Nash, Hudson Stock Owners Slate Merger

Move Will Make Firm 4th Largest In Auto Industry

DETROIT, Jan. 15 -UP-Only the routine approval of stockholders was needed Friday for a new giant to enter the auto industry and take its place behind the "big three."

5835 Million in Assets Nash and Hudson have combined assets of more than \$583 million and working capital in excess of \$100 million. But this still will leave American Motors a good distance behind the industry's top producers.

Word of the merger, the biggest single automotive transaction since Chrysler bought out Dodge in 1928, came as no surprise since it was known that Nash and Hudson had been negotiating for six months on details of the merger.

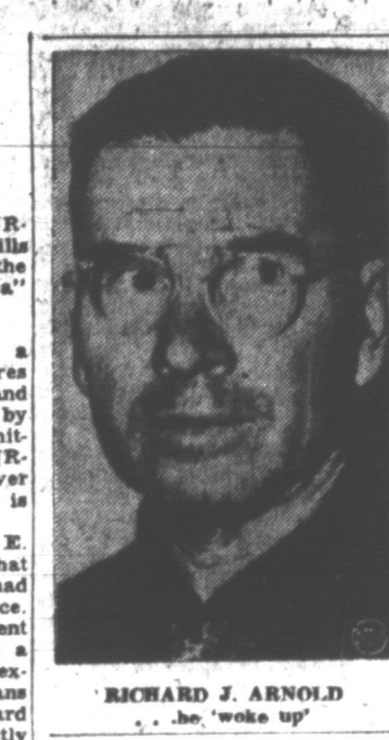

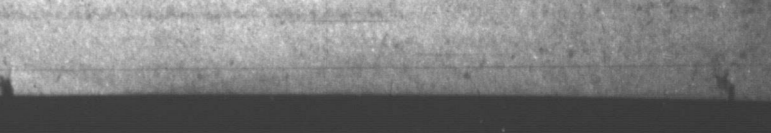

TV Star Plays For Children

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 15 — UP—One of the top television stars hopes the grown-ups, critics included, can't stand to watch his program.

This celebrity is Howdy Doody, who has surpassed Charlie McCarthy as the world's richest puppet. Or, rather, the star is "Buffalo Bob" Smith. He plays Howdy's voice (it sounds like his own) and also gets more close-ups on the NBC children's television program than the puppet.

I confessed to Smith I'm a "Kiddie. From and Ollie" man myself, but this admission did not damage his ego.

"Great!" he boomed, and nudged my arm.

"If you'd watch that show I'd have to change the format! This is not a sophisticated puppet show for grown-ups! This is a kid's show!"

"I get 'em young," confided Smith. "From ages two to seven. Later, they begin to grow away from Howdy, and that's fine. I don't want to appeal to older children.

"Hopalong Cassidy? Why, he hasn't done much for two years. And those other puppet shows can't keep showing."

But Howdy Doody, continued the jovial Smith, pulls in \$150,000 a week in commercials for the network.

Smith, an ex-radio man from Buffalo, originally had a children's radio program in New York starring a character named Eller who cried, "Howdy Doody." The small fry fans adopted the phrase, so Smith sold NBC the idea of Howdy Doody puppet show. The doll was made by an ex-Walt Disney artist.

For the first show, Smith had to lure moppets off the street as a studio audience. Now Howdy Doody gets 5,000 fan letters and ticket requests a week.

"Those fans never get in, though," Smith added sadly. "The 50 tickets a day are divided among the network, the sponsors and me."

Now you can buy Howdy Doody dolls. Only one other network show, the Kraft theater, is older than Howdy. This week Smith brought the puppet show from New York to show Howdy the sights of Pampa.

"We've got this business all figured out," said Smith, with another nudge. "Older kids can be talked out of a space gun or cowboy boots by their parents. Besides, they're in school when mother goes shopping.

"But my fans go to the supermarket with mama. That's where they see the Doody products."

Bentsen Criticizes Crop Allotments

FORT WORTH, Jan. 15 — UP—A Texas congressman believes a "new look" congress to control crop production does more harm than good, and occasionally penalizes a farmer who uses sound principles of soil conservation.

Rep. Lloyd M. Bentsen, McAllen Democrat, spoke Thursday before the Association of Texas Soil Conservation District Supervisors.

He said American farmers had a dual problem. They must produce more and more to meet the needs of the nation's growing population, but temporary surpluses of some commodities often caused a "severe headache."

Rather than straight allotments on the basis of the land historically used for a specific crop, Bentsen said he thought a flexible system should be used. One answer might be analyzing all farms and then ordering the use of each acre according to its capability and the treatment of all land according to its needs.

