

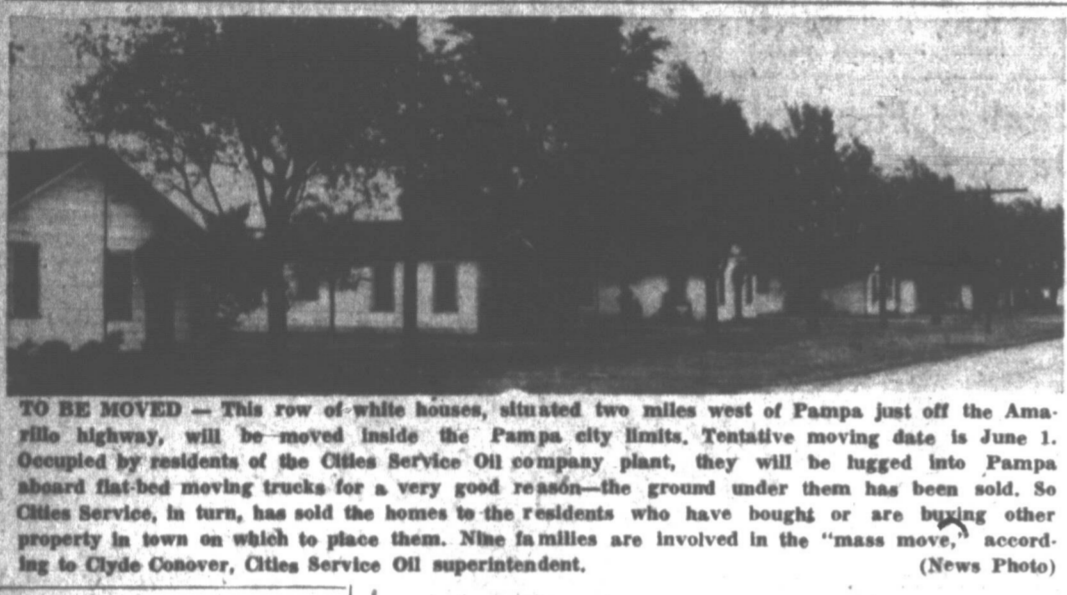

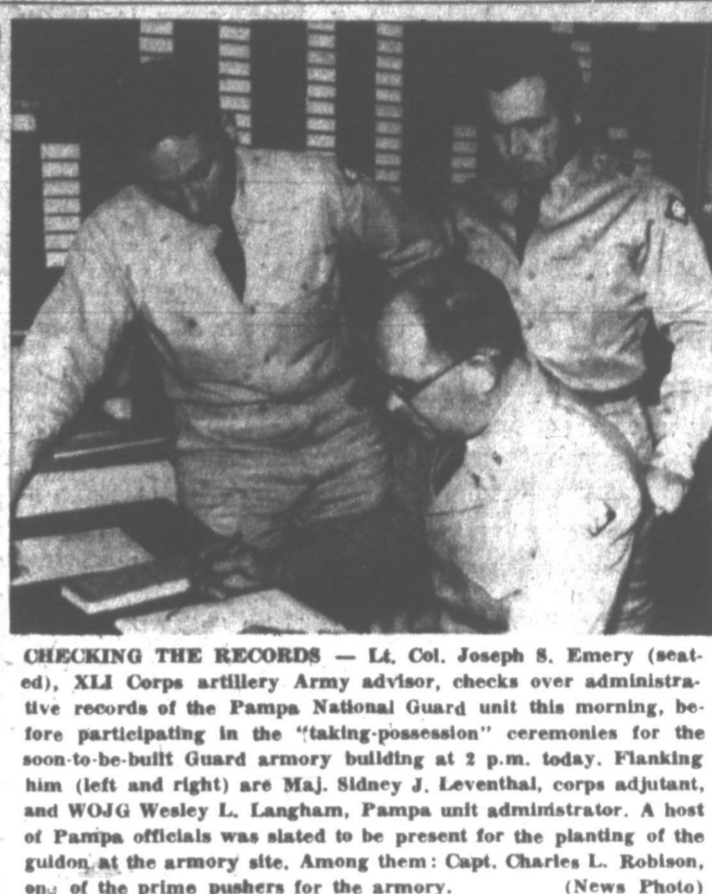

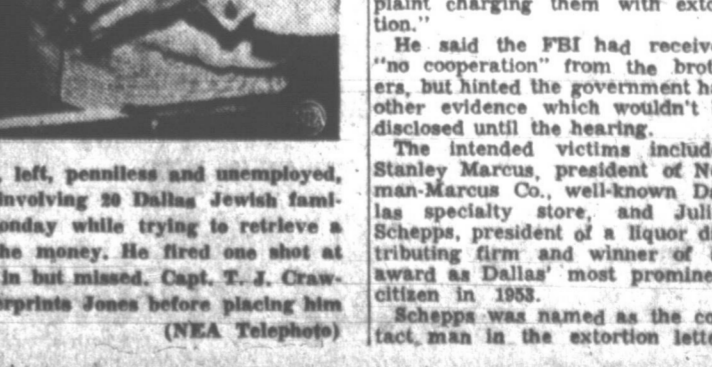

Area Farmers Experience Dual Soil Damage Eras

WHEELER (Special)—Farmers in the Wheeler county Soil Conservation district have witnessed a period when both wind and water play a major role in damage to future production of their soils. Checks made by the Soil Conservation Service and other agencies show this damage was not as great as other areas in the Panhandle.

Almost all of the wind erosion was due to insufficient cover to give adequate protection. This also is true with water erosion. There are about 16,000 acres of Wheeler county land damaged by wind erosion, enough to cause a loss in future production. Also thousands of acres not so heavily damaged were 1/2 as productive as before. Some of the damaged acreage is land that should be retired from cultivation. This land is very poor crop land, but excellent grassland.

