WASHINGTON March 1 -UP-The Senate was ready to confirm Earl Warren as chief justice Mon-day but there was a backstage argument about how to do it and a new demand for an FBI report. Senate Republican leader William tended to ask for a roll call vote. But some Senate leaders who fear this might provoke some opposition were quietly pressing for a voice

Chairman William Langer of the Senate Judiciary committee mean-while said the Senate "should" get a full FBI report on the former California governor before confirme ng his nomination.

In spite of these developments however, Warren was expected to get a hearty vote of confidence b late afternoon—formally ending unexpected delay and an uproar over 10 "unevaluated" charges again Warren that were made public by Langer.

The unpredictable Langer defended his controversial handling of the nomination Sunday in a television interview. Looking into the charges he said, was the "usual practice."

He said the "real question" was whether the FBI should submit a report on Warren as it does in the case of other presidential ap-pointees, including associate jus-tices of the Supreme Court.

## Life In Russia

An exceptionally vivid picture of life under communism is found in a long article which Life recently featured. It was written by Emmet John Hughes, a veteran foreign correspondent who is now on the magazine's staff. Mr. Hughes applied for a Soviet visa for the purpose of obtaining an interview with Malenkov. To his amazement, the visa was forthcoming. He never got the interview, but he was able to see a good deal of Russia.

There were a few welcome surprises. Taxi service was good and the hotels were comfortable. His baggage was not searched and he was not followed by police. He encountered neither hostility nor curiosity. He found little of the blatant totalitarian propaganda he had expected. And Moscow has its outstanding sights — such as the magnificent ballet of the Bolshoi Theatre, and the unbelievably fabulous subway, with its 39 stations, "which are the most fantastic underground structures conceived by modern man.

But, Mr. Hughes found, the pleasant aspect of Moscow is quickly exhausted -- "the rest of the scene is painted in different colors.

For instance, as he wryly observed, Moscow "is a city where women have been blessed with literal answers to all imaginable dreams of equality with men." This means that women must work at all kinds of hard manual labor — carpentry, bricklaying, drilling. Gangs of women clean the streets with spades and crude brooms - a colossal task in winter. And, he discovered, beyond all else Moscow is a city of queues. People stand interminaably in line for just about everything — especially, food. And the great masses of people are poorly and often inadequately dressed.

Mr. Hughes made a particular effort to learn all he could about the life of the Soviet worker - his wages, diet, and housing. He found that the people are the victims of "an elaborate 'shell game' played with numbers, prices, wages and production figures." He cited the much publicized announcement that meat prices would be reduced 15 per cent and fruit and vegetable prices 50 per cent. The joker soon appeared. Simultaneously, all meat was re-graded into 12 categories --- and the more edible grades remained high-priced. And the vegetables and fruits could not be found in the state

The state store, he continued, with prices fixed by government decree, "is a socialistically pure institution." nd the prices charged — save for subsistence items would stagger anyone accustomed to America's private and competitive retailing system. The average worker's wage in Moscow is about 650 rubles a month. A coffee pot costs 92 rubles; a rayon shirt 120; a cheap serge suit 1,500. By this kind of price fixing, the government swiftly and completely siphons off the people's earnings, and makes enormous profits. As an example, the state buys beef for 1.5 rubles a kilo (2.2 pounds) and sells it for 12.5.

The relative few at the top, on the other hand - high military officials, important officials, and industrial executives — leading artists — live extraordinarily well. The highest income tax bracket is only 13 per cent above 1,000 rubles -- which, as Mr. Hughes observed, is a dispensation to wealth enjoyed in no capitalistic nation of the West." So much for the workers' paradise!

### **Problem** Drinkers

A doctor who heads the medical department of a leading oil company recently spoke before a group of safety engineers on an extremely important problemthat of the alcoholic in industry.

As all of us know, the drinking drive is responsible for a harrifyingly high percentage of the carnage on our highways — in Chicago, for instance, it has been officially stated that 50 per cent of fatal accidents are the result of mixing alcohol and gasoline. In industry, too, the alcoholic is far more accident prone than others. He is a menace not only to himself but to his associates. On top of that, the alcoholic is often absent from the job, is inefficient, and presents all kinds of recurrent problems to his employer, his friends and his family. The doctor mentioned estimated that there are 2,000,-000 problem drinkers in American industry today, that the number is swiftly increasing, that each loses an average of 22 days of work each year because of drinking and that the payroll cost alone totals at least \$741,-000,000 annually!

He then offered a solution — and one which has proven sound and effective. Most alcoholics want to find a way out. The modern industrial approach to the problem, therefore, lies in dealing with the alcoholic as a sick man who needs treatment; in supporting research projects, such as alcoholic clinics; in developing educational programs within companies, and in working closely with outside agencies, such as the tremendously successful Alcoholics Anonymous. The potential return from such a program as this, measured in both human and money values, is beyond estimation - and it is a program which is within the ability of almost every employer and enterprise.





### BETTER JOBS

**Evidence To Show State Planned** Economy Does Not Work

The big problem before the American people is to get enough influential people to realize that state planned economy will not produce enough to improve the lot of the great mass of people. Those people who have read history and who will answer questions without evasion already know this. Production Comes Before

Of course, no nation can export what is not produced, and if the country does not produce it cannot have many exports or imports, because imports are paid for by products that are exported.

Russia likes to make the public think that if the rest of the world would go along with Russian ideas they would get a lot of business out of Russia - that Russia would be a great market for the produc tion of other nations. Here is how Mr. Chamberlin expresses it:

'A tew figures show how very low the level of trade between the non-Communist and Communist worlds has fallen in recent years. According to figures of the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe) an organization which has been trying to promote development of East-West trade) West European exports to the Soviet Union and its satellites dropped from 7.3 per cent to 2.7 per cent of total exports between 1938 and 1952, Imports were down from 8.1 per cent to 2.9 per cent,

Specific figures for Great Britain, a country which has never been inclined to sacrifice profit-able trade for ideological reasons, tell the same story. The highest percentage of British imports ever supplied by Soviet Russia was .75 per cent in 1931; the average for 1935-38 was 2.2 per cent and the percentage for 1949, which has not varied much since this year, was 0.9 per cent.

Reasons For Trade Slump

"Communism has enoked off potential trade in two ways. First, by confiscating foreign property and discouraging foreign investment, it has eliminated any possibility of foreign private enterprise in countries under its rule. Foreign trade has become a state monopoly. Second, by persecuting and, in some cases, 'liquidating' the well-to-do private peasant and by launching big programs of industrialization, communism has largely wiped out those surplus stocks of foodstuffs and raw, maand western Europe, The standby Russian exports before the revolution were oil, timber, wheat and furs. There is still a limited fur business. But the wheat surplus is needed at home; the oil is required for increased use of trucks and tractors; and the desparate need for housing in Russia does not suggest a timber surplus. The same processes are going on in the satellite countries, where grain shipments to West Europe fell from 2.6 million tons, on the average in 1934-38 to 300,000 tons in 1951-52. Before the war Russia furnished 14.5 per cent of Britain's imports of timber; this fell to 5.5 per cent in 1948-52.

Soviet trade there may emerge a few advantageous nation-to-nation exchanges, a few profitable orders for individual firms. But there is nothing in a long record to suggest that the Soviet Union and its vassal states could, even if they desired, serve as big untapped markets and sources of supply for the West.