Bentsen pointed out that a farmer who followed recommended crop rotation and soil conservation practices suffered when historic quotas were imposed, in comparison with the heedless farmer who planted all of his land to cotton, regardless of other considerations.

Use of acreage allotments is harmful, he said, because farmers may deplete their soil by planting too much on a smaller acreage, in order to keep up his total income.

Unrest Seen Among Texas Loyal Demos

AUSTIN, Jan. 15 — UP—Texas were faint indications Friday that all might not be well within the "loyalist" faction of the Texas Democratic party, which supported Adlai E. Stevenson for the presidency in 1952.

Political observers long have held the view that 1954's Democratic primaries and conventions will be marked by bitter fights between the "loyal" Democrats and the faction led by Gov. Allan Shivers, who repudiated Stevenson and was instrumental in delivering Texas' 24 electoral votes to Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1952.

But there apparently was a difference of opinion on strategy among the loyalists. It was reported Rep. Sam Rayburn, dean of the Texas delegation in Washington, had asked "faithful Democrats" in some state senatorial districts to pick nominees for a National Democratic Advisory Council.

Rayburn headed campaign Rayburn directed the 1952 Democratic national campaign in Texas when National Committeeman Wright Morrow of Houston defeated Shivers.

Care Necessary As This Champ Plays

When today's hand was played in the recent Metropolitan Championships in New York, a fine score was made by Constantine Platias and Ivan Wichefeld on the North-South cards. Before I tell the story of the hand, however, I must call attention to the way that this partnership was arranged to show how important bridge tournaments are to real enthusiasts.

I dropped in to see Platias at his office a few days before the tournament. Just as I came in the phone rang for him, and the operator announced that London was calling. It was Wichefeld, calling over the transatlantic telephone, to arrange a bridge date for that Saturday.

Now to get back to our hand. Platias, holding the South hand, thought long and seriously about passing two spades around to his partner. He was sure that North had long spades, but he was afraid that the enemy might get away with a mere one-trick ace.

Rayburn Silent On Academy Site

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 — UP—Rep. Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.), who with a group of constituents sought President Eisenhower's support of Lake Texoma as site of the proposed Air Force Academy, indicated Friday the President would take no stand in the matter.

Rayburn, longtime speaker of the House until Republicans gained control of Congress, called on Mr. Eisenhower Thursday with Freeman Carney and Ralph Porter of Denison and E. B. Chapman and Tip Nevell of Sherman, Tex.

Lake Texoma, an interstate waterway, is located near Denison, where the President was born, in Rayburn's Congressional district.

But the Texas legislator reported after his visit that Mr. Eisenhower was staying out of negotiations for an Air Force Academy site. Air Force Secretary Harold E. Talbot also told Congressmen Friday that he would not consult the President on the matter.

And the total expenditure was \$432,072.72—a tidy profit of \$1,771.00, Wilson pointed out.

A year-end wrap-up of the county hospital's operations during the past year was given Tuesday night to members of the 1954 hospital board by Chet Lander, hospital administrator.

At the same time, Lander discussed with board members the possibility of adding a 12-to-15-bed ward in one of the rooms in the hospital's basement. Main reason for such a ward, he said, would be to take care of quick-coming epidemics, such as the present flu one.

During 1953, Lander told the board, there were 5,619 admissions to the hospital and 26,455 patient-days, an average of about five days per patient.

Call it an average of 69.73 patient-days, Wilson suggested. Then for purposes of comparison, Wilson dug up the average for the hospital in 1952. It was 38.78; in 1951, 60.78; and in 1950, 64.03.

A total of 1,844 operations were performed during 1953. Of them, 581 were minor; the rest, major. There were 683 births in the hospital in 1953. The 48 deaths that occurred in it are divided: 28 dead on arrival, 33 after patients were in the hospital "more than 48 hours"; 19 "under 48 hours"; and three after operations.

The make-up of the new board was also decided at the meeting. New officers are Fred Nealage, chairman; George Newberry, vice chairman; and J. R. Spackman, Lander, secretary. The new board members are Fred Thompson, George Scott and J. W. Meacham, of McLean.

Next hospital board meeting is slated for Feb. 7, 8 or 9.

Sleepy Passenger
NEW YORK, Jan. 12—UP—Cataldo Manzella, 38, pleaded guilty to vagrancy charges Wednesday but insisted he was riding back and forth on the subways for his health and not because he needed a place to sleep.

"I'm a victim of sinus headaches," Manzella told a judge. "When I get an attack I ride the subways. The lights are dim and restful on the eyes."

