Reduce Household Expense; Check Washday Habits

What's your pet "string-saving" economy? Thriftier methods of everyday housework that save nickels and dimes get an attentive ear these days when budgets are not well-padded.

For example, a slight change in my laundering and cleaning habits saves me nearly a dollar a week. It also makes me a better housewife.

That slight change is to measure accurately, by the cup or the spoonful, exactly the amount of detergent, bleach, water conditioner, or cleaner recommended.

When I measured by "eyes" I was dumping into the washing

machine (automatic) about a cup-and-a-half of detergent. Accurate measure according to the directions proved that 1/2 to one cup was enough to clean clothes. With our heavy weekly laundry load, accuracy saves 50 to 60 cents in supplies each week.

Applying the same test to dish-washing showed we were using three times as much detergent as we needed. Reducing the amount saves about 20 to 30 cents a week. The dishes are also easier to rinse and dry.

Another financially foolish habit is overloading the floor-washing water with cleaner. Cleaning powders don't cost much, I know, but strong concentrations are hard on the floor, make sponge mop heads wear out faster and lift the paint off the woodwork.

A pet thrift of a country friend, she estimates, about three or four dollars a month. Telephone toll calls mount up fast when you have a big family who bring home friends for weekends and holidays.

She keeps a little jar marked "tolls" beside the telephone and about a dollar's worth of change in it. With this reminder at hand, guests are encouraged to make change and pay for their call at once.

Try this thrift tip if your children help clean up the bathtub or sink: A friend of mine discovered that a can of cleanser would last twice as long and do just as effective a job if she punched only two holes in the top instead of five or six.

A Way With A Zipper

A one-yard skirt with just one seam! Even a beginner can tackle this slim number and come up with a success. And if you have never put in a zipper, here are some suggestions that will make it easy. Skirt placket zippers are seven inches long. The opening should be one-half inch longer.

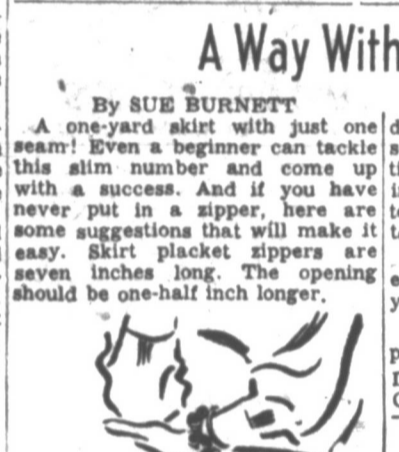
Step 5. For a smooth easy finish, do what many fine dressmakers do, sew the zipper in by hand, taking tiny back stitches about one-fourth inch apart. This way it is easy to work in any slight fullness due to the bias of the seam.

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Groom To Hide Figure Defect

Some beauty problems are so easy to disguise that it is really amazing so many women fail to do something about them. Apparently it never occurred to them that they are suffering from the condition.

So, teen-agers, if you wish to look your best, know your worst. Now, for example, those of you whose beauty problem is a short neck can do several things to minimize the defect. You can even lengthen your neck.

Half styling should be no trouble at all. The current trend in coiffures is good for you. Wear your hair rather short and brushed back. Try to achieve an upward movement around the temples.

In necklines, a V-shape is excellent. All should be uncluttered. Chunky jewelry, chokers, round collars should always be avoided.

Hats that have turned-up brims or deep crowns are best. The big floppy hats tend to push the head farther down into the neck.

Collarless coats are best, but one with a very flat collar could should never be worn.

To lengthen the neck, try this exercise: Lie with knees bent, feet close together, the base of the spine one inch from the floor and shoulders relaxed. Push head up away from shoulders so that you feel you are pushing up on that it touches (or nearly touches) the floor.

Champion Harvesters Live in Season Finale Tomorrow

PHSians Prep For Bi-District Series With EP Champions

With their second straight District 1-AAAA title under the belt, the Hustlin' Harvesters begin preparations for their season finale tomorrow night and for the forthcoming bi-district playoff with the District 2-AAAA champs.

The Harvesters will meet the Borger Bulldogs at Harvesters Fieldhouse tomorrow night in their final regularly scheduled game of the season.

Then the Harvesters will start looking forward to the bi-district series with the El Paso champs. El Paso High School has the inside track on becoming the District 2-AAAA champs.

