Can Opener Week

We hold no brief for the sword, but there have been times when we have had cause to doubt the mightiness that is so glibly credited to the pen. There can be no question, however, about the power of the cap-opener. Just to make it official, we will be celebrating National Can Opener Week during the merry month of May . . . and we do not recall that there has ever been a National Pen Week, nor even a National Sword Week.

Further, if you don't think it's about time for NCOW, you might consider how destitute the American family would be without this humble device - faced as it is with an average of 788 cans of food to open during the year. Another way of looking at it is that the great American con-opener will slice its way through four million miles of tin-coated sheet steel during 1954!

America's first can-opener, a rather slight improvement on the hatchet, was patented by Ezra J. Warner in 1854. Since that time, Uncle Sam has granted 1,149 more can-opening patents, so that the "art," as they call it in the Patent Office, is now pretty well advanced. In fact, there's one priced at \$3,000, that is studded with diamonds and rubies, although we think the magnet they now put on the wall-type can-openers (to keep the severed lid from falling in) is a gem of far greater volue.

Another little-known fact is that all of us who ever pen a can are indebted to the Can Manufacturers' Institute for the recent improvement and present excellence of the device that stands between us and starvation in this land of plenty. They hired twelve young lodies of assorted shapes and sizes, weak and strong, helpless and determined --- and put 'em to work "evaluating" can-openers, for eight hours a day. Among other things, they found that it takes only four seconds to open a can with a wall-type opener - more than twice as fast as the old fashioned punch-pump way.

We don't know what in the world they did with all the food they opened up, but they found out (with 450 different sizes and types of cans, including dented ones) what was good and bad about the openers. So now, when you buy one of these implements with the CMI Seal of Approval on it, you know it failed to make any of the girls cry, or scratch a finger, or wrench a tendon - or even get juice in her eye.

Albert Nock in his "The Theory of Education in the United States"' said 'The object of education, as we understand the word, the purpose of enforcing the Great Tradition's discipline, is to inculcate certain views of life and certain demands on life." Nock also defined educa-tion as being "the laying foundation for formative knowledge on which to build a structure of instrumental knowledge." And formative knowledge, as John Locke observed, is the ability to recognize an agreement or disagreement between our ideas and the reality of things. Or, as Socrates said. W "mow theyself."

The diestion of being deeply interes - in education was brought to my attention by a letter from one of the vice presidents of the National Citizens Commission for the Public Schools. He wrote me that "I can assure you that I myself am deeply interested in edu-cation, and I feel sure this aplies equally to the National Citizens Commission for the Public Schools as a whole."

A Test Of Interest

It seems to me the real test as to whether a person is deeply in-terested in education is whether he is deeply interested in educating himself. Whether he himself has the will to understand the nature of things - to "see things as they are" or the "reason of things," He certainly cannot add to general education if he himself does not have the will to try to educate himself.

If he is deeply interested in education, then he certainly wants his own ideas challenged or tested so that he himself can develop and improve education by presenting society with one improved unit. If he is not interested enough in education to want his own ideas challenged by those who want theirs challenged, then it seems reasonable to conclude that that person is not deeply interested in education but only fictionally inter-

ested. He mig.a think he is because he does not differentiate between education and training or instruction.

In past times it was widely believed that most people required relatively little in the way of food. The "tea and toast" variety of diet was a commonplace.

Science has proven how wrong that idea was. For example, an article by J. E. Rhoades in the Journal of American Dietetics Association deals with nutritional needs after a major surgery, severe injury, or prolonged illness. "What many such patients need most," he says, "is generous intake of highest quality meat, suitably suplemented and appetizingly served."

The reason for this is that long-drawn illness or serious injury usually results in marked losses of tissue proteins. In surgery, considerable protein may be lost through bleeding. To minimize the hazards resulting from these losses, replenishment must be accomplished as rapidly as possible. So the patient is urged to eat liberally of a diet especially high in top-grade protein, which is the kind provided by meat. Such a diet promotes rebuilding of tissues and healing of wounds, increases vigor, and speeds recovery.

The value of a high-protein diet to well people is also very great. This was conclusively demonstrated during the last war. Much of the credit for the American soldier's mental and physical vigor is given to the fact that his diet is rich in protein.

You Can't Win

More people ought to know about Circular 506 - published by the National Bureau of Standards - which tells us that now is the time for all good men to drain their radiators . . . and that "permanent" anti-freeze is about as eternal as a permanent wave.

Until now, in fact, we had thought it was a good idea to leave the stuff in all year, and that the rust inhibitor in it should keep the cooling system nice and clean. And so, according to a recent survey, do two carowners out of three!

But no. Those government scientists tell us we're hung over with horseshoes. Some of us have been lucky, while 700,000 others each year have had to buy new radiators, with still larger numbers investing in water pumps, hoses and thermostats. Circular 506 says: ". . . during use, anti-freeze is subjected to several conditions that cause it to change its properties. Inhibitors are depleted by exhaust gas leaking into the cooling system." This chemical change, it seems, can occur in as short a time as a few months. Acids are formed, also salts. The result is clogging and corrosion. All of which reminds us that anti-freeze monufactur-

ers nave been urging spring drain-out for years. So perhars we should apologize for the unworthy suspicion of self-interest. It is now evident they wanted to save us