Farmers and ranchers of the district have a very important role in improving existing conditions. There is help available through the Soil Conservation district in working out each individual's problems. Things to keep in mind are: 1. There is no substitute for good cover of growing crops or crop residue. Keep the land covered all year. 2. Emergency tillage is not effective on sandy land. This kind of land should be protected with growing crop or residue. When stabilized it should be planted in grass. 3. No machine should be used that will further pulverize the soil. 4. Emergency tillage should start as soon as it is evident that the soil will start to blow. Don't start sooner than this, but do not wait too long.

Farmers and ranchers in this county as well as others in the nation play a big role in future defense of free people. Why not plan to protect your property to keep your freedom?

Gray county commissioners have decided to advertise in June for bids on two road-topping jobs.

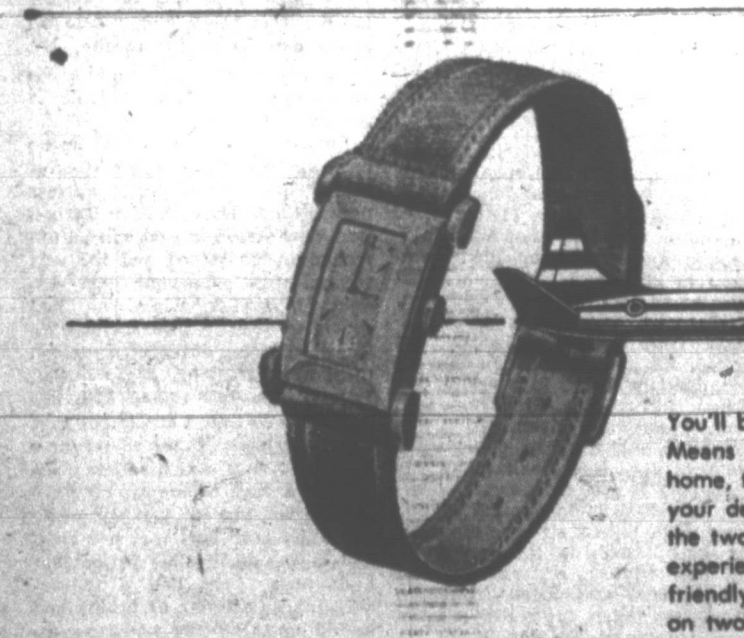

Communism Still Major GOP Issue

WASHINGTON, May 12 — UP — Republican senators were told in a staff memorandum Wednesday that "communism remains a serious and fundamental issue" in the 1954 campaign.

