"The collapse of American leadership among the free nations at Geneva is a fact no one can or will deny," he declared " . It has already cost the United States a heavy loss of influence in Europe and will surely cost us an even heavier, if not a complete, loss of face in Asia."



Narrative Ot An Educated Individualist

Albert Nock had a lot to say about the difference between education and training. He quoted Abraham Flexner as saying that "getting education is like getting measles; you have to go where measles is. If you go where it is, unless you are by nature immune; you will get it, - no need to worry about that, - but if you don't go where it is, you will never get it. An effective distribution of edcuational germs, moreover, is a matter of individual persons rather

than of institutions. And if one has to be exposed to education in order to get an education, then it seems irrational to believe that anyone can get an education in any state institution where the teachers themselves are not enough interested in education to have their ideas checked to determine whether they are in agreement or disagreement with the Golden Rule, Pupils could be exposed to education in a private institution where the teachers can be interested in educating themselves. But most of the private schools now-a-days are so subservient to the state that few individuals seeking education will become teachers in these institutions. They can be good trainers and instructors in how to make a living, but not in how to live.

On the subject of the difference between education and training,

Nock remarked: "I have always been profoundly grateful for my luck in having been enabled in my early youth to understand that education is one thing and training quite another, and thus to avoid the vicious errors resulting from confusion of the two terms. It can not be too often reiterated that education is a process contemplating intelligence and wisdom, and employing formative knowledge for its purposes; while training is a process contemplating sagacity and cleverness, and employing instrumental knowledge for its purposes, Education. properly applied to suitable material, produces something in the way of an Emerson; while training, properly applied to suitable material, produces something in the way of an Edison. Suitable material for education is extremely scarce; suitable material for training abounds everywhere. The young men I saw during my brief term of service as a teacher (not those n particular who sat under me, but generally) were manifestly ineducable beyond the thirteen-year static level of intelligence; but they were fully endowed with cleverness and sagacity, and were capable of being excellently well

"When one considers man's place in nature, one gets a firm grasp on this distinction. In our loose and inaccurate speech, we say ommonly that man rose to ance over the rest of the animal world in virtue of his superior intelligence. I can find no evidence that this is so. It seems clear, on tions and reactions, what they did and how they worked, and he had the Edisonian cleverness in rearranging, modifying and adapting them for the satisfaction of his needs and desires. 





#### **Arsenal Workers Exposed** To Nerve Gas Poisoning

Two Army doctors reported at an Army-Navy-Air Force medical conference that in every case of exposure to "G-gas," which in lethal doses completely wrecks the human nervous system, the arsenal workers recovered completely within five days.

distributed two sets of charts one listing 50 patients and the other 70 patients. But they did not say at cases of exposure to G-gas at the arsenal.

Exposed arsenal workers reported a variety of effects. Tightness in the chest, burned vision, rinny noses, nauses headaches.

It was emphasized that no one in the arsenal—one of three places in this country where G-gas is manufactured by the Army Chemical Corps—received more than a mild dose. Extreme precautions are taken in the secret laboratory where the gas is compounded from theap common chemicals.


The army has stated flatly there is no chance that G-gas will leak to the atmosphere and threaten residents of nearby Denver.
