afraid of Russian communism. Our danger is from within — not from Russia or from any other foreign ideologies. Our public school teachers are com-pletely denying the ideologies set orth in the Declaration of Independence that governments derive their just power from the consent of the individual and that all men have certain inalienable rights. This is exactly what must be taught in compulsory schools that are based on the theory that might makes right, that individuals are not equally free, that men must pay for a schooling that do not want to use and which they believe is harmful all because we have been taught by state school teachers to believe that the state has a moral right to do things that no individual has a moral right to do and that there are two standards of right and that men are no longer responsible for their own well being, but they have a moral right to take up the sword, to be an aggressor, initiate force to make others

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


