WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 — UP — A large formation of MIG-15s attacked an American reconnaissance plane off the Korean coast Jan. 29, but an accompanying force of U. S. Sabrejets scattered the Red fighters and shot down one of them, it was disclosed Monday.

NEA Proposes Students Study Commie Ideas

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 — UP — A group of U. S. educators proposed Monday that students be acquainted with Communist ideas in order to bolster their faith in democracy. It made this reservation: Books should be clearly labeled to indicate any "Communist bias," and classroom discussions should be guided by "emotionally mature teachers."

Well Blaze Snuffed Out

ANDREWS, Tex., Feb. 1 — UP — Forty-five tons of drilling mud pumped into a fiery oil well by a team of men choked off an escaping gas and snuffed out the fire that burned nearly 48 hours. The oil well, located in the Emma field 10 miles southwest of Andrews, blew out with a roar early Saturday, spewing mud, gas and flames over a wide area and injuring eight Odesa, Tex., oil field workers.

Morse Sees GOP Suicide

AUSTIN, Feb. 1 — UP — Sen. Wayne Morse said Sunday night the Republican party was "fast committing suicide" and predicted a new party will rise from the GOP "death bed." Morse, who quit the Republican party during the last presidential campaign, said the new party would be composed of liberal elements of both leading parties.

Aliens Hit Total Of Thirty-Three

A total of 33 Pampa aliens registered at the Post Office during the month of January, according to Postmaster W. B. Weathered. Each year, every alien in the United States must submit an address report between Jan. 1 and Jan. 31. The reports on the Pampa aliens will now be sent to the immigration bureau in Washington, D. C., Weathered advised.

Services To End Segregation In All Military Post Schools

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 — UP — Army, Navy and Air Force officials took steps Monday to back up Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson's order to end segregation in all military post schools by Sept. 1, 1955. Conferences were in progress among officials of the three services and the Defense Department on ways to merge separate schools for Negro and white children with the least possible turmoil.

Air Crash Fatal To 35

TOKYO, Feb. 1 — UP — A U. S. Air Force courier plane crashed into icy waters off northern Japan Monday and all 35 persons aboard were killed. A Far East Air Force spokesman said the 30 passengers and five crewmen all were Americans. Their names have been withheld pending notification of next of kin. Far East headquarters here said that search planes and Japanese patrol boats discovered the search for bodies at night all about four hours after the crash.

Bid Opening Date Set On Bridge Job

Resident highway engineers this morning received official notification of the date of opening of bids on the proposed Canadian River Bridge. Bids will be opened at 9 a. m. Feb. 16 or 17 in Austin, according to a letter received this morning from J. C. Dingwall, head of the road design division of the Texas Highway Department.

James Roosevelt Indicates He's Finished In Politics

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 1 — UP — James Roosevelt, who allegedly admitted intimacies with nine women in a letter to his wife, gave strong indications Monday he was through as a candidate for Congress. "I have released all my friends and supporters from any further obligation to me in the 26th District congressional campaign," Roosevelt said in a statement.

Prowlers Break Locks On Store

Employees at the Montgomery Ward warehouse on E. Tng road were taking inventory in an effort to determine if anything had been stolen in a weekend burglary. Late this morning, according to Chief of Police Jim Conner, they had found nothing missing. When warehouse employees went to work this morning they discovered that two locks on the east door of the warehouse had been broken and that someone had "prowled around inside," Chief Conner said.

Secret Talks Asked On German Problems

Big Four Meeting In Eastern Berlin

BERLIN, Feb. 1 — UP — Big Four diplomats decided at a strategy session Monday to ask for a secret session with the Russians for a showdown on the settlement of the German problem. U. S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault reached an agreement shortly before the Big Four conference went into its second week. The western allies moved into Communist East Berlin to hear Russian Foreign Minister Vyacheslav Molotov's reply to the suave Eden's western-based proposal for unifying divided Germany.

China Tries Blackmailing

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 — UP — Communist China may try to blackmail its way into a conference with the Big Four foreign ministers by offering to free three American prisoners on a yacht last March, diplomat said Monday.

The quadruplet girls were born Feb. 1, 1939, after the family doctor warned their mother she would give birth to triplets.

Threatening Husband Shot

FORT WORTH, Feb. 1 — UP — A 47-year-old Asle man was critically wounded Monday as he advanced with shotgun and threats on the home where his estranged wife was staying. The wounded man, Bert Joe Gary, was reported near death at City-County hospital after being hit by a blast from a 16-gauge shotgun. Police said a 28-year-old man admitted the shooting, which officers added appeared to be self-defense.