The statement was made in a 3,000-word document, "The Republican Pursuit of American Communists," from the staff of the Senate GOP policy committee which is headed by Sen. Homer Ferguson (Mich.).

Although President Eisenhower has emphasized that his legislative program provides the overriding issue in the 1954 congressional campaign, he has not barred discussion of his administration's record on the Communist issue.

Casualty Rate Of Soviet Spies Mounting Rapidly

The casualty rate in the world-wide Soviet Russian spy network has started to mount at a speed that must alarm the Kremlin.

It is known that they are talking freely. It looks as if they are leading Allied counter-intelligence agents to other men who have been named as being MVD spy rosters.

Two air force attaches of the Soviet embassy in London were ordered out of Great Britain last Saturday. They were accused of attempting to get military secrets.

Michigan Once Had 27 Different Time Zones

WASHINGTON, May 12 — UP — If you are confused by the switch from slow to fast time, listen to what happened in the old days when it all used to be called God's time.

The association of American railroads has an interesting bunch of anecdotes about the confusion that existed before 1883 when "standard time" went into effect.

Before the time law went into effect there were nearly 100 different time zones, based on the passage of the sun. In Chicago, the time changed about a minute every 15 miles.

Each of the watch makers took the liberty to set his own time. And it varied block by block, according to the whim of the maker of the clocks.

Also, according to Corliss, "When it was noon in Pittsburgh it was 12:31 by the sun in Chicago; 12:17 in Louisville; 12:07 in Indianapolis; 11:50 in St. Louis; 11:48 in St. Paul; and 11:27 in Omaha."

LONDON, May 12 — UP — A British scientist climaxed an inquiry into "sea serpents" Wednesday by cautiously advancing a theory that the famed Loch Ness monster may be an eel.

Dr. Maurice Burton of the Museum of Natural History made some qualifications, however, to avoid climbing out too far on a scientific limb.

Ever so, Burton is the first scientist of note to even admit there might be such a creature.

But other reports came from competent observers and Burton could not dismiss them as irresponsible or inaccurate.

The believers in sea serpents are far more numerous than might be supposed," Burton said. "But many who find the evidence credible are afraid to say so for fear of ridicule."

