

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## Time-Lag Bill

Senator Bricker, chairman of the Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, forecasts that the "time-lag" bill will be passed by this Congress. He added that he doesn't know of any serious opposition to it.

The bill, which was formally known as S. 1461, is designed to correct a gross inequality in our system of establishing the rates charged by railroads and other carriers which are under Interstate Commerce Commission jurisdiction. At present, if the railroads find that higher wages and other unavoidable costs have made current rates inadequate, application is made to the ICC for increases. The catch is that, as a rule, many months go by before ICC completes its hearings and investigations and renders a decision. In late years, the railroads have ultimately been given all or most of the increases requested, as the ICC found them eminently fair and necessary. But for protracted periods of time the carriers have been forced to operate with insufficient revenuesand the loss to this absolutely essential industry has been extremely damaging.

Suppose that this was the case with your own business, Suppose you were legally forced to run for month after month selling goods or services at prices which returned you no profit, and perhaps even resulted in a net loss. That is exactly what has happened to the regulated carriers time and time again

The time-lag bill will substantially reduce the time required between the filing of sate increase requests and action by the ICC. In the interest of the national welfare, it is to be hoped Senator Bricker is right

### Low Cost Power

A high-geared propaganda campaign is underway in an effort to convince the public that the Interior Department's présent electric power program amounts to a ruthless giveaway of natural resources - and that great states and regions will suffer enormous damage. A typical charge in the Pacific Northwest now is that Interior is about to scuttle the post "low-cost" power policy, and bring an industrion stagnation and wide-

Only those who lack access to the facts will believe this. Nobody is opposed to "low-cest" power. Everybody is for it. All Interior is doing is, on the one hand, to attempt to make government power come nearer to paying its own way, with smaller subsidies from all the taxpayers -- and, on the other, to encourage power development by private enterprise and thus to create large new sources of tax revenue. To that end, Interior has withdrawn objections to private construction which blocked needed power development for years on rivers in all parts of the nation.

There is probably a great deal of misunderstanding much of it deliberately fomented — as to the importance of the cost of electricity. In practically all homes, it is one of the smallest cost-of-living items. With few exceptions, it is also one of the smallest overhead costs in business and industry. That is also true of agriculture. And private power is sold at rates which are determined by public service bodies - rates which cover necessary operating expenses plus a profit of about six per cent. Interior's position is in the interest of everyone in the country, except those who want socialism.

## Signatures Needed

A group of 212 distinguished Americans has presented President Eisenhower with a petition opposing the admission of Communist China to the United Nations, and has also announced the formation of "The Committee For One Million" whose goal is to obtain 1,000,000 American signatures in that cause. Members of the group include former President Hoover, General and former Secretary of State Marshall, General Van Fleet of Korea fame, former Undersecretary of State Grew, Senators Knowland and Sparkman, former Ambassador to the United Nations Warren Austin, and other statesmen, diplomats, soldiers, publishers, businessmen, churchmen, labor leaders, etc.

As Herbert Hoover has said, "One of the greatest dangers the cause of freedom faces today is the uncertainty in the minds of both governments and peoples abroad as to the position of the United States in relation to Communist China. The Communists ... endeavor to create disunity and spread lies about the stand of the United States. Any and every effort that we as Americans can make to prove to our friends overseas just where we, as a nation stand, is of enormous value.

It should be possible to gather swiftly many more than 1,000,000 signatures for so great a cause. The Committee's address is 36 West 44th St., New York 36, N. Y.

"Union Monopoly"

I want to continue to quote from the new book "Union Monop-

oly" by Dr. V. Orval Watts. Few people realize that the real purpose of government is to pro tect people in their natural monoply, the monopoly of their life, their property. But instead of the government protecting individuals in their natural monopoly of their right to use their life as their conscience dictates so long as they respect other people's equal right to own themselves, the govern-ment has aligned itself with special groups and created unnatural monopolies for them,

There would have been no union monopoly if the government had not passed such laws as the Norris-LaGurdia Law, the Wagner Law and the Taft-Hartley Law. The employers who attempted to give their workers a monopoly on their jobs would have been taken care of by their customers. The customer's self interest would make him refuse to pay the price of things that were produced by union featherbedding and keeping the wrong man in the job.

In the last issue I was quoting from the chapter "Costs of Creeping Coercion." Dr. Watts continues to explain how creeping coercion increases the cost to the consuming public. I continue to quote:

'Coercion can be useful in stopping private coercion or foreign aggression, but it cannot stimulate enterprise and progress. Government fixing of prices or wages means use of the police powers to force some persons to give their services or goods on terms dictated to them, not agreed to by them. This means forced service, and even though it is legal, it robs the victims of responsibility and initiative. It discourages enterprise and directs ingenuity to evasion and resistance. The result is increased conflict and reduced willingness to produce and serve. And Involuntary Servitude

Government may hide or change the apparent effects of its intervention by taking over the in ways which help employers to

"But this artificial stimulant brings its own new train of evils, and these evils mount as producers become dependent on increasing doses of the inflation to maintain trade and employment, Among these evils of currency inflation and government spending is the growth of bureaucracy, imperialism and militarism -- or

"Sooner or later, these evils stop the nation's progress and start it on a downhill course of financial crises, wars and falling



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