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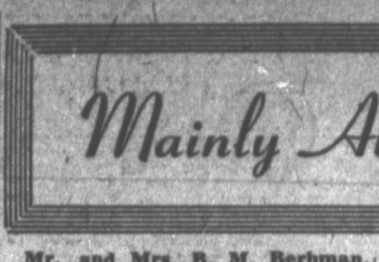

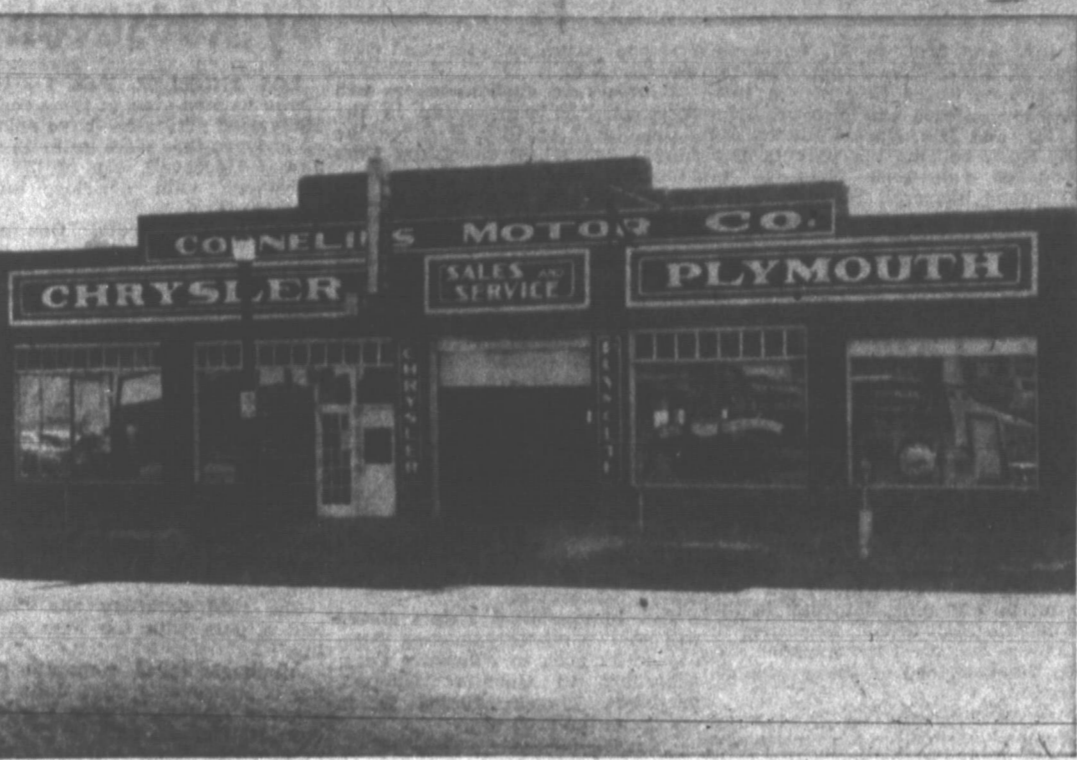

The deadline on motor vehicle inspection is April 15th. After that date, authorities will start enforcing the safety inspection law. Cornelius Motor Co., located at 325 W. A few of the qualifications your car must meet are: Brakes, lights, stop lights, horn, windshield wiper, and mirror.

Brakes must be equalized, according to the inspection rules. Vehicles, or combination of vehicles, having brakes on all wheels must stop in 30 feet at 20 miles an hour. Vehicles, or combination of vehicles, not having brakes on all wheels must stop in 40 feet at 20 miles an hour. The brakes must be inspected either by brake tester or road test, for stopping distances in conformance to law.

In accordance with the rules on lights, all motor vehicles, except motorcycles, motor scooters, and motor bikes, shall be equipped with at least two burning headlamps — minimum candle-power reading must be at least 3,500 on any type of headlamp. Multiple beam headlamps must burn on both high and low beam. Single beam headlamps will be set at a 5 inch drop at 25 feet.

All inspections shall be made on high beam. An effort should be made to determine the average loaded condition under which vehicles are operated at night and headlamps set accordingly, especially on commercial vehicles.

Every vehicle must have at least one tail lamp, mounted on rear, emitting a red light, and must have a white light illuminating the rear license plate.

Stop lights are required on a motor vehicle sold new after January 1, 1948, and on all commercial motor vehicles, buses, trailers and semi-trailers.

The horn is to be inspected for an audible signal — horn must give signal that could be heard for a distance of 200 feet, or more.

Windshield wiper on the driver's side must be in good working order. Manually operated wipers if possible.

The inspection procedure of the mirror is limited to commercial motor vehicles (trucks, truck-trailers and pick-ups). Inspection for mounting, condition of reflecting surface and view to the rear is a must.

All turn signals when used on passenger vehicles must be of an approved type.