The Harvesters are unbeaten in six district games during the season, but never had one a win in a district game. They are still in the title race and are ranked at this point, being two games back of El Paso with two games left.

El Paso can pull down the flag by winning one of its two remaining games. El Pasoans meet defending champion Bowie Thursday night and challenger Yesela Friday night. Yesela meets Jefferson Thursday night and if she wins this game and El Paso wins to Bowie, the race will go right down to the wire.

In the event El Paso loses its two remaining games and Yesela wins her two, the race would end in a 2-way tie with a one-game tiebreaker. A playoff will be held Saturday night.

Bowie, who met the Harvesters in the bi-district series last year, is out of the running this season with a 4-5 slate. Jefferson follows with a 4-3 record. Coach Clifton McNeely of the Harvesters plans to go to El Paso this weekend to scout the El Pasoans and to arrange the site for the bi-district series. The bi-district series will likely be held a week from this coming weekend. A coin flip will likely decide the site.

The entire bi-district series will be unrec'd at either El Paso or Pampa.

The Harvesters clinched their second straight crown Saturday night with a spiny tangle, 43-29, over Amarillo, 13 gave the Harvesters a 13-0 district slate to second place Amarillo's 11-2. The Harvesters could still claim the title regardless of the outcome of tomorrow's game with Borger.

In defeating the Harvesters Saturday night, the Harvesters start their victory streak to 21 and their current season streak to 21.

Jimmy Bond poured in 46 points in the two games last week to top his season total to 476 and his district total to 258 points. Bond is 19 points shy of the District 1-AAAA scoring record he set last year at 307.

Gary Griffin continued to hold the No. 2 spot in the Harvesters scoring with 316 points while E. Jay McIlvain held down third with 291 points.

