Russia's Spy Ring Bared In Far East

TOKYO, Feb. 2 — A Soviet career diplomat is giving American intelligence agents detailed information on a big Russian spy ring operating in the Far East, an authoritative source said Tuesday.

diplomatic and military officials had been informed of Rastorov's flight shortly after he delivered himself to American authorities.