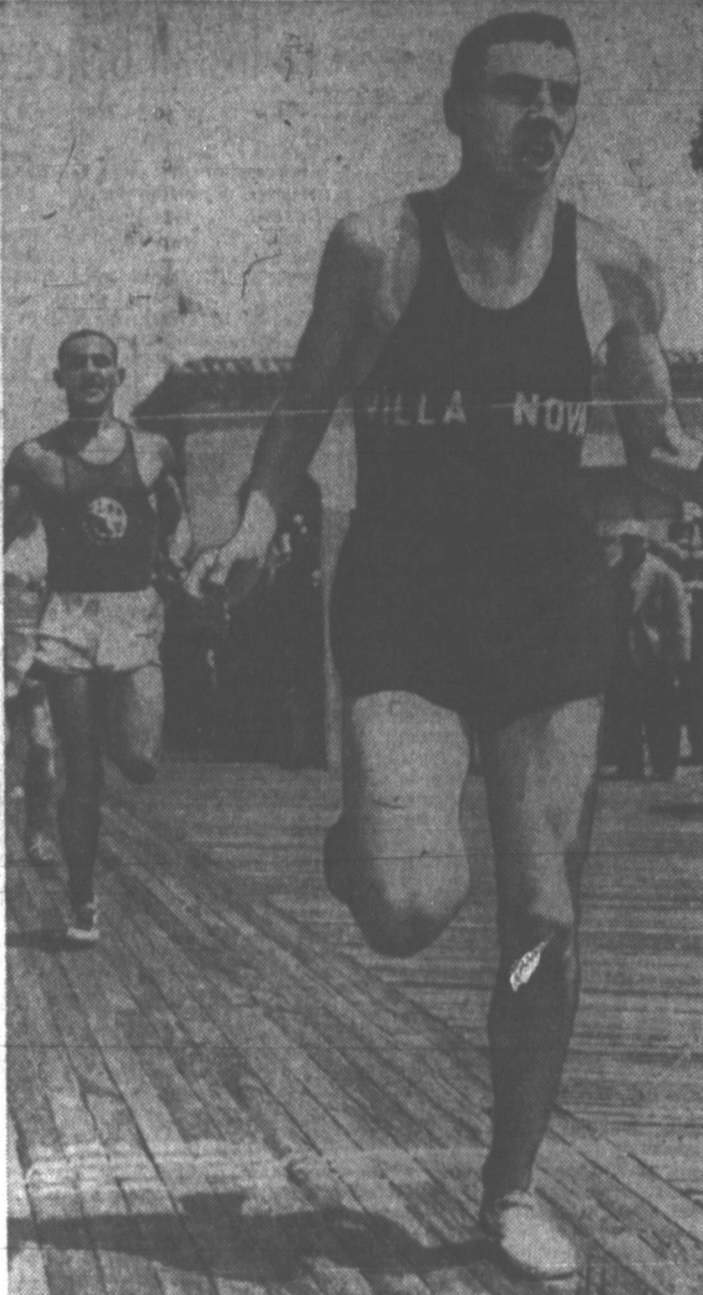

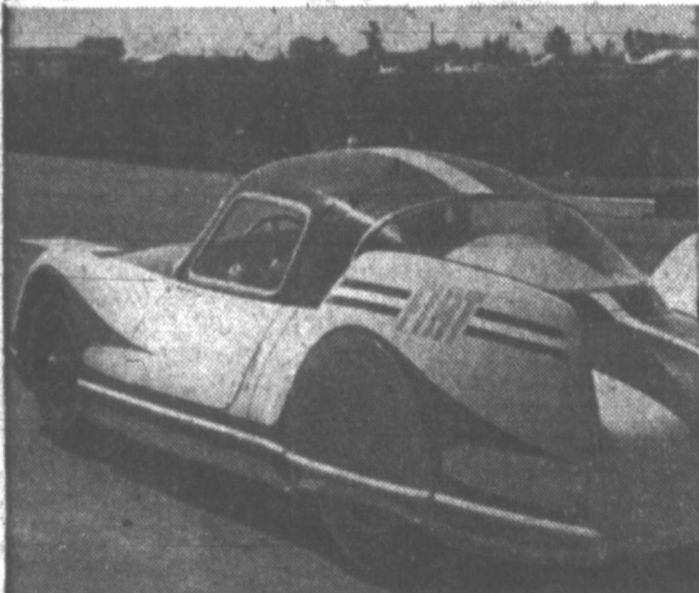
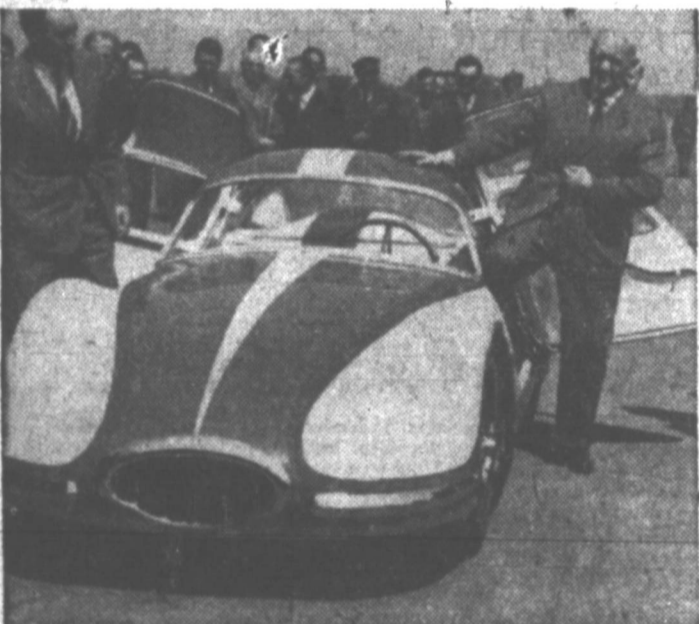