## Actress Tells Her Attitude After Her Leg Was Amputated

**Editor's note** — In a series of two articles, actress Susan Ball tells how she has adjusted to life with one leg, and how her experience can help war veterans who are amputees. Today, Susan says it's your attitude that counts.

**HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 1** — "My biggest fear when my right leg was amputated recently was: How was it going to affect other people?"

Say you're living alone on a desert island and you have a scar on your face. This probably won't upset you. Our social standards are based on what other people think. But when you're living in a society, as we all do, your first thought is: What will other people think? Will I be laughed at or pitied? Will anybody want to fall in love with me? Can I keep my job?

The first problem of adjusting is to realize other people don't condemn you. They want to help you. They still love you. If anyone stops loving you because you lose a leg, they aren't worth loving, anyway.

The second thing to understand — and this is the best advice I can give war veterans who lost limbs — is that it depends largely on your own attitude whether people accept you. You make people uncomfortable. If you spend the rest of your life moaning about a broken finger nail or a lost arm, they won't want to see you. You must say, "I lost the leg. I've got a wooden leg," and don't make an issue about it. Then people will relax around you.

It's my one and only life, and I don't plan to ruin it with regrets. Self-pity is a waste of valuable time.

At first I wondered if my fiancé, actor Dick Long, still would want me. I told him, "I'm certainly not going to marry you now." He said, "This doesn't make any difference to me." Now I know it doesn't.

I didn't lose my job in pictures. I have received more than 3,000 letters, mostly from people who have lost limbs and they are pulling for me. They have sent me

Bibles and other gifts. They aren't repelled by the idea of seeing me with the scar on my leg. In fact, they all say they want to see my next picture, so you see, I have gained friends.

If regretting the past is more important to a person than peace of mind and a happy life, then that person is narrow and vain. Most people lose something during their lives. If a girl has an unhappy love affair, she should say, "I've lost him but I learned this and this and I'll go on to find someone else."

I can't change what has happened to me. I am going on to find other things in life, too. (Tuesday: How Susan will walk again.)

The "Gershwin Festival" of music—a Howard Lanin production being presented in a coast-to-coast tour, will appear in Pampa on February 12 at the Junior High School.

The Gershwin Concert Orchestra, playing throughout the tour, is conducted by Robert Zeller, young American conductor of the Sadler's Wells Ballet and the Ballet Theatre. The soloists who will appear in Pampa are Elizabeth Doubleday, young soprano, only pupil of Rosa Ponselle and recent recipient of a long-term RCA Victor recording contract; Calvin Marsh, young American baritone winner of the 1953 American Theatre Wing Concert Award, and Marco Braggiotti, famous pianist, member of the famous musical family and one of the former piano duo, Frey and Braggiotti.

Thirty virtuoso musicians recruited from New York's best symphony orchestras comprise the Gershwin Concert Orchestra, whose concertmaster is Anshel Brusilow, guest soloist this season at four performances on the Philadelphia Orchestra.

The idea of a Gershwin Festival presented on a nationwide basis originated with Howard Lanin, famous society orchestra leader and producer, in discussion with concert manager Andre Merzans. In 1953 they booked their first tour of the Festival in nearly 100 cities in five months. It was heard by an audience totaling nearly half a million, in the biggest cities and in tank towns. They reasoned that school and college audiences, particularly, and communities not having resident orchestras would delight in an entire program of the works of "America's Own Immortal," George Gershwin. Past, present and future bookings prove they were right. Of the seventy-three concerts comprising the current tour, forty-seven take place in college and high school auditoriums.

The extraordinary success of this presentation of Gershwin's greatest music is aptly expressed by the New York Times' Olin Downes in his review of the New York concert, held January 9. He said: "The program of Gershwin's music given Saturday night at Hunter College by the Gershwin Concert Orchestra, conducted by Robert Zeller with assisting soloists was a astonishingly effective. It was astonishing, not because of the wide public favor Gershwin's music found from the minute it was composed, but because of the way in which this music stands up on our programs and commands the interest of informed musicians as well as laymen."

These thoughts mirror the devotion and enthusiasm shown everywhere the "Gershwin Festival" appears. Americans today respond just as heartily to this most American of twentieth century music as did the gathering in New York's Aeolian Hall thirty years ago, when Gershwin gave the world premiere of his "Rhapsody in Blue" and when a musically sophisticated Paris audience went wild with enthusiasm at Gershwin's introduction of the "Concerto in F" at the French capital in 1928.

Of the currently touring Gershwin Festival! Mr. Downes wrote further: "The Concerto was brilliantly performed by Mr. Braggiotti. The singing was excellent. . . and Mr. Zeller proved himself repeatedly a conductor of exceptional gifts."
