



SA Tests Off Due To Confusion

SAN ANTONIO, April 28-UP-SAN ANTONIO, April 28—UP—San Antonio won't participate in the nationwide test of polio vaccine, because of confusion over whether the shots may be given where polio has been reported.

Parents of children who had been scheduled to get inoculations of the Salk vaccine angrily protested the decision not to participate, but Dr. George Rice, the city health officer, said it would stand.

Rice said the National Founda tion for Infantile Paralysis supplied the vaccine too late for a fair test in Bexar county, where 23 cases of polio have been re-ported this year, the latest last

He said he thought there would be trouble in other Texas counties, where the tests will be made although the polio season has begun.
He said parents in those counties would not be able to understand why the vaccine is withheld temporarily, when polio has been re-

Rice said he also feared some children would not be able to complete the three-shot test, because of polio outbreaks, and he thought some with active polio virus in their blood would get the disease despite the inequiations.



War Deterrent?

Some years ago, when nuclear weapons were new and infinitely less destructive than those of today, the fear was often expressed that it might be possible to actually explode part of the universe in which we live. The weight of scientific opinion was, and is, against that incredible concept. But progress - if that is the proper word for it — in nuclear development for war seems to have reached a point that few if any of us anticipated even a relatively short time back. The top physicists themselves have been surprised.

The March 1 test in the Pacific astonished the world. Secretary of Defense Wilson described it as "unbelievable" and said that the full details, which have not been made public, would "scare anybody." Secretary Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission, speaking with Presidential authorization at a White House conference, said that the blast was about double the expected size, but that it was never out of control and that the error made in prior calculations was "not incompatible with a totally new weapon.

How big was the blast? According to Time, "The test . makes all predecessors, including the 1952 shot, look like a string of one-inch salutes. The force of the explosion probably exceeded ten megatons (500 Hiroshimas). It sent a radioactive cloud billowing to a height that may have exceeded 20 miles." Admiral Strauss also helped answer that question. He said the H-bamb can be made "as large as you wish . . . large enough to destroy any city." Asked specifically if this means that one of the bombs could destroy New York City, he said, "The metropolitan area, yes." He denied ,however, the rumors that an island or a group of islands had been destroyed in either the March 1 or March 26 tests adding. "It might be more accurate to say a large sandspit or reef.

The most immediate repercussions came from Japan. Radioactive dust fell there, and a number of Japanese fishermen, whose trawler was not seen in the search made before the explosion, were injured. Some Japanese spokesmen demanded that the tests be stopped. But, there seems to be small chance of that happening — they will go on, regardless of any criticism, so long as the world is in its present unhappy state of cold and hot conflicts. Sir Winston Churchill came to our defense in this regard when he spoke in Commons against a Labor Party proposal that the tests be placed under international controls of some sort. He said, "We have no power to stop this. I am sure it would not be right or wise of us to ask that it should be stooped. When similar experiments are conducted by the Russians I cannot remember that anyone suggested such representations should be made to the Soviet Government.

What will be the end of all this? There are many quesses. The most obvious, of course, is an eventual war of unimaginable destruction. But some think that if two opposed powers have the H-bomb — and Admiral Strauss said Russia has it — the ghastly possibilities make the chance of war more remote. A German scientist who was instrumental in the development of the rockets with which Hitler bombarded England, said that he thought that within a year war may become a virtual impossibility. Malenkov himself has spoken of the horrors that can come from the atom, and in shocked terms. Perhaps, for the first time in history, a force exists which is so terrible that none would dare unleash it.

Evidence Lacking

Some years ago the government entered an antitrust suit against the four largest meat packers. It was contended that they constituted a monopoly, and should be broken up into a number of separate and smaller con-

Last month the Attorney General dismissed the suit Time magazine said, in a news account of this development, "After months of looking into every possible way to carry on, the Justice Department decided — with the full concurrence of lawyers and section chiefs held over from the Democratic administration — that it lacked sufficient evidence. For one thing, the big four's share of the U.S. meat market has shrunk from one-half to less than one-third in the last 10 years, while 800 independents have stepped to the fore. Furthermore, the department could find no independents willing to file a complaint against the big four and no consumers who thought they were being victimized."

One need not be a lawyer to see that the meat packing business is not a monopoly but is, on the contrary, highly competitive. For example, true monopolies invariably make very high profits — that is the main reason for creating or attempting to create them. But the profits earned by the meat packers are among the lowest in all manufacturing industry. That is true whether the profits are measured on the return on investment basis, or as a percentage of sales. And in recent years some of the packers, including large ones, have run for lengthy periods of time at an actual loss.

The packing industry, like every typical American enterprise, is made up of many companies, and each is trying to outdo the competition. Some of the companies are big, some are small. All of them perform a necessary service.



So if not one grain of wheat were grown in the U.S. this year, the country could still get by.

The cotton carryover of nearly nine million bales is almost double the requirement for a safe annual reserve, So again, if not one bale of cotton were picked this year, there would be no shortage.

In the drought and dust bowl area, for instance, nearly all the major wheat areas have been covered. This includes two counties in New Mexico, 18 in Texas, 23 in Oklahoma, 28 in Nebraska and nearly all of Kansas.


The premiums paid the government for this insurance range from \$1.25 to \$3.25 an acre. The total loss paid when a farmer's winter wheat is blown away entirely, and there is no chance to plant a late substitute crop, varies from \$6.75 to \$8.55 an acre.