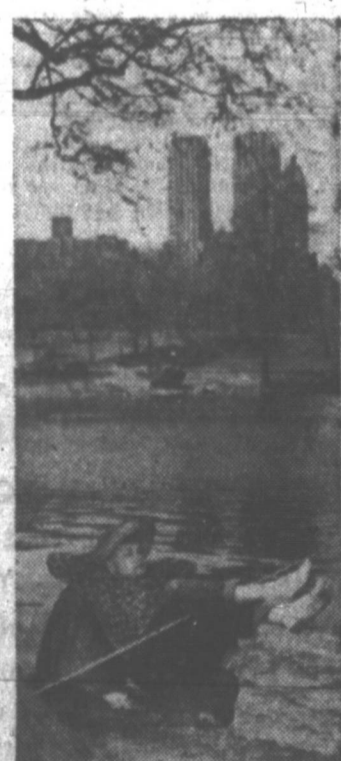

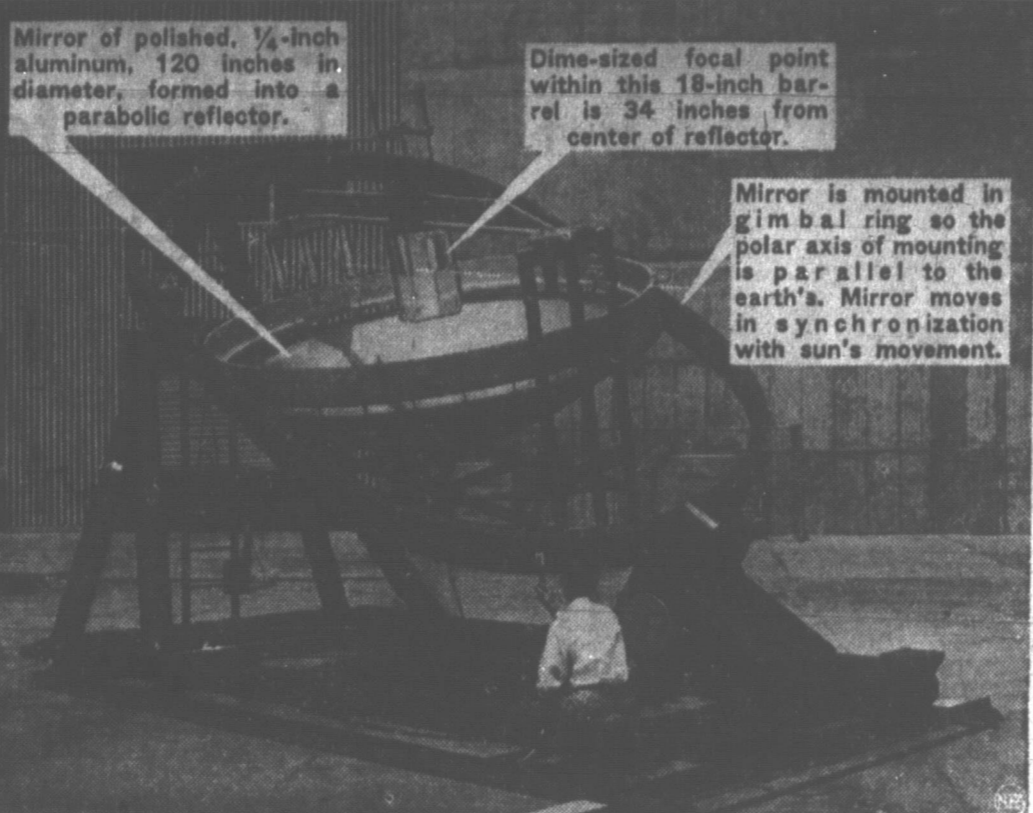

This Is A Hot One!



