## Market Prices

How much is a mouse trap worth? How much is anything worth? Who sets the prices on things? In a free economy YOU set the price. Demand sets the value.

Let's take the example of a mouse trap. You own a lot of grain and one day you find that it is disappearing. You try to catch the man or beast who is taking the grain. After several days of detective work you discover that a mouse is taking a few grains each day. So you go after the mouse with a club. Finally you kill the mouse, but the grain still disappears. You tell your friends about the problem, and they tell their friends. The news gets around. You must get rid of a great many mice and you don't wish to spend all your time clubbing them.

One day a man who built a mechanical mouse killer stops to see you. He has heard about your trouble with mice. He will sell you one of his inventions for \$25.00. You don't think it's worth that much but you are willing to pay \$20.00 to get rid of the mice. He accepts your offer. Meanwhile another inventor has learned to trap ice effectively with a gadget which he offers at \$10.00. The first inventor has sold a number of his traps for \$20.00 and has recovered his original investment. Now competition compels him to lower his price. More traps. are available and people will no longer pay \$20.00. With increasing sales he finds he can sell an improved mouse trap for \$9.00. When your old mouse trap breaks, you buy the trap offered at \$9.00. Thus, the second inventor must reduce his price, improve the quality or his product will disappear from the market. On and on goes the process of lowering the price of traps until finally YOU set the price of mouse traps at 25 cents each. At this point the producers of mouse traps discover that the springs on the traps can be used for other purposes so they produce other items. There are now fewer traps available, so YOU offer 50 cents apiece and encourage the manufacture of more mouse traps. One day a manufacturer says to the other manufacturer of mousetraps, "Let's set the price at 75 cents because there are fewer traps on the market and the public is having just as much trouble with mice," However, a chemist produces a poison which will kill mice at one cent a mouse and you and other buyers vote for the poison and buy no more traps at 75 cents. In an effort to hold their market, the manufacturers of traps lower the price to 40 cents. The public does not buy. The manufacturers offer the trap at 30 cents but no success. When the price drops to 20 cents the public buys. Then the chemist does something better. He produces a poison that kills the mouse but not the dog, not the baby. It disposes of the mouse but leaves no odor. So the public puts the chemist back in business --- and so it goes in an endless cycle of consumer need versus free competitive market.

I quote from his speech: "If the U.S. Supreme Court does not at this time rule against racial segregation in the public

schools, we can make our tran-

sition by easy stages to a private school system to provide a good education for all our children. First, we can do away with the depression-born centralization of school authority in the state government, and turn the operation of the schools back to the county and city governments, perh a p s with the State supplementing the local funds during the transition stage. Local committees of Whites and Negroes can study the problems in their locality of arranging for educational groups to be organized to take over existing schools, and work out the problems of leasing or selling the buildings on a basis which would cause them to revert to the county or city if the leasing or purchasing group should fail to maintain a school of a given enrollment. "If the U.S. Supreme Court should at this time rule against

racial segregation in the public then we would need to schools. accelerate this process and have a state-wide transfer of the schools to private hands as rapidly as possible, as private organiz a tions would still be free to operate segregated schools if they so desired, even though the tuition of the pubils were paid by the State. "Of course, in either event we would have to amend our State Constitution, but that would not

be difficult if the people desired if the ruling at this time, is not against segregation, I purpose that we start laying plays in North Carolina to solve our school problems in the only way we can ever really succeed in solving them, the way of liberty rather than the way of increasing government authority. If any local group wishes to organize and operate a non-segregated school, and can persuade parents and guardians of both races to send their children to it, I say by all means leave them free to do so. It is my feeling that very few if any such schools would find enough customers to operate in North.