Manzella, who described himself as an "unemployed pocketmaker," was ordered held for sentencing later this month.

Firm Ordered To Cease Coercion

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15—UP—A trial examiner for the National Labor Relations Board recommended Friday that the Nashua Manufacturing Company of Texas, Wichita Falls, cease interfering with, restraining or coercing its employees in their right to form labor organizations.

The examiner, Eugene F. Frey, recommended that the board issue an order forbidding the company to stop doing such things if it fails to notify the board within 20 days that it will comply.

In his intermediate report and recommended order, Frey recommended dismissal of some charges brought against the company by the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America (AFL) and sustained other charges.

He found the company, to the extent set forth in his recommended order, interested with, restrained and coerced its employees in the exercise of rights guaranteed by the National Labor Relations Act and by so doing "has engaged in, and is engaging in unfair labor practices."

Urges Coffee Fight
MILWAUKEE, Wis., Jan. 14—UP—Elmer Conforti, executive secretary of the Wisconsin Restaurant Association, said Thursday the best way to meet rising coffee prices was to stop drinking coffee.

He sent letters to 1,500 restaurant operators suggesting they push sales of tea, milk and other beverages.

"I figure the only way we can bring coffee prices back to any reasonable figure is to get people to stop drinking it," he said.

Defendant Freed In Murder Trial

OMAHA, Jan. 15—UP—Joseph Kuykendall, friend of the accused, who murdered his blonde heiress wife, looked forward to a brief vacation Friday, but announced no definite plans for the future.

Kuykendall was acquitted Thursday night of the death of Mrs. Ardash (Norie) Kuykendall, Arizona sportswoman, who was found dying at his feet in their swank house trailer here June 18.

A tried jury of four men and eight women returned the verdict of not guilty at 9:28 p. m., nearly seven weeks after the stormy trial opened Nov. 30. It was the longest Omaha jury trial on record.

A crowd of 40 persons, nearly all friends and relatives of the taciturn Arizona horseman, broke into screams and shouts as District Court Clerk Sidney Cottowid read the verdict: "We the jury find the defendant not guilty..."

Deputies had to restore order as the shouts echoed down the darkened corridors of the Douglas county courthouse.

Kuykendall gave way to the only emotion he showed during the trial. He broke into a broad smile as the verdict was read. He appeared to be holding back tears as he shook hands later with each of the jurors. Two of the women jurors were crying.

Judge Carroll O. Stauffer told Kuykendall: "I think your trial has been a fair trial. You have no need to respond to any further claims of the State of Nebraska. You may go forth a free man."

Jolting Petition
CHICAGO, Jan. 14—UP—Elmer Burroughs, 34, a former Chicago transit authority bus driver, asked \$50,000 damages Thursday in a suit against his former employer.

He charges that the constant jolting of the bus had damaged his heart, blood vessels and other internal organs to such an extent he was unfit for any other job.

Violent Coughing
LOS ANGELES, Jan. 14—UP—John Smith Collins, 60, said Thursday he never realized a coughing spell could be so violent.

He began coughing in his car Wednesday and lost control. The car ran down a 68-foot slope and crashed into a carport on a house. Collins suffered a cut lip and hand.

BOSTON, Jan. 14—UP—Mrs. Raymond Glines won a divorce on the ground her husband had a wicked sense of humor.

"He told me he was going to play an April fool day-trick on me," she told Probate Judge John V. Mahoney Wednesday. "He said 'your shoes is untied, dear,' and when I looked down he hit me on the chin."

Evader Of Draft To Get Discharge

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14—UP—Accordianist Dick Contino, once convicted of draft evasion, returns here for discharge next week after Army duty in Korea.

The 23-year-old entertainer was inducted in May, 1960, after serving a 1-1/2 months in federal prison for running away from the induction center at Fort Ord, Calif., the day before he was to be sworn into the Army.

The Army announced Wednesday that Contino, now a sergeant, is aboard the troopship Gen. Gordon with 374 Army troops and 5,124 Marines. The ship is due to arrive in San Francisco Tuesday.

Contino was described by Army officials as a model soldier.