The photo-diagram above shows a furnace. Yes—that's right—a furnace. And its fuel doesn't cost a red cent. It comes from a 10,000-degree (F.) heat source—the sun. Largest solar furnace in the country, it is being used at Convair's San Diego division to study metals and ceramic materials. Basic part is the polished aluminum mirror. This collects the sun's rays and reflects them to a focal point, forming a 5-10th-inch image of the sun. Materials being tested are held by metal jaws against this point. The intense heat there melts a steel bolt in seconds. When sky conditions are ideal, the furnace can develop a temperature of 3500 degrees (F.). That's about 85 per cent of the temperature of the sun's surface. An oxyacetylene torch produces about 6800 degrees. Advantages of a solar furnace for research are that heating is accomplished under very pure conditions and in an oxidizing atmosphere. There is no interference from electric or magnetic fields or from gases. Using the solar furnace principle, you can light a cigaret with the sun's rays. Insert the cigaret in an ordinary flashlight reflector (photo at left) and point it at the sun.

Uncle Sam Seeks Million New Savings Bond Buyers

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — About \$10 billion worth of savings bonds purchased in wartime have now matured. But only a fourth of them have been cashed in.

The total amount of Series B and H savings bonds now outstanding — \$36.7 billion worth — represents 13 per cent of the U.S. national debt. Treasury officials would like to see this percentage raised. The purpose is to get as much of the debt as possible held by individuals.

The trouble seems to be that too many purchasers regard the \$25 bond as much like money. More \$25 bonds are cashed in after being held only a short time than is the case with the \$100 bonds. Savings bond experts now figure that if more people bought \$100's, they would hang on to them longer.

To make the \$100 bonds more attractive, the Treasury is now planning to "average date" their purchase. Thus if a purchaser had \$5 a week deducted from his pay check towards purchase of a \$100 bond, it would start drawing interest at the end of the tenth month.

Under previous regulations, \$100 bonds were dated only when the final payment was made. W. Randolph Burgess, Deputy Secretary of the Treasury in charge of all government financing programs and the national debt, says there is nothing inconsistent about promoting the sales of savings bonds in this period of business recession.

While there has been much agitation to increase consumer spending at all levels, to curb the effects of the recession, Mr. Burgess points out that \$5 billion a year going into savings bond purchases represents less than 2 per cent of the national income. Also, he says it's good business for anyone to save as much money as he can, any time.

As for what might happen if the economic situation got so bad that savings bond holders cashed in heavily, Mr. Burgess says only the national debt, there hasn't been enough depression to shake them out.

Total savings bond holdings as of Jan. 31, 1951, were \$38.8 billion — the highest amount on record since the end of the war. This figure includes \$36.1 billion of the three high-chairs a the roulette tables.

My Greatest Shot

My greatest shot was made at Spring Mill in Philadelphia during the 1939 United States Open Championship.

It was made on the 18th hole, the 72nd of the tournament.

It came after Sam Snead had registered, on the same hole, the ruinous 5 which cost him the title. After a great drive, I was faced with a brassie shot of about 260 yards to a very narrow opening to the green, one which probably did not measure more than 15 yards.

The distance was so great that I could not play a carry shot to the green.

I had to play short to roll through the opening.

I required a 4 to tie Byron Nelson at 294.

After waiting 15 minutes for the crowd to clear, I played a straight brassie shot which went directly through the center of the narrow opening and rolled 15 feet short of the cup.

I missed the putt for an eagle, 3 which would have won the tournament outright, but at least I had achieved one of my greatest thrills in hitting a fine shot when it really counted.

Byron Nelson, Denny Shute, and I tied and Nelson won on the second play-off.

Although I won the Open two years later, no single shot stands out in my memory as much as the beauty on Spring Mill's 18th, where Sam Snead came his unfortunate cropper.

NEW YORK, May 12 — UP — The departure from the majors of Johnny Lindell was an old story in the big league of baseball but one which always has its pathetic inflections.

Johnny actually was luckier than most. He had two separate careers under the big top, the first as an outfielder who knew world series glory with the Yankees and the second as a pitcher.

It is those memories which will keep him going as he travels back down the minor league hill.

There are a lot of the old heroes out there in the "bushes" who know the cheers of the big league fans and once were the center of national attention.

Often people wonder why they do it, and generally the answer is unvaried.