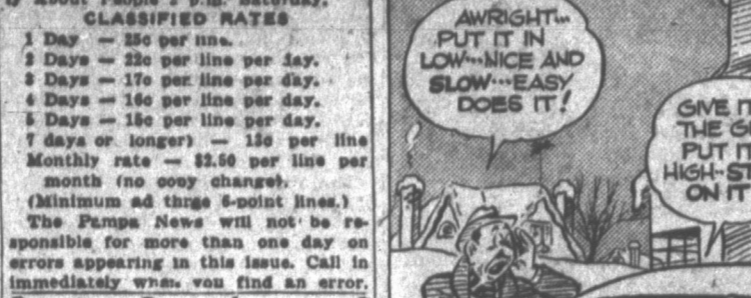

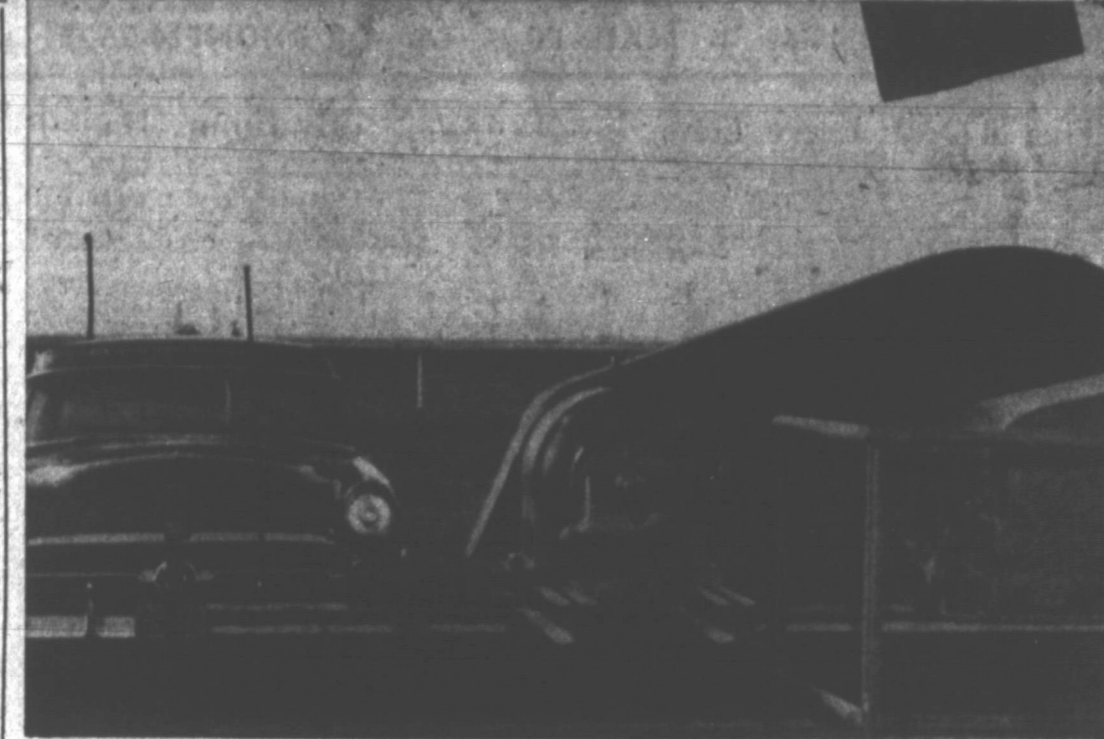

Chicken Owners Obey Ordinance

Pampans are abiding pretty well by the livestock and chicken ordinance — and there is not a single case of violation pending in corporation court.

City-County Sanitarian L. E. West today indicated there is "a good percentage" of persons complying with the ordinance — "there are only two or three cows now inside the city limits."

Cows, goats, cattle, sheep, hogs and horses are covered in the livestock ordinance. The chicken ordinance stipulates that no crowing chickens are permitted in the city and that not more than 25 laying hens and 50 chickens less than 10 weeks old are permitted.

"All chickens at large are a violation," West emphasized. Violations of either ordinance, he continued, would result in the serving of written notices, a 10-day wait and then prosecution in the city court.

Right now, West is trying to get all premises cleaned up of rubbish and all lumber stacked on racks 12 inches off the ground.

He is asking the cooperation of citizens "to help out the drive against pests."

Humble Gives Net Earnings

HOUSTON, Feb. 12 —UP—Humble Oil & Refining Co. announced Thursday its net earnings were up nearly \$20 million in 1933, over 1932, but said \$9,250,000 was a "non-recurring" repayment of taxes.

Misconception Cleared Up More Powerful Engines Not Designed Solely For Speed

DETROIT, Feb. 12 —UP—Car makers aren't trying to breed a nation of speed demons with their higher and higher horsepower engines.

But the public seems to be getting that impression. And it's wrong, the manufacturers say. What the industry is trying to do is to give the public cars that have instant response to demands of the highway.

If engineers were looking for speed alone they could accomplish it much more easily — and cheaply — than putting more horsepower in engines. A change in gear ratio could do that on most modern cars.

Higher speed, of course, is a by-product of greater horsepower. But that's not what the car manufacturers are looking for. They want the "deliverable power" there when the driver needs it. For example, when passing another car with one bearing down from the other direction; or getting onto the highway in high speed traffic from a side road.

These are safety — not speed — factors. Higher horsepower also makes modern cars more a part of the driver. Pressure of the foot gives instant response. There is no delay from the time the mind tells the foot to press down.

The word "horsepower" is misused anyway. What the motorist is interested in is torque — or twisting force. Just as an example, an engine of "high" torque can accelerate more quickly than one of "lower" torque but possibly more horsepower.

"As a matter of fact," said Ford's Chief Engineer Earl S. MacPherson, "horsepower increases in recent years have done little toward raising top highway speeds. In the top range it takes about five horsepower to raise vehicle speed one mile an hour.

He cited this example: An engine developing 100 horsepower and a top speed of 85 miles an hour would have to be brought up to 125 horsepower to raise the vehicle speed to 90 MPH.

Wrong Impression

Advertising on horsepower sometimes gives the wrong impression. In the first place, all the crowing is done on the amount that is developed at the end of the crankshaft. However, this "horsepower" still has to get to the wheels through the transmission, differential, drive shaft, rear end gears and the rear axle. They all take their toll in friction and inertia.

The same is true for accessories such as the generator. The loss is figured somewhere between 10 and 20 per cent. With air conditioning it's even more.

In the second place, maximum horsepower is obtained at maximum revolutions per minute — the throttle wide open. To get that kind of power you would have to saddle the engine like a horse and ride it down the highway. And you wouldn't be able to wait until next year's new models to buy a new one because it wouldn't last that long.

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