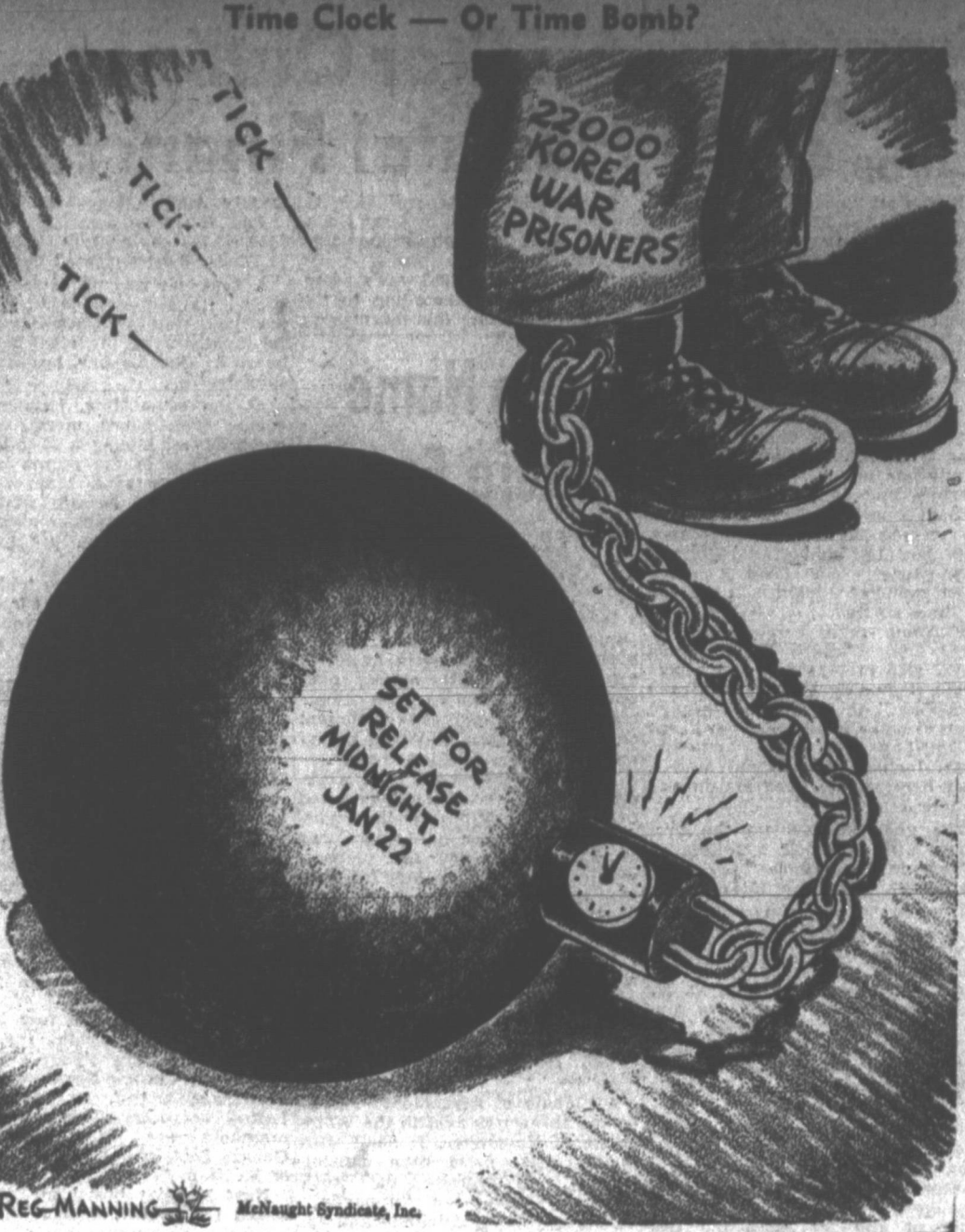

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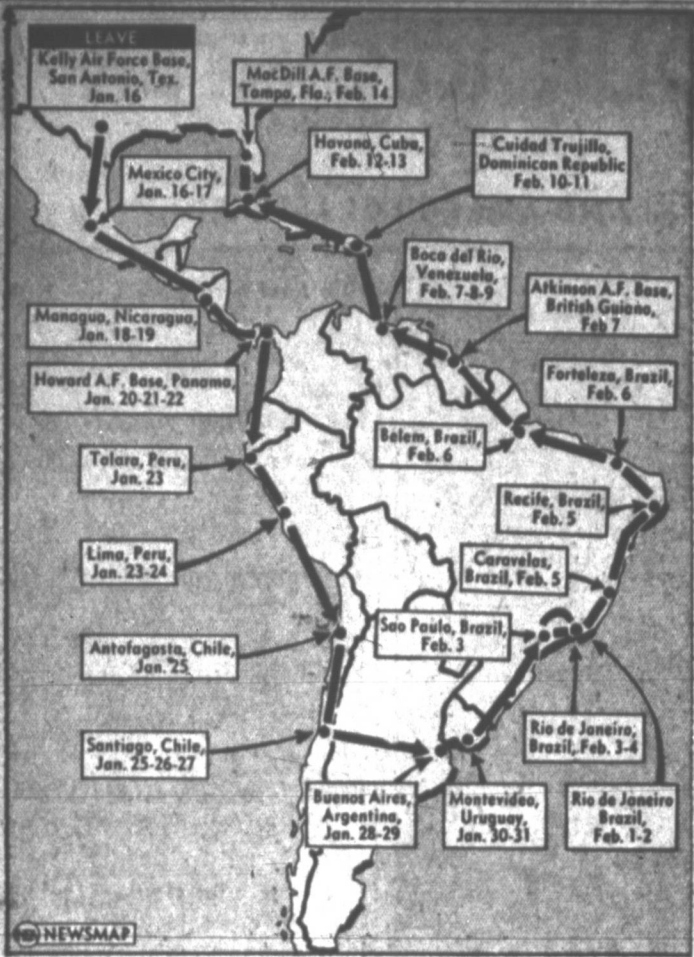
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Wheeler Countians Assist MOD Drive

