The Air National Guard has been put on a "ready-to-go" basis and could get some of its air detense squadrons into action against threatened attack within 45 minutes, Congress has been advised. 



Their trucks had a total capacity of only a little more than 1,000 gallons of water, and the firemen had to make long trips to refill them, as the town depends on individual wells.

Should the schools teach this? Should they teach a little bit of that?

The Denver Post believes they should teach fudgemaking, bulletin-board hanging, and scenery painting.

Collier's and The Saturday Evening Post believe they should cut out this nonsense and concentrate on fundamentals, requiring Latin, Math, Science, besides good courses in Reading, Writing and Spelling.

Naturally apologists such as the Denver Post can find school officials, sociologists, and assorted professors to defend the schools.

But such articles don't offset the fact that most parents who are concerned over their children's education are disturbed at how badly their children apply the Three R's in practice.

We usually take the side of the Three R's in controversies involving progressive education. But this isn't the crux of the argument.

We believe in a dynamic education, In which new ideas, really progressive ideas can be tried out, and put

into practice if they work. The editors of the Denver Post want their children taught fudge-making. That's all right with us.

Other parents may say: "My kid isn't going to college, anyhow. Why not teach him to learn riveting and bricklaying in school?"

That's all right with us, too.

We would like for our own children to learn the Three. R's and classical languages. But we don't insist on this for other people's children. We have no right to,

As long as schools are monopolized by any one group, Progressivists, Modernists, New Educationalists, Fundamentalists, Fudge-makingists, or what-not, somebody will be dissatisfied and the Great Debate just discovered by the Denver Post will continue to rage.

Canton, Ohio Libertarians Work On German Students

I recently received a letter from Leonard Read, president of the Foundation for Economic Education, Inc., containing correspond-Ohio, These Canton boys are real libertarians because they have no plans of enslaving me or anyone

One of them wrote to Leonard Read stating that last year he requested permission to house two German Exchange students who would spend three days in Canton before returning to Germany.
"Needless to say," he wrote "my
motive was to indoctrinate these two boys into freedom's philosophy." He went on to say:

"Time with these two boys was limited, but good use was made of the time availa' le. John Sparks, Bill Dykes, Dick Lawrence and I talked with them at breakfast, lunch and dinner. One boy's father was an automobile dealer in Germany, so arrangements were made with Jimmy Kempthorn, the largest local Dodge-Plymouth dealer, to have dinner and visit his garage. Again, we pointed out how this accumulation of wealth was possible only for individuals when people are free.