Sure, some of them stick with it to eat. But all of them play out the string as long as possible because they love baseball and can't get it out of their blood. Even the storied failures hope that somehow, someday, they'll make it back to the big time.

Many of them are actually but a step away, in a majority of cases the road is running the other way, but they refuse to believe it. Those with the highest hopes are the crew of former major leaguers playing in the larger minor league circuits such as the Pacific Coast League, the International League and the American Association.

Ancient J. Schommer Recalls When Grid Sport Was Brutal

CHICAGO, May 12 — UP — John J. Schommer, a jut-jawed man of 69, has lived by one ideal in more than 80 years as an athlete, referee and athletic director.

He cannot stand any form of hypocrisy.

Schommer, one of three men to win 12 letters at the University of Chicago, is a trustee at the Illinois Institute of Technology where he served as athletic director for 37 years.

He played his first football game in 1905 and remembers this about the game:

"That was the year 29 men were killed in football games in the country and 307 were hospitalized. It was so vicious that President Teddy Roosevelt threatened to have the game outlawed."

That the game wasn't banned from the American sport scene is in the opinion of the pipe smoking Schommer, "a fortunate thing."

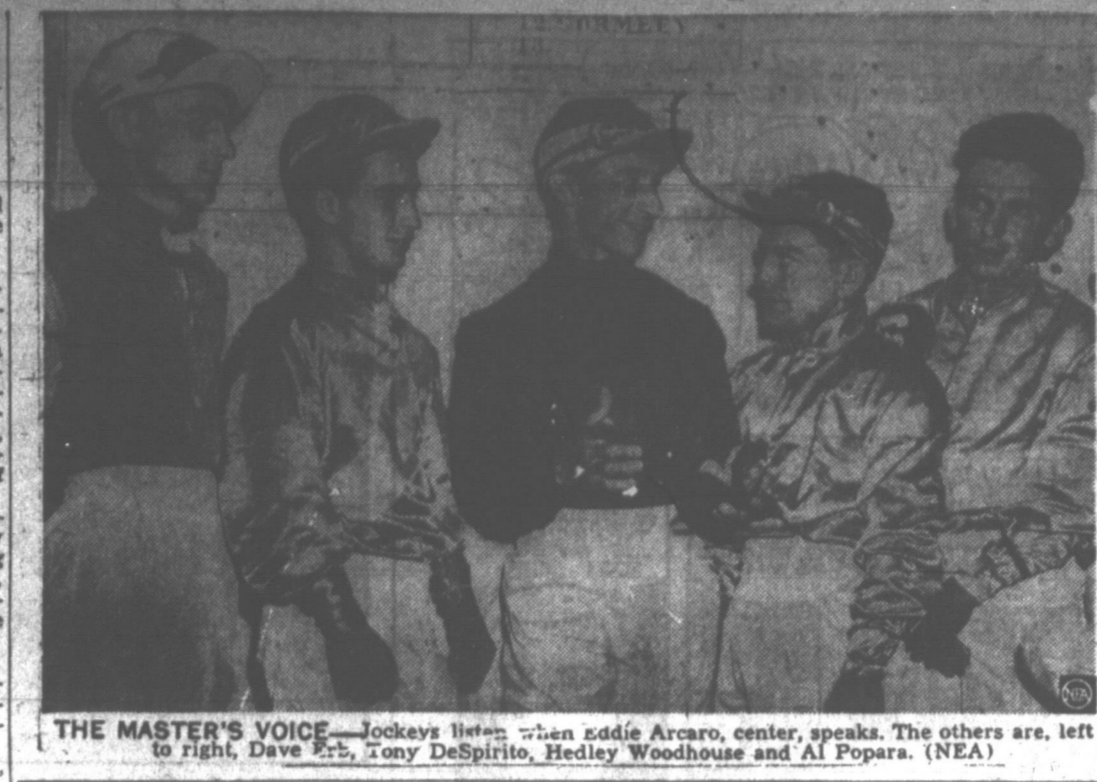
"Football, if placed in the proper perspective, can be instrumental in building a young man's character to accept responsibilities he will face in later life," he said.