Slayers Due To Be Charged

RENO, Jan. 15 —UP—Washoe county authorities prepared Friday to file formal charges of murder against Leroy Linden, 34, and Frank Pedrini, 46, for the robbery-slaying of Clarence B. Copeland.

Linden, who was accused with Pedrini of suspicion of murder, confessed Thursday night that he took part in the slaying, but named Pedrini as the one who actually killed.

Pedrini is now in California's San Quentin prison hospital, where he underwent an operation for ulcer. He was arrested earlier this week in Santa Rosa, Calif.

Washoe County Sheriff C. W. Young said Linden, a Los Angeles truck driver, admitted he and Pedrini kidnaped Dodd, a Pearlblum, Calif., carpenter, in Winnemucca, Nev., Oct. 23.

Linden said he and Pedrini drove Dodd in the latter's station wagon to a point 20 miles east of Reno, where they robbed and killed him. They had buried Dodd's body underneath a pile of rocks.

The body was discovered Dec. 13 by two boys hunting rabbits. FBI agents arrested Linden last week in Los Angeles on a charge of driving Dodd's car from Santa Rosa to New Boston, Tex. The car was found burned there on Oct. 28.

Linden said the slaying occurred as he and Pedrini were returning to Santa Rosa from Arkansas, where they had gone earlier with their respective sisters-in-law, Mrs. Vivianne Linden, 34, of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Josephine Pedrini, 36, of Santa Rosa.

Both women are being held in Reno. They face arraignment on complaints naming them as accessories in the slaying.

New Male Feud In Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 15 —UP—A staling feud among Dick Powell, Charles Laughton and Henry Fonda broke into the open, with Powell accusing the others of being "ridiculous."

This latest set-to centers around a play, "The Caine Mutiny Court Martial," and there has been more mutiny behind the footlights than in front. The all-male tiff rivals the recent Joan Crawford-Meredith McCambridge match, and proves that not just the ladies get cross at each other in show business.

The feud features Fonda, the star of the Herman Wouk play, and Powell, who was director until he suddenly hurried back to Hollywood and was replaced by Laughton, also the co-producer.

Thursday Co-Producer Paul Gregory announced Powell would not be credited as director of "The Caine Mutiny Court Martial" when it opens on Broadway Jan. 30 after a road tour.

Gregory said Laughton "is entirely responsible" for the direction, because Powell was "removed" from the job.

But Powell fumed he wasn't fired — he quit.

"Gregory asked me to direct the play," Powell explained at RKO where he's acting in "Susan Slept Here."

"I got into a slight squabble with Henry. He was disappointed with a couple of sequences. He threatened to quit unless it was done his way he wanted."

Fonda is "like that, moody. He did that on another play, 'Point of No Return.' Rather than disrupt the production, I left, five days before their national tour opened last fall. I returned to RKO. I assume Fonda did the scenes the way he wanted to. After all, he's the star of the play."

Powell said he was satisfied with his directing job because "the play was a tremendous hit on the road." Later during the run, Co-Producer Laughton became the troupe's director.

"He probably made changes," admitted Powell. "But nonetheless my contract says I get directorial credit at all times. I've consulted my attorneys and may take action. They think the group may be trying to get out of paying me my percentage of the gross."

"Or another reason may be this is the first Gregory production I didn't — that Laughton didn't direct. He doesn't see why there should be a fuss over directing, anyway. The writing was so good and the actors so competent—who needs a director?" he shrugged.

"My uncle on the farm could have directed it."
